ANCHORAGE: A borough-wide census will get underway on October 14th, 1968, with every household in the GAAB to be included.

The census will be taken under the auspices of the U.S. Census bureau, and certified by that Department, but funds for the census will be provided by the Borough.

The reason behind the census was the lack of recent figures showing the population of the Borough. A spokesman for the Borough Planning Department said that it is almost a certainty that the population of the borough exceeds available figures, and that the borough is losing out on Federal and State programs which are based on population.

Recruitment of census takers is presently under way, and is being handled by the State Employment Office.

Persons interested in temporary employment as census takers may file their applications with the employment office in Anchorage. Appointments will be scheduled with a representative of the U.S. Census Bureau who will conduct interviews and testing. These will start on October 2nd. Those employed as census takers will take part in training sessions.

Approximately 3 to 5 days of employment can be expected by each census taker. Payment will be on the basis of 10¢ for each name, with an allowance for mileage in remote areas. Crew leaders will be paid on an hourly basis.

The questions will be of a simple nature, asking only the name, ages, and address of the individual and inquiring as to racial background. The latter is to determine how many of Alaskan Native or Eskimo background reside in the borough.

The census is expected to be completed within two to three weeks from the time it is started, and will cost the borough \$45,000.

BORO ASSEMBLY APPROVES FIRE COMPANY BUDGET

CHUGIAK: The proposed budget for Fire Service in Service Area No. 8 (the area formerly served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company) has been submitted to the Borough Assembly and approved.

Robert Kallenberg, Chairman for the local board of supervisors, stated that the Board had met with the Board of Directors of the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company and had come up with a budget for \$5,000 which was to include all expenses of operating the equipment, maintenance and costs of utilities and repairs on the fire hall, as well as the cost of insurance and administrative fees.

Of the \$5,000, \$1,500 will be received from the Borough for contracted ambulance service, and \$3,500 will be collected in taxes at the rate of 1/2 mill.

The period covered in this budget is August 1, 1968 to June 30, 1969.

A special attraction will be a "one man" show of paintings by Merice Richner, the artist who painted the picture which is being raffled.

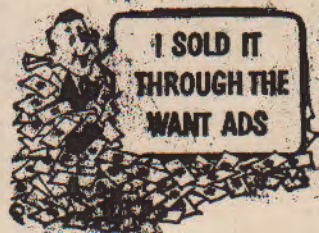
BASIC EDUCATION REGISTRATION

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DRIVING DANGER WARNED OF

During the past summer we had much beautiful weather to enjoy, but from now until Christmas we can expect some of the worst. Rain is sure to ruin many outings, many trips to games, many routine drives to and from work.

Rain quickly slows traffic to a crawl. Worse yet, it causes streaky windshields and obscures drivers' vision. The Highway Visibility Bureau points out that 90 per cent of driving decisions depend on sight.

If you wear glasses, be sure they're clean when you drive.

Be sure your windshield is clean and your windshield wiper equipment—arms, blades, and washers—is in top condition.

Wiper arms should exert a pressure against the windshield of an ounce to each inch of blade length. If pressure is right and wiper still streaks, it means the blade is dead and calls for replacement or refill.

Headlights should be accurately aimed and all lights in working order.

Such proposals must be received by the Department of Fish and Game, Support Building, Juneau, Alaska 99801, no later than 5 p.m., Oct. 4, 1968, in order to be considered by the Board of Fish and Game at its fall meeting.

Commissioner Reetz said that the fall board meeting will be concerned primarily with changes in the commercial and sport fishing regulations; however, for the first time the board will consider changes in game regulations dealing with brown and grizzly bears. Regulations dealing with all other species of game will be taken up at the next regular spring board meeting.

ANYONE CAN ENTER MARATHON

Time was when only super athletes like Jess Owens or Bob Richards had a decent excuse for racing hellbent along a woodland trail. Today, a nation of fitness-minded joggers has made the scene fairly commonplace.

But nowhere does jogging—and out-and-out racing—reach the proportions it does at the University of Alaska each fall when the annual Equinox Marathon gets underway.

More than 1,000 men, women, boys, and girls—from age 10 up—are expected to hit the university's 26-mile, 385 yard trail when the sixth running of the marathon begins at 8 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 21.

Some will be in the running division, trying to break the 1965 time of 3:07.10 set by Ed Williams of the U.S. Army Biathlon

Team. Others will be hikers and joggers, simply trying to master the long course before sundown.

Bill Smith, an assistant professor of physical education and this year's marathon director, said about 700 persons began the race last year but only 600 officially finished it. The 1967 top time for runners was 3:09.07, set by Jon Chaffee, another Biathlon Team member.

"This year we are planning for 1,000 starters," Smith said. "Interest in the marathon just keeps building and it gets bigger and bigger."

Smith has added a new twist this fall, scheduling what he calls a "pre-marathon" for Sunday, Sept. 15. "It's really a practice race for persons who are entering the marathon on the following Saturday," he said.

"Interested runners and hikers should meet at the Patty Building by 1:30 p.m. Sunday and we'll start at 2 p.m. We'll use a six-mile trail."

Smith said the pre-marathon has no entry fee and no awards will be made. Both individuals and four-man teams are encouraged to enter. Participants may enter immediately preceding the race at the Patty Building.

For the official marathon on Sept. 21, the entry deadline is 5 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 18. An entry form and general information may be obtained by writing: Equinox Marathon, Physical Education Department, University of Alaska, College, Fairbanks 99701, or by visiting the student center on campus at 1000 Klondike St.

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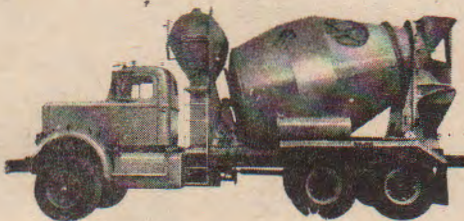

**NROTC EXAMS
SCHEDULED**

ANCHORAGE: Vice Admiral C.K. Duncan, Chief of Naval Personnel, has announced the 23rd annual national competitive NROTC examination has been set for 14 December 1968.

Eligible high school seniors and graduates are to submit their applications before Nov. 15, 1968.

The regular NROTC Program offers an outstanding opportunity for a young man to gain a regular commission while studying at one of the 53 NROTC colleges and universities.

The Navy furnishes tuition, fees, books and uniforms, plus a subsistence allowance of \$50.00 per month to NROTC midshipmen. After completing his college course and all military requirements, a NROTC Midshipman is commissioned as a regular officer in the U.S. Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the operating forces.

The program is available to male high school seniors and graduates who will have reached their 17th but not 21st birthday by July 1, 1969.

Approximately 1,700 young men will be selected to attend college next September to prepare for their naval service.

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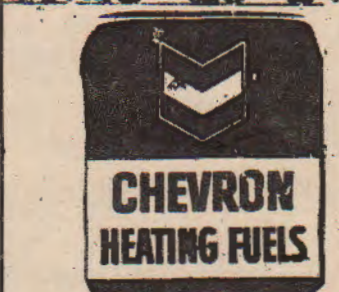
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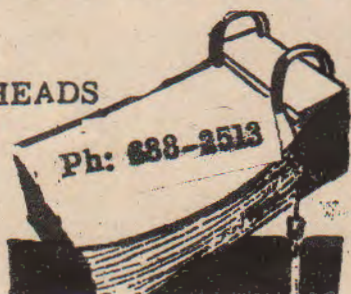
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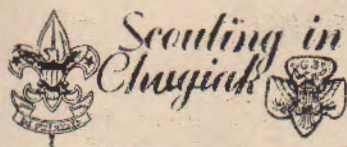
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CADETTE SCOUTS TO HAVE GET TOGETHER

ALASKA RANKS HIGH IN SALES

Alaska is now ranked 18th among the states in volume of sales to Japan, according to a survey entitled "Japan Buys American in All Fifty States" just published by the United States-Japan Trade Council of Washington, D.C.

In 1966, the year of the survey, Alaska sold products valued at \$38.8 million to Japan. That was \$12.5 million more than in 1965 when a similar survey placed Alaska 19th in sales to Japan.

According to the new survey,

1966 sales to Japan created 5,480 jobs for Alaskans.

Top commodities exported to Japan include paper and allied products, \$24 million; lumber and wood products, \$10 million; and agricultural products, \$42 million.

Japan has been the United States' number one overseas trading partner for more than two decades. In the past ten years alone, nearly \$30 billion worth of goods has been exchanged between the two countries. During that period, Japan has bought about \$1 billion more from the U.S. than this country purchased there.

On a per capita basis, every American purchased \$14.97 worth of Japanese imports in 1966, while every Japanese bought American goods worth \$23.37, or nearly 60 per cent more.
