ANCHORAGE: A proposal to recind the garbage burning ordinance passed last week by the Borough Assembly was defeated, after being introduced by Assemblyman Joe Josephson.

The issue is far from dead, however, with the introduction of a whole new ordinance amending the first one by Assemblywoman Hudson.

Mrs. Hudson's ordinance is said to be more liberable than the original one, and more likely to be acceptable to residents of rural areas. It differs from the original ordinance in that it takes the problem of burying garbage out of the jurisdiction of the Borough Health District and hands it over to the Fire protection officials. Therefore, if passed, the ammended ordinance will be enforce only in areas of the Borough that have fire service districts.

Ed Willis, Assemblyman for the Greater Chugiak Area said that he voted to recind the original ordinance, but when it was defeated, he then voted for the ammended ordinance because it gave the residents to be heard in the public hearing which has been scheduled for October 14th. If the ammendment had been defeated, "we would have been stuck with the first one" he said.

Willis added that the only other time he has seen the residents of this area so completely opposed to Borough action was when the merger issue was brought up.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Dear Editor:

Upon your invitation to discuss the upcoming school bond proposition with your readers, I immediately jotted down some notes regarding the some notes regarding the known fact that the Chugiak Eagle River and Birchwood areas are scheduled to receive the direct benefits of approximately \$800,000 worth of school construction from a total bond authorization of \$10 million.

But I would not want to be responsible for telling your readers that they should vote for school bonds because their area will be one of the major beneficiaries of the bonds. In some future year a bond issue may appear in which your area will not fell any direct benefits. I would then be caught short with nothing to offer but platitudes about the value of education to a community.

So here is what I've come up with in the way of an appeal to the readers of your newspaper.

1. Anchorage Borough School District enrollment now exceeds the capacity of its school facilities to adequately accept more children. I'm talking about this year or any year. Currently some 25 classrooms are being operated on a rental basis in church basements and meeting rooms and other facilities of a private nature.

2. Granted that the above statement is true, how in the world can we expect to handle 7,000 more children who will be in our schools within five years?

Only through strong local support for school funds to be authorized when required can a fast growing community manage to keep pace with its school needs. As any real estate expert will say, a strong school system contributes to the economic vitality of any neighborhood by enhancing property values and providing public confidence in the adequacy of that neighborhood as a good place to live. And certainly it is true that an inadequate school system would tend to cause lower property values and stifle the potential of a community.

Since the creation of the Anchorage Borough School District only four years ago, the Eagle River, Chugiak and Birchwood communities have received an appropriate share of the District's school dollars in relation to total dollars expended in the entire borough for school construction purposes. These projects include the enlargement of Eagle River Elementary and Chugiak High School, in addition to the complete construction of Birchwood Elementary School.

In regard to the school construction plan which is coupled with the \$10 million school bond Proposition A on the Borough ballot October 1st, Chugiak High School will be upgraded through the construction of a new enlarged Instructional Materials Center and a new vocational education area consisting of homemaking, drafting and some phase of vocational training. The total dollar value of these projects will be about \$560,000. The total value, educationally will be the expanded library and vocational areas, plus the freeing of existing facilities for use as additional classrooms.

Also, Birchwood Elementary School, which opened less than one year ago, will be expanded by the addition of a six-classroom section at a cost of \$280,000. This addition is in line with the school district policy of providing permanent classrooms in areas where definite enrollment trends indicate such facilities are required.

Since your area seems destined to continue rapid growth, I predict that within a decade a full-sized high school will be required to handle the future high school enrollment of the combined Eagle River, Chugiak and Birchwood areas. The modifications planned for the present junior-senior high school are compatible with future construction of a larger high school and conversion of the existing facility to junior high use. There are no plans to require high school students from your area to be bussed into Anchorage to attend classes at a larger high school.

I hope that this statement can be the basis for renewed support of the Anchorage Borough School District, both on a day-to-day basis and in the bond elections ahead.

Voting qualifications: Anyone who is 19 years of age or older, a U.S. citizen, a legal resident of Alaska for one year, a resident of the borough for 30 days, can read or speak English and has never been convicted of a felony or been judicially determined incompetent may vote in a borough election.

In addition, only those otherwise qualified voters whose names are on the real property tax roll of the borough may vote on borough bond propositions. Anyone whose qualifications to vote is questioned may vote a challenged ballot by signing an affidavit of qualification provided.

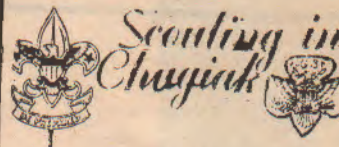
These ballots are sealed into envelopes and held separate for investigation before being submitted to the Assembly for judgement and tally with the absentee ballots on the Thursday after the election.

Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area will vote on candidates for the Borough School Board, electing two for three year terms and one for the one year remaining unexpired of Keith Lesh's term. They will also vote on a proposition for non-area-wide library power for the borough.

Those whose names are on the real property tax roll will vote on a \$10,000,000 school bond proposition and an \$8,000,000 capital improvements bond proposition. The school bond proposition has been adequately publicized; but not much has been said about the capital improvements bonds. These bonds will be General Obligation bonds of the borough to provide a revolving capital fund for capital fund for road and drainage improvements in Improvement Districts. The bonds are to be paid off by assessments within the districts benefiting from the improvement.

The polls will be open from 7am to 8pm. Unregistered voters may register at the polling place on election day.

Anyone who expects to be out of the area on election day may come in to the Clerk's office at 104 Northern Lights Blvd. in Anchorage and vote absentee ballot. Ballots may be delivered to anyone in the hospital or confined to home by illness on election day. A call for delivery to a hospital should be to 277-9566 Ext. 54. For delivery to a home, call 688-2259.

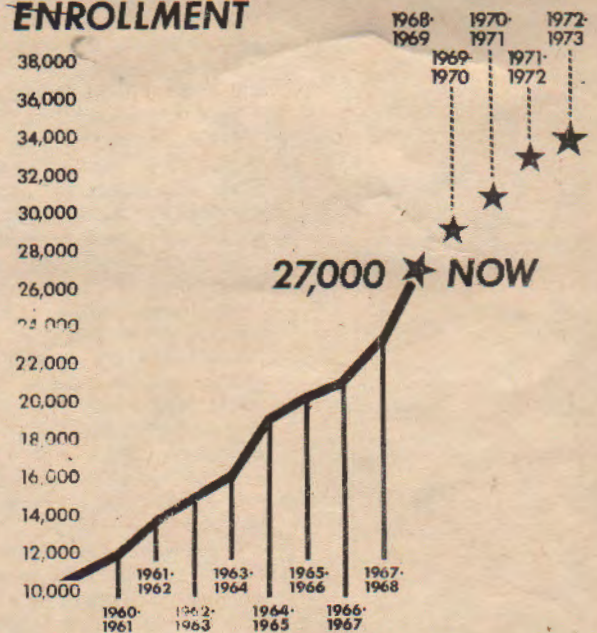

Because of the required "lead" time in the planning of construction projects, particularly secondary facilities your School Board recommends Proposition A as the essential first step in the capital improvement program which is required over the course of the next several years to meet the educational needs of the young people living in the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School District.

* As of September 13, 1968, there were already 26,106 full-time equivalency pupils enrolled. For financial and classroom planning reasons, two kindergarten pupils are counted as one full-time pupil. Actual enrollment on September 13 was over 27,000 different pupils and the projection for 1972-73, including the kindergarten youngsters, exceeds 4,000.

Letter to the Editor:

Next Tuesday, October 1st, Greater Anchorage Borough voters will elect one school board member to serve one year and two to serve three year terms.

Concern over some administrative policies and the ballooning costs of the Educational demands, costs of which are being supported on our narrow property tax base, has brought out a slate of seventeen candidates for the three school board seats.

At the conclusion of a recent public meeting at which each of the school board candidates gave a brief resume of his qualifications and reasons for seeking a board seat it was not difficult to reduce the choice to five or six. For the one-year term, Fredrick Johnson of Chugiak offers on my score board the only competition to Loren Lounsbury of Anchorage and for the two three-year terms, Conrad Krouse of Birchwood needs only to be concerned with candidates Rev. Richard Gay, incumbent, and Mrs. Lowell Thomas Jr., both of Anchorage.

There are some in our community who apparently do not wholly agree with the views and philosophy of our only candidate seeking the three-year term and who urge as an alternative that we make our selection from the candidates representing the Anchorage Area.

Do these critics who for some reason did not offer themselves as candidates now suggest and realistically believe that better representation can be expected from a non-area school board member from a resident tax paying candidate familiar with and concerned with our local school problems?

Lacking local representation on the school board last year we got no commitments from the administration for solution of our unique local school problems. What can we expect in the future without a local representative to plead our case?

The first hour of each Men's night will be devoted to the younger boys, and the remainder of the evening to the adults. After a month of open play, teams will be organized to form a basketball league.

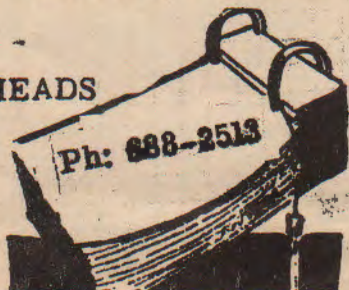

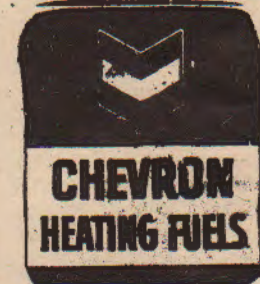
