The meeting starts at 7:30pm and everyone is urged to come and bring a friend to share in these community affairs.

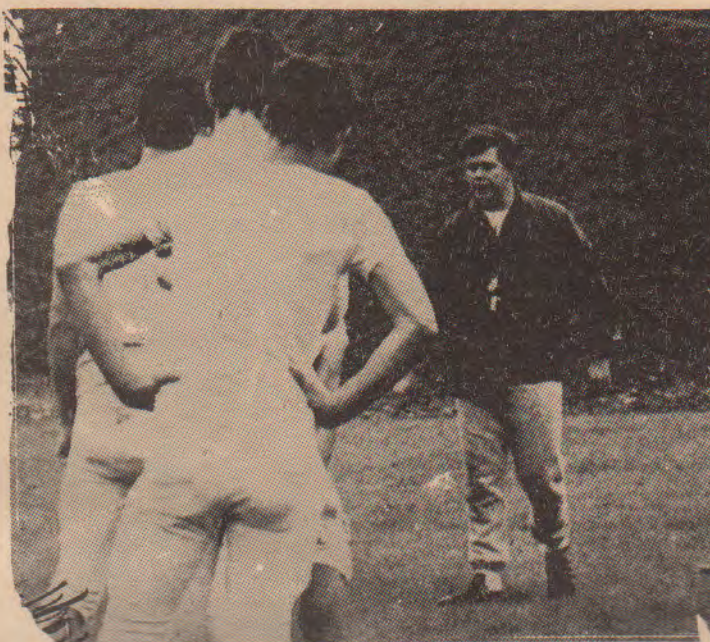
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## FIRE COMPANY TO CONDUCT DRIVE

## SCHOOL BUDGET CUT STAYS

ANCHORAGE: A school bonding proposition in the amount of \$10 million will be placed before the Greater Anchorage Borough voters in the Borough general election October 1, 1968.

The proposal will be the first financing phase of a five-year construction program which could total \$31 million or more, depending upon pupil enrollment growth factors experienced over the period.

Dr. Carlisle Kramer, superintendent of the fast-growing Borough school system, said today he would move ahead with planning for all school construction as outlined in the present master building program "even though we must do some changing in regard to the timing of our financing plans."

The Anchorage Borough School Board met with the Borough Assembly Thursday to explain why members had asked the Assembly to reconsider the Board's original request for a \$15 million bonding proposition on the October ballot. After lengthy discussion regard Assembly feeling that a larger bonding proposition might fail to win voter

ANCHORAGE: A former Chuglak High School teacher and her son are in Providence Hospital, the victims of an accident which took place near the Claxton Drop Zone on the Glenn Highway last Saturday afternoon.

The teacher is Mrs. Patricia Cahill who now resides in Kenai. Mrs. Cahill and her son William Patrick had been visiting in the Chuglak Area and were driving back to Kenai when the accident took place. Bill, age 15, was the driver of the Ford Econoline, according to the Alaska State Troopers. The Cahill car struck a 1960 Cadillac driven by William W. Harper of Elmendorf AFB. According to the State Police, the Harper car had slowed prior to turning into the Claxton Drop Zone Road when the Cahill car struck the front end. The Harpers were traveling north at the time.

Mrs. Cahill and her son were taken to the 504th Air Force Hospital and later transferred to Providence Hospital in Anchorage. Mrs. Cahill, whose condition is listed as fair, is suffering from compound fractures of both legs. She will be hospitalized for some time, as she underwent immediate surgery, and additional surgery is indicated. Her son, whose condition is listed as serious, also suffered compound fractures of both legs and possible internal injuries.

Damage to both cars was estimated at \$1500.00 each. The State Police have not issued any citation pending further investigation.

Also hospitalized with abrasions and lacerations were passengers in the Harper vehicle, Mary Jo Harper and Wanda Jo Harper.

Hospital officials stated that Mrs. Cahill is able to receive visitors.

The October ballot outside the city of Anchorage will carry the following proposition: "Shall the Greater Anchorage Area Borough exercise on a nonarea-wide basis, in the area outside the cities, the powers and functions concerning libraries given to cities of the first class under the laws of the State of Alaska at a mill levy not to exceed one-third mill through the fiscal year 1973?" This issue was placed on the ballot by the Borough Library Study Committee and the Borough Library Board, to meet several evident needs:

1. The imminent end of Federal support for the Chugiak-Eagle River library, which could be forced to close.

2. The narrow base of support for our two major libraries, Loussac, and Spenard Community. Only City and Spenard district taxpayers now contribute, although all residents are served. This narrow base makes expansion nearly impossible after federal funds are exhausted.
3. The lack of service to large and growing population centers especially in the South-Southeast area of the Borough.
4. The fact that American Library Association standards show us to be already behind in the library services we should have for a community this size. The high educational standards of the area, the rapid increase in printed matter (so called "knowledge explosion") and the advancing technology of our civilization, point to a need for more libraries. We are anxious to see them keep pace with other areas of development in our Borough.

What can we expect if the proposition is passed? Current-

- ly the most efficient and economical means of providing these services is being explored. We feel that the Anchorage area is really one unit, as far as library service is concerned, and hope to build a stronger system by actively pursuing these priorities.
1. Maintaining the level of service at Chugiak-Eagle River.
  2. Expansion and possible relocation of the Spenard Community Library.
  3. A new branch in the South-Southeast area.
  4. Obtaining services of special personnel such as a children's librarian.

The resources of this expanded system would be available to all residents of the Borough. For example, book collections would rotate, giving strength to a much larger system to all units. We do not feel that any present service would be diluted.

The cost is fixed at one-third mill maximum for the next 5 years. It would not necessar-

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**ALASKA HIGHWAY  
FUND SIGNED**

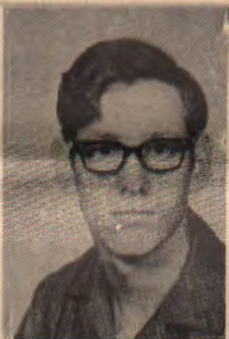
Senator Ernest Gruening has announced that savings of \$438,000 a year in State of Alaska matching requirements under the federal aid highway program are achieved under the federal aid highway act of 1968, which was recently signed into law by President Johnson.

Senator Gruening, who was a member of the conference committee which worked out the final version of the highway act, said it provides for extension of the definition of nontaxable land within each state as it is computed to determine federal aid highway matching requirements.

The new provision adds 27,647,079 acres of national forests and national parks and monuments to the total of federal lands already designated in the formula which do not count against state matching. In fiscal year 1969 this will save the state \$438,000.

Alaska enjoys the maximum matching advantage available to any state, with 95 per cent of the funds spent on federal aid highways in Alaska being provided by the federal government and only five per cent by the state.

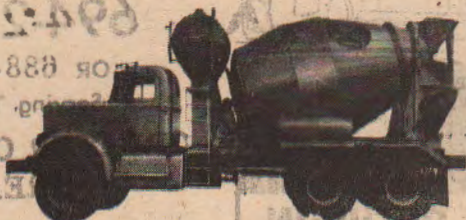


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# Tell it to Martha

**LOCAL MAN FILES FOR SCHOOL BOARD**

CHUGIAK: Conrad Kruse, a resident of the Birchwood area of Chugiak is apparently the only local man to file for the GAAB School Board in the October election.

Kruse, who has been in Alaskan educational field since 1955, is presently working as a financial consultant with International Securities Corp.

He taught for the Juneau-Douglas Independent School District in 1955-56, in the Bristol Bay area 1956-62 and at the Eagle River School 1962-63. He was one of the faculty of the new Chugiak High School in 1965 and 66.

Kruse is married and the father of three boys aged 10, 8 and 5. He has lived in the Chugiak area since 1963.

Last year he was a member and Chairman of the school advisory committee. A locally elected group whose purpose it was to investigate the educational needs of the Greater Chugiak Area.

Kruse stated, "While I am no longer teaching, I have remained vitally interested in our educational system, in part because I have three sons whose future is largely dependent upon same."

"Even though this is an elective position, I have no political aspirations. I simply feel that I very definitely have something to contribute to the working of a school board and am willing to give freely of my time and effort, if elected, to provide the greatest possible educational opportunities for the students of our Borough within established budgetary limits."

support, the Assembly affirmed its previous decision to place \$10 million bond issue before the voters in October.

"The School Board and Borough Assembly are in complete agreement relative to the needs of the Anchorage Borough School District. This includes recognition of the need for \$15 million to honor children during the next three years and the need for \$31 million to provide for the needs of the children over a five-year period as projected in the master building and financing plan. In fact, they agreed that \$31 million may prove conservative in light of our present enrollment and the likelihood of future growth in this dynamic metropolitan area," said Dr. Kramer.

He added that the School District would move ahead with planning and construction of projected facilities covered in the initial \$15 million plan even though there is full recognition that the remaining \$5 million of the plan may necessarily be delayed. This plan is a result of the meeting Thursday in which the Board and the Assembly demonstrated agreement as to our construction needs and concern for the appropriate timing for the necessary funding.

Dr. Kramer said the major projects outlined in the first phase of construction include two senior high schools, a junior high school addition, substantial elementary school construction including facilities for Special Education, and upgrading at Chugiak, East and West Anchorage High Schools.

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**WOMAN HURT IN ONE CAR WRECK**

OLD CHUGIAK: A local woman sustained minor injuries in a one car accident which took place on Monday, September 2nd at mile 2 1/2 on the Glenn Highway.

Alona W. Johnson, of Old Chugiak was turning into Needel's Drive from the Glenn Highway when the front wheel of the 1961 Mercury sedan she was driving slipped on the gravel causing the car to slide into the ditch and overturn.

Miss Johnson sustained lacerations. Her vehicle was damaged an estimated \$200.

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**VA TO PAY EXPENSES FOR VETS KIDS**

The Veterans Administration will pay up to \$130 a month to help educate each son and daughter of a deceased veteran who died in service or of a service-connected disability, or of a veteran who has been totally and permanently disabled as a result of honorable service.

These payments are usually provided for sons and daughters between the ages of 18 and 26, M.W. McDonough, manager of the VA regional office in Juneau, said. The program is intended for education beyond the secondary school level, he said, but there are some exceptions. Marriage does not bar this benefit.

An eligible person may receive up to 36 months of schooling—or the equivalent of 36 months if enrolled part time. Monthly payments are lower if the enrollment is for less than full time, and no payment is authorized for less than half time.

Eligible people of legal age may file their own applications for this program with a Veterans Administration office, McDonough said. For minor children, the parent or guardian must file, he added.

Special restorative training may be provided to young men or women unable to pursue an education because of some physical or mental disability. It consists of training such as speech and voice correction, lip-reading, Braille reading and writing and the like.

In some instances, handicapped children may begin a special vocational or restorative course as early as age 14.

More than 125,000 students have been helped in the program since 1956 when it was established.

CHUGIAK: A number of local residents have carried away prizes from the Palmer Fair as was predicted by the Knik Arm Courier last week.

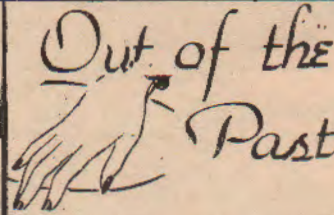

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## VETERANS TO NOTIFY ADDRESS CHANGE

Recipients of veterans' benefits should notify the Veterans Administration office which maintains their records as well as the Post Office Department of any change of address. M. W. McDonough, Manager of the Juneau VA Regional Office, said recently.

About \$1 million in undeliverable checks is returned to the VA each year, he pointed out.

This means that some 12,000 persons miss at least one payment of their monthly compensation, pension, or other VA benefit. In some instances, McDonough said, failure to receive a monthly check from the VA undoubtedly creates a hardship for the family involved.

McDonough said that veterans or their dependents in receipt of VA benefits should also include their file number and ZIP code with their change of address notification to the VA office holding their records.
