

ANCHORAGE: A former Chugiak High School teacher and her son are in Providence Hospital, the victims of an accident which took place near the Claxton Drop Zone on the Glenn Highway last Saturday afternoon.

The teacher is Mrs. Patricia Cahill who now resides in Kenai. Mrs. Cahill and her son William Patrick had been visiting in the Chugiak Area and were driving back to Kenai when the accident took place. Bill, age 15, was the driver of the Ford Econoline, according to the Alaska State Troopers. The Cahill car struck a 1960 Cadalic driven by William W. Harper of Elmendorf AFB, According to the State Police, the Harper car had slowed prior to turning into the Claxton Drop Zone Road when the Cahill car struck the front end. The Harpers were traveling north at the time.

Mrs. Cahill and her son were taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital and later transferred to Providence Hospital in Anchorage. Mrs Cahill, whose condition is listed as fair, is suffering from compound fractures of both legs. She will be hospitalized for some time, as she underwent immediate surgery, and additional surgery is indicated. Her son, whose condition is listed as serious, also suffered compound fractures of both legs and possible internal injuries.

Damage to both cars was estimated at \$1500,00 each. The State Police have not issued any citation pending further investigation.

Also hospitalized with abrasions and lacerations were passangers in the Harper vehicle, Mary Jo Harper and Wanda

The October ballot outside the city of Anchorage will carry the follow-ing proposition: "Shall the Greater Anchorage Area Borough exercise on a nonareawide basis, in the area outside the cities, the powers and fun-ctions concerning libraries given to cities of the first class under the laws of the State of Alaska at a milllevy not to exceen one-third mill through the fiscal year 1973?"

This issue was placed on the ballot by the Borough Library Study Committee and the Borough Library Board, to meet several evident needs:

The imminent end of Federal support for the Chugiak-Eagle River library, which could be forced to close.

The narrow base of sup-THE EDITOR port for our two major libraries, Loussac, and Spenard Community. Only City and Spenard district taxpayers now contribute, although all residents are served. This narrow base makes expansion nearly impossible after federal funds are exhausted.

The lack of service to large and growing population centers expecially in the South-Southeast area of the Borough,

4. The fact that American Library Association standards show us to be already behind in the library services we should have for a community this size. The high educational standards of the area, the rapid increase in printed matter (so called "knowledge explosion) and the advancing technology of our civilization, point to a need for more lib-raries. We are anxious to see them keep pace with other area

of development in our Borough. What can we expect if the proposition is passed? Current-

ly the most efficient and economical means of providing these services is being explored. We feel that the Anchorage area is really one unit, as far as library service is concerned, and hope to build a stronger system by actively pursuing these priorities.

1. Maintaining the level of ser-

vice at Chugiak-Eagle River.' 2. Expansion and possible relocation of the Spenard Com-

Chugiak, Ak munity Library.
3. A new branch in the South-Southeast eara.

Obtaining services of special personnel such as a children's librarian.

The resources of this expanded system would be available to all residents of the Borough. For example, book collections would rotate, giving strength to a much larger system to all units. We do not feel that any present service would be diluted.

The cost is fixed at one-third mill miximum for the next 5 years. It would not necessar-



ALASKA HIGHWAY FUND SIGNED

Senator Ernest Gruening has announced that savings of \$438,-000 a year in State of Alaska matching requirements under the federal aid highway program are achieved under the federal aid highway act of 1968, which was recently signed into law by President Johnson.

Senator Gruening, who was a member of the conference committee which worked out the final version of the highway act, said it provides for extension of the definition of nontaxable land within each state as it is computed to determine federal aid highway matching requirements.

The new provision adds 27, 647,079 acres of national forests and national parks and monuments to the total of federal lands already designated in the formula which do not count against state matching. In fiscal year 1969 this will save the state \$438,000.

Alaska enjoys the maximum matching advantage available to any state, with 95 per cent of the funds spent on federal aid highways in Alaska being provided by the federal government and only five per cent by the state.



CHUGIAK: Conrad Kruse, a resident of the Birchwood area of Chugiak is apparently the only local man to file for the GAAB School Board in the October election.

Kruse, who has been in Alas-kan educational field since 1955, is presently working as a financial consultant with International Securities Corp.

He taught for the Juneau-

Douglas Lidependent School Dis-trict in 1955-56, in the Bristol Bay area 1956-62 and at the Eagle River School 1962-63. He was

one of the faculty of the new Chu-giak High School in 1965 and 66. Kruse is married and the fath-er of three boys aged 10, 8 and 5. He has lived in the Chugiak area since 1963.

Last year he was a memberand Chairman of the school advisory committee. A locally elected group whose purpose it was to

investigate the educational needs of the Greater Chugiak Area.

Kruse stated, "While I am no longer teaching, I have remained vitally interested in our educational system, in part because I have three sons whose future is largely dependent upon same.

"Even though this is an elective position. I have no political aspirations — I simply feel that I very devinitely have something to contribute to the working of a school board and am willing to give freely of my time and effort, if elected, to provide the greatest possible educational opportunities for the students of our Borough, within established budgetary limits."





Recipients of veterans' benefits should notify the Veterans Administration office which maintains their records as well as the Post Office Department of any change of address, M. W. McDonaugh, Manager of the Juneau VA Regional Office, said

recently.

About \$1 million in undeliverable checks is returned to the VA each year, he pointed out.

This means that some 12,000

persons miss at least one payment of their monthly compensation, pension, or other VA benefit. In some instances, McDonaugh said, failure to receive a monthly check from the VA undoubtedly creates a hardship for the family involved. McDonaugh said that veterans

or their dependents in receipt of VA benefits should also include their file number and ZIP code with their change of address no-tification to the VA office hold-

ing their records.
