

## PETITIONS TO GO TO GOVERNOR

**EAGLE RIVER:** Petitions with 702 signatures are being sent to the office of Governor Keith Miller, in an attempt to prove to him that the concern over the highway fences goes beyond a handful of Eagle River businessmen.

Although the petitions were out less than a week, local residents who were circulating these petitions had no trouble in getting signers.

Of those who were approached by petitions carriers only about 20 declined to sign, which made only 1 or 2 percent opposed to the petitions, one of the petitioners remarked.

Glenn Briggs, who has been acting as spokesman for the local people, said that he attended the Monday night meeting of the Borough Assembly to ask them to try to intervene with the Governor and get him to reconsider his stand.

Chairman, John Asplund, who was scheduled to go to Juneau to attend a convention of Borough Chairmen, was requested by the Assembly to meet with Governor Miller, and persuade him to have Commissioner of Highways Beardsley meet with the local people and attempt to arrive at a compromise solution.

**ONLY HALF THE STORY**

In all of the reports which have appeared in the Anchorage papers and from the Governor's Office over the highway fence controversy, only one half of the story has been told.

While the proposed fence at the Eagle River end of the road has attracted the most attention, there was no reason to completely ignore the fact that local residents are objecting just as strongly to the proposed fence which is planned across the road just north of the Peters Creek bridge.

All reference in the Anchorage press, and in news releases from the Department of Highways and the Governor's Office have been about the fence at Eagle River, and the traffic hazard it may or may not create. However, the other fence has been treated as

though the problem did not exist.

The problem does exist, and it is just as much of concern to the business establishments in the Old Chugiak and Fire Lake areas as the other fence is to those in Eagle River.

We have counted fifteen (15) places of business along the highway in the Old Chugiak and Fire Lake Areas. Three of them are gift shops, two are restaurants and two service stations, all of which are dependent on other than local highway traffic for their existence.

The unfair aspect of the whole thing is the failure of the highway department to even hint to local residents that they proposed to close off the road with fences.

If they had known that the

fences were planned, would Mr. and Mrs. Zoltan Preg of Birchwood have purchased the Chief Chugiak Gift Shop last month? Would Art Wallace of Fuji gifts have planned enlarging his business if he had any idea that his popular establishment would no longer be accessible to highway trade? And would Frank Mullins, whose F & L Service was put out of business in Birchwood when the new road went in have gone to the expense of relocating at Mile 20 if he had known that he was going to be once again put out of business by the Department of Highways?

Also, what about the Peters Creek Campground. This is maintained by the State of Alaska for the benefit of visitors. The campground entrance lies on the stretch of road which will be blocked off by the fence, and very few if any visitors will ever know it is there.

Whatever reasons Mr. Matlock and his bunch have for justifying the fence at Eagle

river, there is no reason for them to assume that the identical situation exists at the Peters Creek end. The situations are not carbon copies of each other, and they should be considered separately, not lumped together as they apparently have been doing.

The existing Glenn Highway could be kept open as a one way road southbound without causing any traffic hazard, and this would allow visitors access to the Peters Creek Campground and also to drive through the Chugiak area if they should choose to.

We question just how safety minded the Highway Department Engineers really are with regards to this new road project. How many of you have driven down the Birchwood Loop past the Birchwood Elementary School lately? We would like to hear their justification of that hairpin curve they have built into the road at that point.

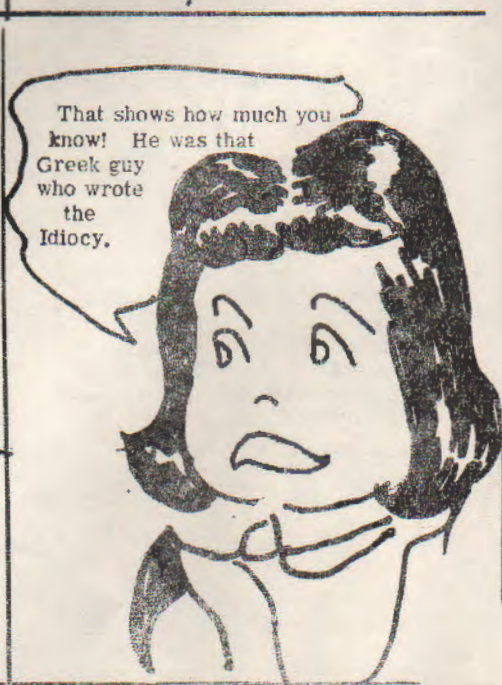

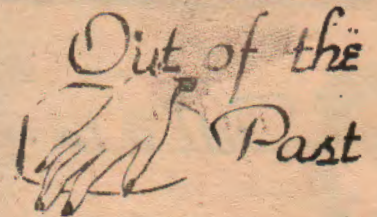

### OFFENSIVE MAIL WORRIES STEVENS

Alaska Senator Ted Stevens  
says he is growing increasingly  
concerned that the residents of  
Alaska have been receiving un-  
wanted and offensive obscene  
and pornographic material  
through the mails.

Stevens has urged that any-  
one found violating federal laws  
in sending this material to Al-  
aska should be prosecuted in  
Alaska.

"I have been in communica-  
tion with Doug Bailey, Alaska's  
U. S. Attorney, and he has as-  
sured me of his willingness to  
prosecute cases of this type  
where sound and substantial  
evidence is available," Stevens  
said.

The Republican senator for  
Alaska said that he has co-spon-  
sored several bills that will  
make dissemination of these  
materials more difficult and less  
profitable.

"There is absolutely no reason  
for anyone not wanting obscene  
or pornographic material to be  
subjected to receiving such  
trash in the mail," Stevens  
said.



### NEW PARK SUPER HIRED

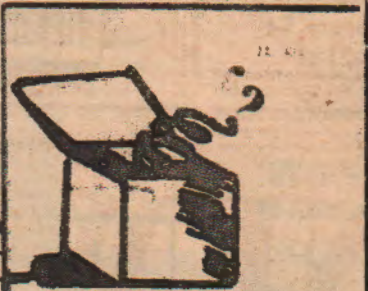
Ernest J. Borgman, who work-  
ed his way through college as  
a seasonal laborer in the Nation-  
al Park Service, was nam-  
ed superintendent of Mount  
McKinley National Park, suc-  
ceeding George A. Hall, pres-  
ent superintendent.

The announcement was ma-  
de by John A. Rutter, North-  
west District Director of the De-  
partment of the Interior's Nation-  
al Park Service.

Borgman has been super-  
tendent of Padre Island Nati-  
onal Seashore, Texas, since Fe-  
bruary, 1966.

Mount McKinley Nation-  
al Park is one of the nation's la-  
rest, with 1,939,492 acres conta-  
ing spectacular glaciers and a  
undant wildlife, and 20,320-ft  
Mount McKinley itself is the  
highest point in North America.

Born at Moose, Wyo. Nov.  
1927, Borgman obtained a  
bachelor's degree in biology  
at the University of Washington  
in 1949 while working summers  
in the parks. Following U.S. Army  
service in Korea, he served  
as a park ranger in Shenandoah  
National Park, Virginia, from  
1953 through 1955, and as a  
district ranger at Everglades Na-  
tional Park, Florida, from 1955  
to 1960. He was chief ranger  
at Virgin Islands National Park  
from 1961 to 1963 when he was  
assigned to Padre Island. He is  
married, with two children.

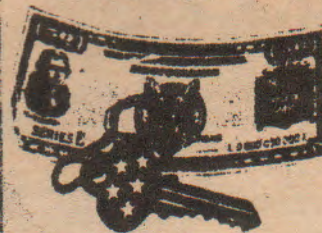

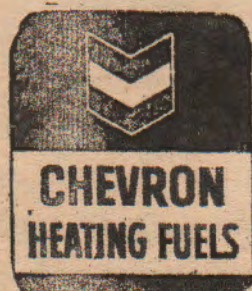

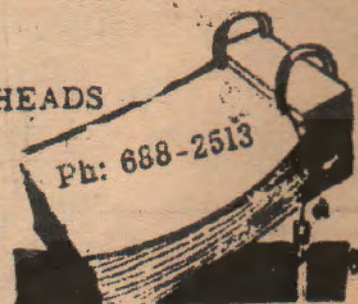
