Glenn Briggs, who has been acting as spokesman for the acting as spokesman for the local people, said that he attended the Monday night meeting of the Borough Assembly to ask them to try to intervene with the Governor and get him to reconsider his stand.

Chairman, John Asplund, who was scheduled to go to Juneau to attend a convention of Borough Chairmen, was requested by the Assembly to meet with Governor Miller, and persuade him to have Commissioner of Highways Beardsley meet with the lox al people and attempt to arrive at a compromise solution.

ONLY HALF THE STORY

In all of the reports which have appeared in the An orage papers and from the Governor's Office over the highway fence controversy, only one half of the story has been told.

While the proposed fence at the Eagle River end of the road has attracted the most attenion, there was no reason to ompletely ignore the fact hat local residents are objecting just as strongly to the proposed fence which is planted across the road just north of the Peters Creek bridge.

All reference in the Anchorage press, and in news releases from the Department of Highways and the Governors Office have been about the fence at Eagle River, and the traffic hazard it may or may not create. However, the other fence has been treated as

though the problem did not ex-

The problem does exist, and it is just as much of concern to the business establishments in the Old Chugiak and Fire Lake areas as the other fence is to those in Eagle Riv-

er.
We have counted fifteen (15) places of business along the highway in the Old Chugiak and Fire Lake Areas. Three of them are gift shops, two are restaurants and two service stations, all of which are dependent on other than local highway traffic for their existance.

The unfair aspect of the whole thing is the failure of the highway department to even hint to local residents that they proposed to close off the road with fences.

If they had known that the

fences were planned, would Mr. and Mrs. Zoltan Preg of Birchwood have purchased the Chief Chugiak Gift Shop last month? Woul Art Wallace of Fuji gifts have planned enlarging his business if he had any idea that his popular establishment would no longer be accessable to highway trade? And would Frank Mullins, whose F & L Service was put out of business in Birchwood when the new road went in have gone to the expense of relocating at Mile 20 if he had known that he was going to be once again put out of business by the Department of Highways?

Also, what about the Peters Creek Campground. This is maintained by the State of Alaska for the benefit of visitors. The campground entrance lies on the strecth of road which will be blocked off by the fence, and very few if any visitors will ever know it is there.

Whatever reasons Mr. Matlock and his bunch have for justifying the fence at Eagle kiver, there is no reason for them to assume that the identical situation exists at the Peters Creek end. The situations are not carbon copies of each other, and they should be considered separately, not lumped together as they apparently have been doing. The existing Glenn Highway

The existing Glenn Highway could be kept open as a one way road southbound without causing any traffic hazard, and this would allow visitors access to the Peters Creek Campground and also to drive through the Chuglak area if they should choose to.

We question just how safety minded the Highway Department Engineers really are with regards to this new road project. How many of you have driven down the Birchwood Loop past the Birchwood Elementary School lately? We would like to hear their justificatin of that hairpin curve they have built into the road at that point.


