



LAST APPEAL FAILS - FENCES TO GO UP

EAGLE RIVER: Glenn Briggs who has been acting as a spokesman for the local residents in the dispute over the highway fencing, returned from Juneau last week with the news that the battle has been lost.

Briggs, who had visited Juneau earlier in the month to confer with Governor Miller, made the second trip in hopes that Highway Commissioner Beardsley would consider re-examining the road design and try to come up with another plan which would be less objectionable to local residents.

Briggs said that he had written to Governor Miller asking that Commissioner Beardsley be allowed to come to this area and meet with some of the local people. Briggs was informed that the Commissioner could not make the trip, but that he would be available for a conference in Juneau.

Briggs said that he made the trip as a last ditch hope. He took with him the petitions with over 700 signatures opposing the fences as well as a map showing both ends of the highway. Briggs also brought a list of nine of the most prominent examples in the local area of where the slip ramp type of design has been used. These examples are: East 5th Avenue - Airport Heights - Mt. View Drive; East 6th Avenue - East 5th Avenue junction; 15th Avenue - L Street; Minnesota By-Pass - Hill Crest Drive southbound; Minnesota By-Pass - Spenard Road Northbound; Glenn Highway - Ft. Richardson northgate; Seward Highway - Seward Highway By-pass and East 36th Ave; Palmer By-Pass - Main Street; Old Palmer Highway - new Palmer Highway North end and Eklutna Flats. Briggs said that these are the most prominent examples, but many others exist around the Anchorage Area.

Earlier in the dispute the Highway Department had made the statement that the slip ramp is a very dangerous design and is almost never used.

Briggs said that when he pointed out these examples to Beardsley he said that these cases were "different" from the local problem, but was apparently unable to explain how they were different and why the slip-ramp would be dangerous in the present case but was not in any of the others.

Beardsley then dismissed Briggs with an offhand state-

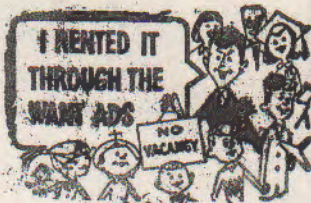
There will be a big double feature for all to see, sponsored by the local Cub Scout Pack.

## THAT WASN'T WHAT WE MEANT

Apparently a poor choice of phrasing in our last week's editorial led some of our readers to get an incorrect interpretation of our suggestion of an alternate to the highway fence at the Peters Creek junction of the new and old highways.

When we suggested that the existing Glenn Highway could be made one way southbound, we were referring to a one way access just north end of Peters Creek bridge. Local residents have accepted defeat at this time, and now are waiting their opportunity to look for new help at the ballot box.

ment that "they might look the situation over again in the spring."

Briggs said that he was particularly disappointed in the lack of support from the Borough Assembly. He felt that Assembly had only made a

token gesture in their resolution to ask the Governor to consider the needs of the Chugiak Area residents, one which even the Governor knew he was not expected to take seriously.

"If they had put any real pressure on the Highway Department", Briggs said, "it would have been an entirely different story." He added that he felt the Borough should be more concerned with the needs of the rural areas. He pointed out that the Borough would in the end also lose by this by the loss of tax monies caused by the reduced property valuation.

"We're going to keep a running record of how this is going to effect the community", Briggs concluded. "Next spring we should have some facts to show them that they can't ignore."

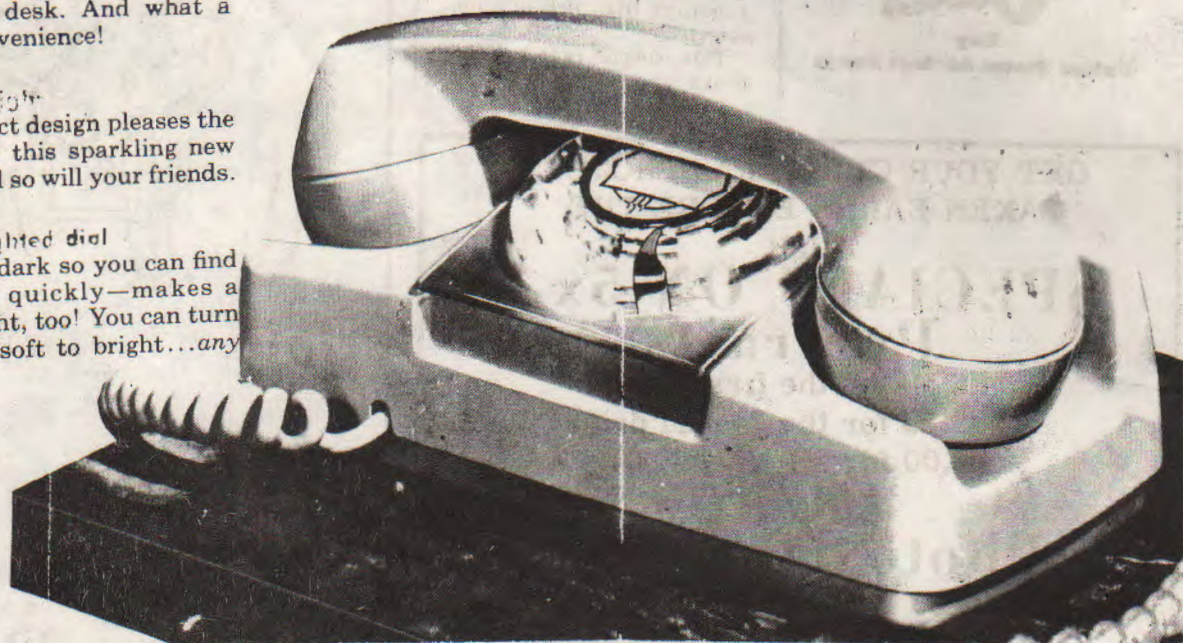

## HEALTH DEPT. BARS CARPETS IN BARS

**ANCHORAGE:** The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Health Department has recently experienced difficulties with a number of local bars and restaurants which have installed carpets in their food and drink preparation areas.

The Department wishes to advise all local bars and restaurants that the use of such material in food and drink preparation areas is specifically prohibited by Borough Ordinance.

The individual selling the materials normally indicates that they are approved for use in Hospitals and further that they are used in restaurants and bars throughout the "South 48". The Health Department has checked this claim through a number of sources and has not found any areas where carpets are allowed in food or drink preparation areas.

The Public Health reasoning behind the prohibited use of carpets in these areas is the difficulty in removing food particles and bacterial organisms that might become embedded in the carpets.

The Health Department urges restaurant and bar owners to check with the Health Department before making any modifications to their establishments to insure that the modifications are in compliance with state and local ordinances.

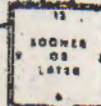

Local residents are urged to welcome these dedicated youngsters when they show up at the door on Halloween, and help them to help the less fortunate children of the world.

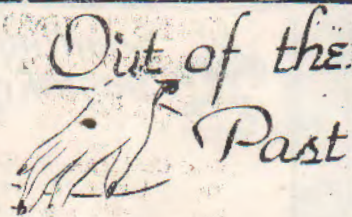

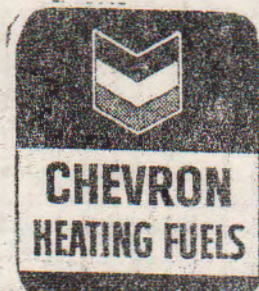

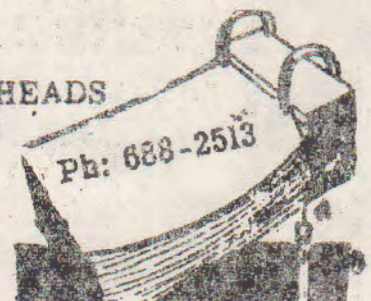
