

BPR AID SOUGHT ON ROAD FENCE PROBLEM

EAGLE RIVER: A report on the progress of local bus-inessmen to get the Department of Highways to change their plans to fence off the existing Glenn Highway at Eagle River and Peters Creek was made this week by Glenn Briggs, spokesman for the local group.

Briggs said that Harland Davis, attorney for the group has written a detailed letter to Harold Tipton, Division En-gineer for the Federal Bureau of Public Roads in Juneau, In his letter, Davis outlined

the entire problem, and in-cluded sketches of the exist-ing plans of the Department of Highways along with alternate suggestions of how the road could be kept open at both ends and still avoid being a traffic

H & H REPORTS BREAK-IN

EAGLE RIVER: Mrs. Hildeman, of H & H Nursery Supply, reported a break-in at their Eagle River Store.

Mrs. Hildeman stated that the break-in had apparently taken place sometime on Tues-

day, September 30th.
Missing from the store, (which was closed for the winter) were some tools, and a number of pieces of jewelry.

Mrs. Hildeman said that she suspected juveniles were responsible, and requests par-ents to be on the lookout for any items of jewelry that their children may have been given or have purchased from one of their friends. The jewelry is described as being pendants and bracelets of polished gem stones and aurora crystals.

The State Troopers were notified of the break-in, but according to Mrs. Hildeman, no investigation has yet taken place.

WIND CAUSES LOCAL DAMAGE

CHUGIAK: Several instances of damage as a result of the high winds on Monday night have been reported within the Greater Chugiak Area.

On Lower Fire Lake a Piper Super Cub, was blown over and ended upside down in the water. The plane is owned jointly by Bill Chandler of Eagle River and Nick Steen of Anchorage. Some structural damage was sustained.

Paul Swanson, Chugiak Postmaster reported that the wind was especially strong on Mt. Mckiniey Heights where he lives. He said that the roof was completely blown off of the house of onw of his neighbors. The entire roof and first two tiers of logs of the log home belonging to Richard Halford was neatly lifted off by the wind, and then dropped on their car crushing it. car belonging to another of



YOUTH HURT IN COLLISION

EAGLE RIVER: An Anchorage youth is in Providence Hospital with a broken neck and serious chest injuries following a head-on collision which took place just north of the Eagle River bridge at the point where the new const-ruction joins the Gleun High-

The collision, which took place at approximately 2:50am Sunday morning, was between a 1968 Lincoln Continental, driven by William Reuter of Birchwood, and a 1968 Pontiac GTO, which was registered to a Mrs. Watkins of Anchorage and driven by her son. In addition to the Watkins youth, there were four other passengers in the car, All five sustained injuries, and were taken to Providence Hospital by the local ambulance. 




