



# ED WILLIS RE-ELECTED

**CHUGIAK:** Ed Willis was re-elected to the seat of Borough Assemblyman from Section 1, despite a strongly conducted write in campaign by Glenn Briggs, which apparently was started too late to get off the ground.

Voting in the precincts of the Greater Chugiak Area was heavy for a borough election with a total of 904 votes cast for the five local precincts, plus 277 from the two Muldoon Area precincts which were added to Section 1 this year, bringing the total for the Section of 1,181 votes.

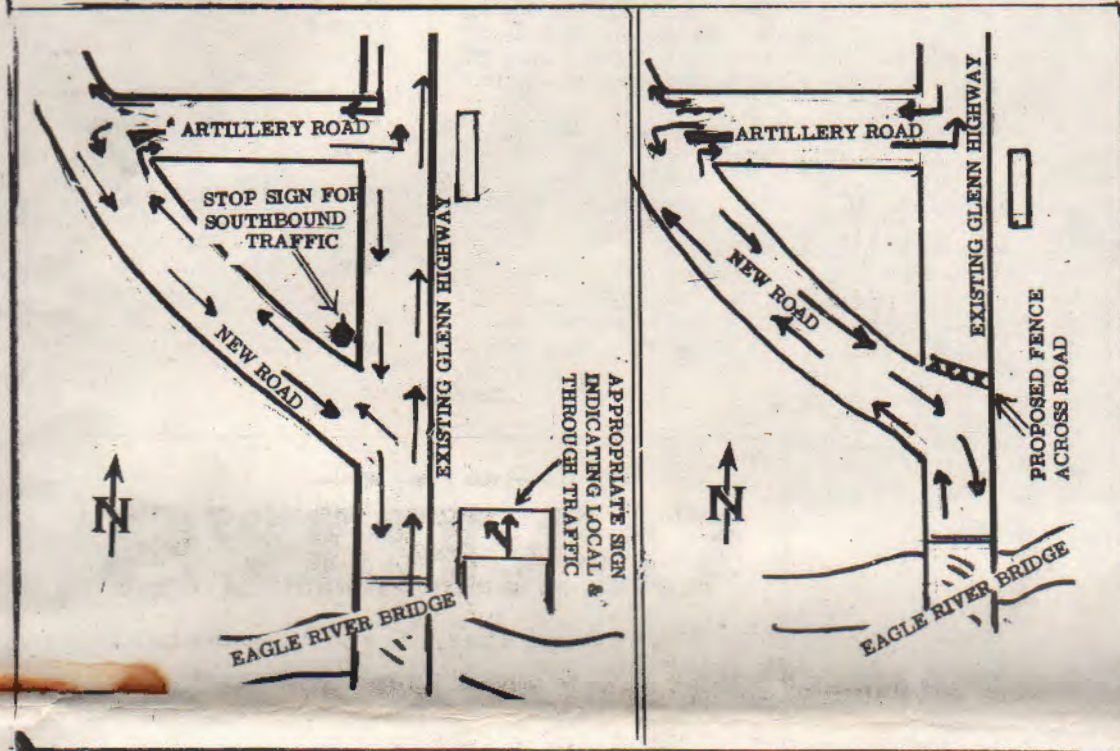

### BPR AID SOUGHT ON ROAD FENCE PROBLEM

**EAGLE RIVER:** A report on the progress of local businessmen to get the Department of Highways to change their plans to fence off the existing Glenn Highway at Eagle River and Peters Creek was made this week by Glenn Briggs, spokesman for the local group.

Briggs said that Harland Davis, attorney for the group has written a detailed letter to Harold Tipton, Division Engineer for the Federal Bureau of Public Roads in Juneau.

In his letter, Davis outlined the entire problem, and included sketches of the existing plans of the Department of Highways along with alternate suggestions of how the road could be kept open at both ends and still avoid being a traffic

**EAGLE RIVER:** Mrs. Al Hildeman, of H & H Nursery Supply, reported a break-in at their Eagle River Store.

Mrs. Hildeman stated that the break-in had apparently taken place sometime on Tuesday, September 30th.

Missing from the store, (which was closed for the winter) were some tools, and a number of pieces of jewelry.

Mrs. Hildeman said that she suspected juveniles were responsible, and requests parents to be on the lookout for any items of jewelry that their children may have been given or have purchased from one of their friends. The jewelry is described as being pendants and bracelets of polished gem stones and aurora crystals.

The State Troopers were notified of the break-in, but according to Mrs. Hildeman, no investigation has yet taken place.

### WIND CAUSES LOCAL DAMAGE

**CHUGIAK:** Several instances of damage as a result of the high winds on Monday night have been reported within the Greater Chugiak Area.

On Lower Fire Lake a Piper Super Cub, was blown over and ended upside down in the water. The plane is owned jointly by Bill Chandler of Eagle River and Nick Steen of Anchorage. Some structural damage was sustained.

Paul Swanson, Chugiak Postmaster reported that the wind was especially strong on Mt. McKinley Heights where he lives. He said that the roof was completely blown off of the house of one of his neighbors. The entire roof and first two tiers of logs of the log home belonging to Richard Halford was neatly lifted off by the wind, and then dropped on their car crushing it. A car belonging to another

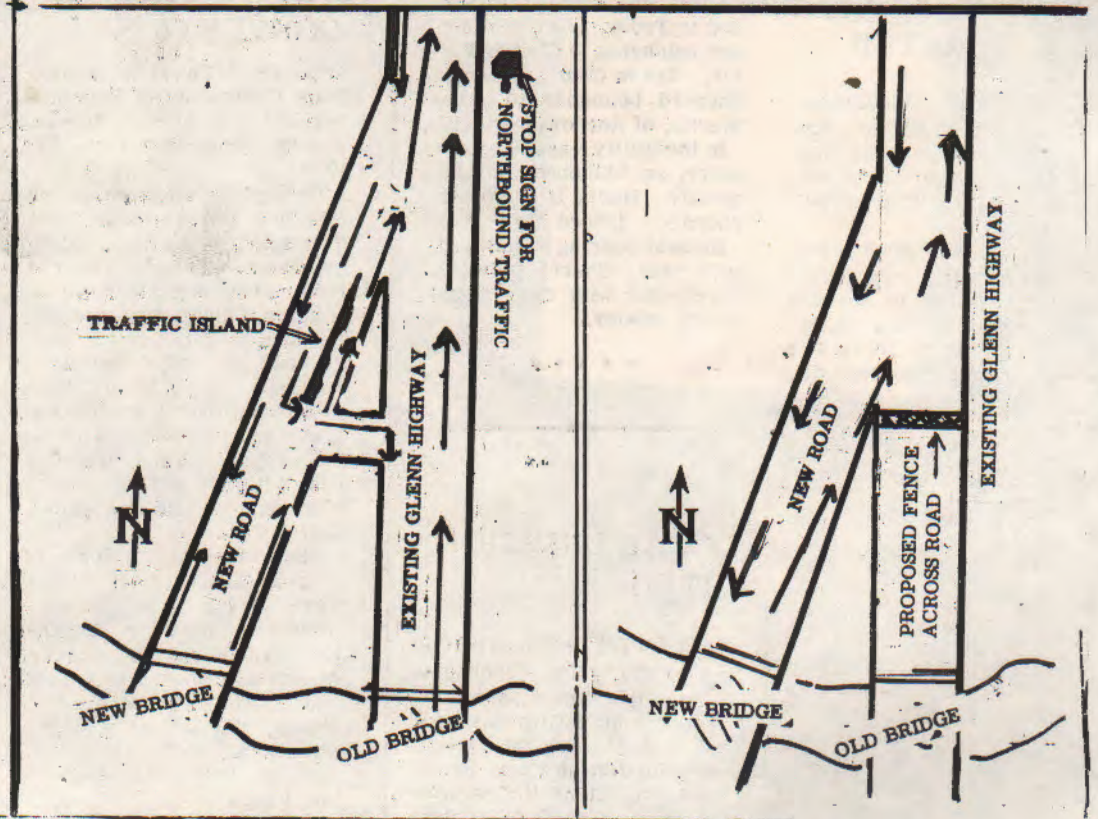
hazard. In his letter, Davis cited the numerous other instances where highway construction had accommodated existing business areas, and included sketches of these intersections, which named the one at Palmer as well as those at Mt. View and the Minnesota By-Pass.

Copies of Davis' letter were sent to Governor Miller, as well as to Senators Mike Gravel and Ted Stevens and to Representative Howard Pollock.

Briggs stated that he has received word from the offices of the members of the congressional delegation that the copies of the letter have been received, and will get the attention of the congressmen at their earliest convenience.

Briggs went on to say that he is concerned at the speed at which the paving is progressing, and that he fears that the contractor will proceed with the erection of the fences before the matter can be considered by the higher authority. He said that this matter is of too much importance to allow that to happen, and he feels that local people should resort to every legal means to prevent this from happening.

## YOUTH HURT IN COLLISION

EAGLE RIVER: An Anchorage youth is in Providence Hospital with a broken neck and serious chest injuries following a head-on collision which took place just north of the Eagle River bridge at the point where the new construction joins the Glenn Highway.

The collision, which took place at approximately 2:50am Sunday morning, was between a 1968 Lincoln Continental, driven by William Reuter of Birchwood, and a 1968 Pontiac GTO, which was registered to a Mrs. Watkins of Anchorage and driven by her son. In addition to the Watkins youth, there were four other passengers in the car. All five sustained injuries, and were taken to Providence Hospital by the local ambulance. The driver of the Pontiac has not yet regained consciousness, and the State Troopers are awaiting this before concluding their investigation of the accident.

Damage to the Pontiac was estimated to be total. The Alaska State Troopers estimated that the Lincoln had sustained \$3500 damage.

Reuter apparently sustained minor injuries which did not require hospitalization.

According to the investigating Trooper, no car appeared to have been exceeding the speed limit.

The authorization would also include bush telephone service to small, isolated communities, including those located in the service areas of local telephone exchanges, subject to mutually satisfactory operating agreements and under such terms as the Commission may set forth.

The Telegraph Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity applied for would authorize RCA Alaska Communications, INC. to offer to the public telegraph services of all types including, but not limited to, agent station telegraph service, message service, marine and costal telegraph services, telegraphic money order service, date communications services, and interconnection and message switching service.

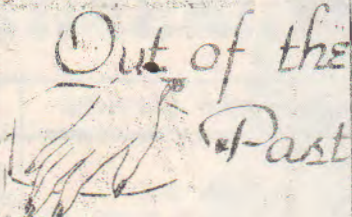
