BRUSH FIRE BURNS OUT OF CONTR

FIRST ACCIDENT AT HIGHWAY FENCE

PETERS CREEK: The first injury to result from the fencing off of the Old Glenn Highway, took place early last Saturday morning when a 1964, Dodge sedan driven by Mrs. Thelma M. Giles of Birch-wook struck the earthen bar-ricade which had been thrown up agross the road just south of the chain line fence at the

Peters Creek end of the road.
Alaska State Troopers, investigating the accident stated that no signs indicating that this was a "dead end road"

were evident.

The accident took place at 1:30am on the morning of November 8th. Mrs. Giles suffered a broken nose, facial lac-erations and bruises. She was taken to Providence Hospital for freatment.

FIRE LAKE: timber fire which was ignited by the contractor for the new highway is now burning out of control along the West side of the Glenn Highway near Low er Fire Lake.

The fire was started by the contractor who is installing the fences along the road. A number of brush piles which had been cut for fence right of way were allowed to burn unattended, and the fire has now spread to the surround-ing trees and undergrowth for approximately one half mile along the road.

In many places the fire has burned deep into the moss and destroyed the roots of trees. Some large trees are now fall-ing down because their roots have been burned away.

Motorists have been complaining that smoke makes the driving visibility very poor at times.

Local residents, alarmed at the situation have stated that they had called both the Chugiak and Eagle River Fire Companies, only to be re-ferred by them to the Bur-eau of Land Management.

A spokesman for the BLM stated that they had offered the State Division of Lands to come in and put out the fire if the State would pay for the service, but had been turned down by the State.

When Mr. Cliff Judkins, of the Borough Health Department was asked if anything could be done on the basis of the new Air Pollution ordinance he stated that the ordinance did not apply to burning for the purpose of clearing land outside of urban areas. He did agree, however, that something should be done to stop the burning, and promis-to look into the matter and see if the Division of Lands could not be persuaded to have

the fire put out.

Last night, (Tuesday) Mr.

Ray Settles, Forest Protection Officer for the Division of Lands made a visual in-spection of the fire, and ad-mitted that it was much more serious than it had been when the matter was first brought to his attention. He stated that he would try

to see if he couldn't get someone from the Department of Highways to see that the fire was put out. He admitted, however, the probably the fastest way to get the blaze extin-guished would be to have the BLM come in with their equipment and then present the bill for fighting the fire to the fence contractor whose neglect was responsible for it.

FIDDLING AROUND WHILE THE FOREST IS BURNING

Everyone appears to be fiddling around while the entire countryside is in danger of burning up. The efforts to place the res-

The efforts to place the responsibility for putting out the brush fire at Lower Fire Lake is the most classis example of the "Old Army Game" that we have seen in many a year.

Last summer, when the firest fire danger was at it's height, just the hint of smoke would have brought al! the fire fighting apparatus in the area to the spot on the double, and after the fire was safely out, then they would try to figure out who was responsible for the blaze.

Things are just as dry now

as they were a rew months ago, just because the thermometer is down around zero doesn't mean that wood and grass won't burn, it only means that fighting the fire is that much more miserable a jnb. Why then let it get so far out of control before deciding that maybe someone should try to put it out?

While State, Federal and Bor

While State, Federal and Bo ough officials are busy passing the buck, a wind could spring up and the entire community be engulfed in flame.

At present, the smoke from the fire is making driving a hazard, and it is a wonder that the poor visibility has not been the cause of accidents.

So far everyone we have talked to has deplored the situation, and agreed that someone should see that the fire is put out. But no one is able to agree on whom that "someone is."

NOT YET A DEAD ISSUE

We had thought that the highway fences would not be a dead issue for editorial material, but the accident which took place at the Peters Creek end of the old Glem Highway last week, has brought to our attention a situation that we feel must be commented upon.

With the Department of Highways prating about "safety" everytime someone voiced an objection to the highway fences, it is unbelieveable that they would overlook anything as important as adequate signs warning the motorist of these feaces.

There is no sign at the intersection of the old Glenn Highway and North Birchwood Loop indicating that this is the way to Palmer, Neither is there any sign to indicate that the Glenn Highway north of the intersection is now a

dead end road, open to local traffic only.

Even after Mrs. Giles unfortunate accident, the only warning signs are temporary ones located only a few hundred feet from the barricade. These are just leaning against saw horses; and could easily be knocked down, or moved by pranksters, leaving the same dangerous situation.

With all the hue and cry that proceeded the erection of the fences, one would think that such an important item such as adequate warning signs would hardly have slipped their minds.

Mrs. Giles told the Knik Arm Courier that she had been returning home, and had missed the turn-off at the North Birchwood Loop. She had not been north of Peters Creek since the new road had been opened, and was unaware of the fence. She had thought to catch the new highway at the top of Peters Creek Hill and

cut back toward Birchwood. She said that there were no signs, nor any warning lights or reflectors to indicate that the road was blocked,

After striking the barricade, Mrs. Giles said that she crawled bleeding from her car, and somehow managed to clime the eight foot chain link fence across the road so that she could flag down a car to ask for help. She said that a car with several teen-agers in it stopped, and took her to Danny's Union 67 Service in Eagle River from which they ealled the Eagle River Volun-teer Fire Company Ambuland she was transported to the bospital.

Damage to the vehicle was estimated at \$1,000.

The highway barricade was the subject of recent protests by citizens of the Greater Chugiak Area. They had requested that the Department of Highways leave the old Glenn Highway open to access at attacher and


