FRIEND OF APOLLO 12 COMMANDER

PETERS CREEK: The Apollo 12 Moon Shot was of special interest to Ed Bellringer of Peters Creek.

The reason for this is that the Commander of this mission, Charles "Pete" Conrad is a personal friend of his, and slightly over three year ago, this man who is now walking around on the surface of the moon was accompanying Bellringer aiong with two of his fellow Astronauts on an Alaskan big game hunt.

Bellringer became close friends with Conrad and the other two spacemen, the late C.C. Williams and Donald K. Slayton, and two years ago, when Bellriager was in Houston attending a Wildlife Convention, Conrad took him on a personally conducted tour of the space center in that city.

The object was first seen by and Mrs. Ed Bellringer of Peters Creek and their three daughters at 7:40pm on Sunday, November 16th when the family was enroute home from Anchorage.

The first sighting was at approximately Mile 13 1/2 on the new Glenn Highway. The object was described as a spherical shaped glowing object which appeared to come up from behind the trees in a southeasterly trajectory and climbed rapidly for a dist-ance and then leveled out and still climbing, veered to the west and went out of sight behind their car.

The object trailed a streamer of fire like the tail of a com-

The Bellringers again sighted the object about five minutes later when their car approched the South Birchwood Loop. Thistime it was traveling in a straight line due North at a low altitude and at jet speed or faster. It soon was out of sight. There were no red or green navigation lights visible as would be seen if it

were an aircraft.
This was not the lighted advertising sign which has been sighted during the past week in the local area, as the sign and its tow plane were in another part of the sky and visible at the same time that the object was sighted the second

Both Mr. and Mrs. Bellring-er are commercial pilots and trained aerial observers.





At a special meeting of the round of Directors of the Eagle River Lions Club, heldlast Sunday afternoon, it was un-animously agreed that the Teen-Age dances held every Fri, evening at the Lions Den be suspended indefinitely effective immediately.

As Pres, of this Lions Club I fe 1 I must add some "Ex-plainitory" facts for the ed-ification of those sincere,

hard-working adult-orientat-ed Teen-Agers who fried so hard to have a good, clean Teen-Age dance. Without be-ing 'pinned down' we would say that about 80% of the teen-

agers who attended these stegory -- and as usual, the minority spoil a good thing for the majority. We asked the 'steering' committee of these dances to devise and set up a set of 'rules' under which they hoped to conduct their dances - following is an ex-act copy of the rules they sub-mitted and which were posted the entrance to the dance

TEEN DANCE RULES
1. Greter Chugiak Area students and guests.

Age limits, 13 thru 19 yrs.

Decent lothing
All trash in CONTAINERS. NOT ON FLOOR,

5. No alcoholic beverage.
6. No smoking, unless 15 or over and approved by parents.
7. No going behind nor sit ing

on outners and tables, No destroying property

9. No fighting

10. No swearing

My compliments to the Teen-Agers who drafted the above rules- could any of you parents have done better,

The next step is 'enforce-ment' and there is where we hit the snag! Just about 60 seconds of concentration will

suffice to prove to all of you parents that you and you alone are the only people in this en-tire community who can phys-ically enforce the actions of your own children! How many of you were interested enough to come down and actually observe the actions of your own children? I could tell you, but I will only say that only a very very few did -- and they were only those who 'suspected' ing in an approved manner and they literally jerked the offenders out and took them home. To these people my sincere thanks--you are the only parents who made any effort to help us keep these dances going according to

the rules. This leaves with a still smaller minority who proceeded in thoroughly violrules 4 - 5 and especiately 8. Actual wilful dest-ruction of property to the extent of \$500 worth of damage in a 2 weeks period simply cannot be tolerated. To all of the parents in this area let me remind you that someone in the teen-age group actually commit ed the above damaging acts, -could it have been your son or daughter? Or, do you assume that because you haven't been presented with a bill that it just couldn't have been your son or daughter? If you had taken advantage of the opportunity to come and ob

serve you just might be more certain that everything is going along 'according to Hoyle'! You mothers, can you be certain that the young lady engaged in pet ing, bordering on obscenity, who had to be told to 'break-it-up' wasn't your daughter? Again, you'll nover know, will you?

In conclusion, remember parents, stopping the dances is not going to stop the undesirable actions of those few who are guilty of depriving that big majority of good clean-living young Amer-cians of their rightful pleasure-they will only move to a new area where you will never be able to 'measure by comparison' until it comes home to you with a forceful jolt, which you could have remedied had you known of the problem sooner. Go to your School Functions--SEE
YOUR CHILD IN ACTION,
They want you to be aware of
their problems. The Teen-Age is your last chance to establish communication.

A final word to the 'Good Guys', or the 80%. You don't get off scot-free either. Did you ever ask your parents to 'drop in' and look around-if they indicated any reservat-ions about your going to the dance? Did you actually repeat, for their information, the 'rules' you were trying to

operate under? Do you discuss with them next morning the good and the bad happenings of the dance or other activity?

The Lions have not abandoned the Teen-Agers Per se: we will continue to try to find something-to-to for those who seek it, Our next project to furnish an 'outlet' for this youthful energy will be snow-mobile races. They will, for the most part be the 'family type' races-boys & girls, Mom & Pop; by age groups; machine classification; etc. These races require lots of manpower which will be furnished by the Lions. I realize I may have made myself quite unpopular (vut I am not runningfor office anyway) but just on the off-chance that someone other than a Lion may ac-tually wish to help in these races--see Lion Tom Slanker, Chairman of the Snowmobile Committee. He will be more than glad to find a spot for you to serve.

PETERS CREEK ICE THREATENS HOME

LOWER PETERS CREEK: The formation of ice dams and galaciers near the mouth of Peters Creek is causing flooding which is threatening some of the homes in the Lower Peters Creek Area.

Porough Assemblyman Ed Willis, in response to the request of a resident whose home is being immediately threatened by the galactering, contacted the Alaska Disaster Office.

A representative of the Alaska Disaster office, along with Willis and a representative of the Army Corps of Engineers, inspected the stream yesterday.

The Engineer admitted that the icing, which is being caused by the current spell of cold weather could, if it continues cause damage to the home of Richard Stoltz, the closest to the creek.

He felt, however, that if the weather should become warmer, as predicted that the

ice could melt.

He stated that he would make daily inspections of the creek and if conditions should become critical, he would advise Willis and Stoltz what action could be taken.

It was explained by a spokesman for the Alaska Disaster Office that they and the Corps of Engineers could take action only if there was a threat to public property.
