## LOCAL BUSINESSMEN FORM ASSOCIATION

**EAGLE RIVER:** An organization to be composed of businessmen from all parts of the Greater Chugiak Area held its initial meeting on Sunday, November 16th at 9:00am in the Lions Den in the Eagle River Shopping Center.

Over 30 people, representing 26 of the local business establishments were in attendance.

With Vern Phillips, of Phil's Texaco Service acting as Chairman, the group discussed the advisability of organizing as a Chamber of Commerce as opposed to a Businessman's Organization. Clyde Clary, of Clary-Pion-a Chamber of Commerce would require a much more complicated Charter, and advised that the group form as a Businessmen's Association, whose aim would be to protect the interests of the residential as well as the business community of the Greater Chugiak Area.

Those present voted to follow Mr. Clary's advice, and an organizational committee whose job it would be to draw up the charter for the Association was elected.

Nominated to the office of chairman of the committee was Vern Phillips, of Vern's Texaco Service, Frank Mullen of F&L Chevron Service in Old Chugiak, Stanley Nickerson of the Lazy Mountain Traller Court, and Clyde Clary.

Clary was elected to the office of Chairman.

Others elected to serve on the Committee were Tom Slanker, of Far North Service, Vern Phillips, Irene Hildeman of H&H Nursery Supply, Marianna Koehler of Great Land Realty, Till Wallace of Wallace and Klondike, and Jesse Wooten of the Eagle River Tastee Freeze.

After the committee has met and formed and laid the ground work for the Association, another general meeting will be called and they will present their recommendations.

Bellringer became close friends with Conrad and the other two spacemen, the late C.C. Williams and Donald K. Slayton, and two years ago, when Bellringer was in Houston attending a Wildlife Convention, Conrad took him on a personally conducted tour of the space center in that city.

### BRUSH FIRE FINALLY OUT

**FIRE LAKE:** The brush fire which had been burning out of control in the Lower Fire Lake Area, is now out, according to a spokesman for the Eagle River Fire Company.

The fire, which had been started by unat ended brush piles which had been cut for the right of way for the fences which parallel the new highway, burned without attention while local, borough, State and Federal agencies attempted to place the responsibility for fighting it.

Responsibility was finally assumed by the Green Construction Company, prime contractor for the new road.

Green hired a tank truck and driver from the Eagle River Fire Company, and supplied the man-power to handle the hoses.

to give a first hand report of having seen one.

The object was first seen by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bellinger of Peters Creek and their three daughters at 7:40pm on Sunday, November 16th when the family was enroute home from Anchorage.

The first sighting was at approximately Mile 13 1/2 on the new Glenn Highway. The object was described as a spherical shaped glowing object which appeared to come up from behind the trees in a southeasterly trajectory and climbed rapidly for a distance and then leveled out and

still climbing, veered to the west and went out of sight behind their car.

The object trailed a streamer of fire like the tail of a comet.

The Bellingers again sighted the object about five minutes later when their car approached the South Birchwood Loop. This time it was traveling in a straight line due North at a low altitude and at jet speed or faster. It soon was out of sight. There were no red or green navigation lights visible as would be seen if it were an aircraft.

This was not the lighted advertising sign which has been sighted during the past week in the local area, as the sign and its tow plane were in another part of the sky and visible at the same time that the object was sighted the second time.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Bellinger are commercial pilots and trained aerial observers.

Members of a local rocketry club were contacted to see if

they were launching any rockets at the time. It was learned that they were not.

Mrs. Cichy took her training in New York City. She is a member of the Board of Directors of the Anchorage Civic Ballet Company.

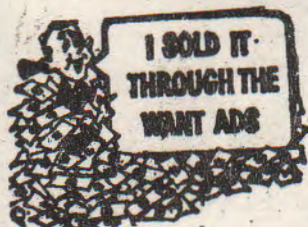

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**



Dear Editor:

At a special meeting of the Board of Directors of the Eagle River Lions Club, held last Sunday afternoon, it was unanimously agreed that the Teen-Age dances held every Fri. evening at the Lions Den be suspended indefinitely effective immediately.

As Pres. of this Lions Club I feel I must add some "Explanatory" facts for the edification of those sincere, hard-working adult-orientated Teen-Agers who tried so hard to have a good, clean Teen-Age dance. Without being 'pinned down' we would say that about 80% of the teen-agers who attended these dances would fall into the above category--and as usual, the minority spoil a good thing for the majority. We asked the 'steering' committee of these dances to devise and set up a set of 'rules' under which they hoped to conduct their dances--following is an exact copy of the rules they submitted and which were posted at the entrance to the dance area.

**TEEN DANCE**

**TEEN DANCE RULES**

1. Greater Chugiak Area students and guests.
2. Age limits, 13 thru 19 yrs.
3. Decent clothing
4. All trash in CONTAINERS, NOT ON FLOOR.
5. No alcoholic beverage.
6. No smoking, unless 15 or over and approved by parents.
7. No going behind nor sitting on counters and tables.
8. No destroying property
9. No fighting
10. No swearing

My compliments to the Teen-Agers who drafted the above rules--could any of you parents have done better.

The next step is 'enforcement' and there is where we hit the snag! Just about 60 seconds of concentration will

suffice to prove to all of you parents that you and you alone are the only people in this entire community who can physically enforce the actions of your own children! How many of you were interested enough to come down and actually observe the actions of your own children? I could tell you, but I will only say that only a very very few did--and they were only those who 'suspected' in an approved manner and they literally jerked the offenders out and took them home. To these people my sincere thanks--you are the only parents who made any effort to help us keep these dances going according to the rules. This leaves with a still smaller minority who proceeded in thoroughly violating rules 4 - 5 and especially 8. Actual wilful destruction of property to the extent of \$500 worth of damage in a 2 weeks period simply cannot be tolerated. To all of the parents in this area let me remind you that someone in the teen-age group actually committed the above damaging acts. -could it have been your son or daughter? Or, do you assume that because you haven't been presented with a bill that it just couldn't have been your son or daughter? If you had taken advantage of the opportunity to come and ob-

serve you just might be more certain that everything is going along 'according to Hoyle!' You mothers, can you be certain that the young lady engaged in petting, bordering on obscenity, who had to be told to 'break-it-up' wasn't your daughter? Again, you'll never know, will you?

In conclusion, remember parents, stopping the dances is not going to stop the undesirable actions of those few who are guilty of depriving that big majority of good clean-living young Americans of their rightful pleasure--they will only move to a new area where you will never be able to 'measure by comparison' until it comes home to you with a forceful jolt, which you could have remedied had you known of the problem sooner. Go to your School Functions--SEE YOUR CHILD IN ACTION. They want you to be aware of their problems. The Teen-Age is your last chance to establish communication.

A final word to the 'Good Guys', or the 80%. You don't get off scot-free either. Did you ever ask your parents to 'drop in' and look around--if they indicated any reservations about your going to the dance? Did you actually repeat, for their information, the 'rules' you were trying to

operate under? Do you discuss with them next morning the good and the bad happenings of the dance or other activity?

The Lions have not abandoned the Teen-Agers Per se; we will continue to try to find something-to-do for those who seek it. Our next project to furnish an 'outlet' for this youthful energy will be snowmobile races. They will, for the most part be the 'family type' races--boys & girls, Mom & Pop; by age groups; machine classification; etc. These races require lots of manpower which will be furnished by the Lions. I realize I may have made myself quite unpopular (but I am not running for office anyway) but just on the off-chance that someone other than a Lion may actually wish to help in these races--see Lion Tom Sianker, Chairman of the Snowmobile Committee. He will be more than glad to find a spot for you to serve.

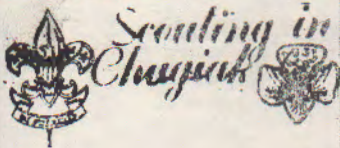

**PETERS CREEK ICE  
THREATENS HOME**

**LOWER PETERS CREEK:** The formation of ice dams and glaciers near the mouth of Peters Creek is causing flooding which is threatening some of the homes in the Lower Peters Creek Area.

Borough Assemblyman Ed Willis, in response to the request of a resident whose home is being immediately threatened by the glaciering, contacted the Alaska Disaster Office.

A representative of the Alaska Disaster office, along with Willis and a representative of the Army Corps of Engineers, inspected the stream yesterday.

The Engineer admitted that the icing, which is being caused by the current spell of cold weather could, if it continues cause damage to the home of Richard Stoltz, the closest to the creek.

He felt, however, that if the weather should become warmer, as predicted that the ice could melt.

He stated that he would make daily inspections of the creek and if conditions should become critical, he would advise Willis and Stoltz what action could be taken.

It was explained by a spokesman for the Alaska Disaster Office that they and the Corps of Engineers could take action only if there was a threat to public property.

## ICY PATCHES CAUSE OF THREE ACCIDENTS

**EAGLE RIVER:** Icy patches  
on the Eagle River Bridge and  
the approaches were the cause  
of three accidents last week,  
according to the Alaska State  
Troopers.  
Two of these accidents took  
place on Saturday, November  
15th.  
At 10:00pm there was a two  
car accident between a 1967  
Chevrolet, driven by Billy  
Derryberry of Anchorage,  
and a 1969 Chevrolet driven by  
Louis Muschio, of Elmendorf.  
According to the Alaska State  
Troopers, Derryberry was  
trying to pass the other car,  
skidded on the icy patch and  
spun around, sideswiping the  
Muschio car, causing it to  
hit the guardrail.  
The Derryberry car was  
damaged an estimated \$600.  
Muschio's vehicle sustained  
an estimated \$800 damage.  
Derryberry was cited for  
basic speed.  
Later that same evening, at  
12:40am, there was another 2

car accident at Mile 13. This  
time, a 1968 Chevrolet, driven  
by Richard Bateman of An-  
chorage was Northbound on  
the Glenn when he lost con-  
trol on the icy bridge and struck  
an oncoming 1960 Pontiac,  
driven by Joyce Kent, of El-  
mendorf.

Both cars were damaged an  
estimated \$100. There were  
no injuries and no citations  
were given.  
The next day, November 16th  
a 1968 Volkswagon, driven by  
Frank A. Dias Jr., of Eagle  
River went out of control on  
the icy bridge and hit one of  
the guardrails, glanced off  
and struck the guardrail on  
the opposite side.  
Damage to the car was es-  
timated at \$800.  
Dias was uninjured, and no  
citation was issued.  
In each of these instances,  
the Alaska State Troopers  
reported that Chugiak REACT  
called in the accidents, and the  
Troopers have asked that this  
dedicated organization be  
commended for their efforts.
