ANCHORAGE: A former Chugiak High student took first place in the Dall Sheep category at the Awards Banquet held by the Alaska Big Game Trophy Club at the Captain Cook Hotel last Saturday evening.

Harvey E. Pullen, of Eagle River, who is presently a student at Anchorage Community College received a medallion for his ram, which was scored at 169-6/8.

Harvey is the third generation of Pullens to have taken a trophy ram from the same area.

Another award winner from the Greater Chugiak Area, was Dennis Harms, industrial arts teacher at Chugiak High School. Harms took 2nd place in the Caribou category, with a score of 421-4/8.

The award winner to come from the greatest distance was Lars Degefors, from Taebly Sweden. Lars took first place in the Moose division. His son Tom, brought the antlers all the way back to Anchorage from Sweden to be displayed at the banquet. The antlers were scored at 239-4/8.

SR. CENTER NEWS

The first All Alaska Conference on Aging and Retirement came to an end Saturday night.

Those who attend all of the day and night sessions were very tired, but very happy to have had the opportunity to take a peek into the future.

Due to the co-ordinated efforts of participating organizations, those in the teaching profession, interested individuals, and politicians who are, and will be responsible for promotion of needed legislation, the conference was very successful.

Not only did we learn of the present projects that have been put in motion to help make life easier for the elderly, but we also were introduced to

new ideas geared to give future benefits to the elderly.

Each person who attended had the opportunity to express their opinions, ask questions, or suggest amendments to the proposals presented to us.

The main points brought up, which are absolute necessities for older persons who wish to spend their retirement years in Alaska were as follows:

Lowering of elderly persons property taxes so that they can afford to live in the home they worked so many years to acquire. The need of ample retirement income to cover the high cost of living in Alaska. Better medical care, such as other states provide, adequate housing, transportation and nursing homes for those who need more care.

A few of the many other needs are provision for outside interests to give purpose to life, such as an opportunity for further schooling, involve-

ment in programs of interest to elderly and a chance to socialize with others in their own age group.

Everyone will one day reach this period in their lives.

These problems will be your problems one day. Now is the time for everyone to support programs for the aging. You may have ample funds now, but unforeseen problems, or rising cost of living could put you in the low income bracket when you are least able to help yourself.

Ill health, lack of training or health problems force many of today's elderly to exist under poverty conditions. Don't let this happen to you.

A bill was introduced that would provide for money to be set aside to be used, not spent to supplement incomes of long time Alaskan residents. It was explained that if appropriated money was spent it would be used up very soon. If the money was used by investing it wisely, in the same manner used by insurance companies, the money would

constantly earn dividends to continually aid the elderly.

This plan as presented would not effect taxes at all.

We have received an application for work from a family who need to earn money to pay for a tractor to replace one lost through an accident on their homestead.

The woman wants waitress, short-order cook, telephone operator or any type of work that she can do and still take care of her family.

The daughter who is fifteen is looking for baby sitting work.

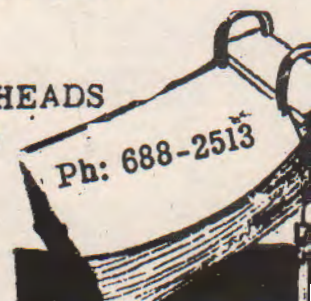

the ground, and the right hand post split. These posts appeared to be at least eight inches in diameter.

The Alaska State Troopers could not find any record of this accident.

A temporary wooden barricade, consisting of several sawhorses had been erected at the point where the guardrail had been standing. It is not known whether the original guardrail had reflectors attached to it.

One local resident was overheard to observe, "They put the dirt pile there to keep anyone from hitting the fence, and then they put the guardrail there to keep them from hitting the dirt".

A second observer replied the guardrail had apparently been removed effectively, as he stated that the car had traveled very far after plowing through the barrier.

The damage to the rail was estimated at around \$200.

I think that both you and your wife should bring your differences up to an adult level.

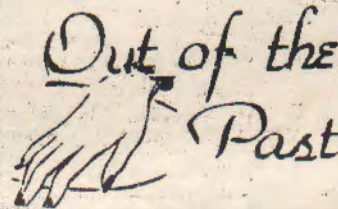
Tell your wife that she is biting off her nose to spite her face by baiting you into striking out at your employer. Anything that effects your career would certainly hurt her too.
