The first All Alaska Conference on Aging and Retirement came to an end Saturday night.

Those who attend all of the day and night sessions were very tired, but very happy to ave had the opportunity to ake a peek into the future.

Due to the co-ordinated efforts of participating organzations, those in the teaching profession, interested indiv-duals, and politicians who are, and will be responsible for promotion of needed legslation, the conference was ery successful.

Not only did we learn of the present projects that have een put in motion to help make ife easier for the elderly, but also were introduced to

new ideas geared to give fut-

e benefits to the elderly. Each person who attended had the opportunity to express their opinions, ask questions, or suggest amendments to the proposals presented to us.

The main points brought up, which are absolute necessities for older persons who wish to spend their retirement years in Alaska were as follows:

Lowering of elderly persons property taxes so that they can afford to live in the home they worked so many years to acquire. The need of ample retirement income to cover the high cost of living in Alaska. Better medical care, such as other states provide, adequate housing, transportation and nursing homes for those who need more care.

A few of the many other needs are provision for ontside interests to give purpose to life, such as an opportunity for further schooling, involvement in programs of interest to elderly and a chance to socialize with others in their own age group.

Everyone will one day reach

this period in their lives. These problems will be your problems one day. Now is the time for everyone to support programs for the aging. You may have ample funds now, but unforseen problems, or rising cost of living could put you in the low income bracket when you are least able to help yourself.

Il health, lack of training r health problems force many of todays elderly to exist under poverty conditions, Don't let this happen to you.

A bill was introduced that would provide for mony to be set aside to be used, not spent to suppliment incomes of long time Alaskan residents. It was explained that if appropriated money was spent it would be used up very soon. If the money was used by investing it wisely, in the same manner used by insurance companys, the money would constantly earn dividends to continually aid the elderly.

This plan as presented would not effect taxes at all.


The body was discovered by one of his neighbors.

The cost is \$13,00 for the season, YMCA membership costs \$10.00 and \$3,00 for in-


Boys should be sure to bring sneakers, as street shoes are now allowed.
