The new Chugiak CHUGIAK: Area By-Pass was opened to traffic on October 31, Hal-loween, with the old Glenn Highway being blocked off at both ends at the same moment,

This new section of highway which is approximately 8,25 miles long, was completed one year ahead of schedule. Charles Matlock District

Highway Engineer, says that he feels that this is in the way of being some kind of record, He credits the efficiency of the Green Construction Company, coupled with the unusually good weather this past summer for this accomplishment,

The new road will now as-sume the name of "Glenn Highway'', with the old road to be referred to as the "Old Glenn Highway" for the time being

Matlock said that in order to avoid having to change mile posts all the way up the Glenn Highway, those on the new section would be adjusted to fit in between mile 13 and mile 22, This might mean that there would not be a full mile between two of the posts. He also said that the mile posts on the "Old Glenn Highway" would would not be removed, and local residents could still refer to them when giving their address. Matlock went on to say that

the Department of Highways was planning to install addit-ional signs at both the north and south Birchwood Loop intersections of the new Glenn Highway indicating the direction to the "Chugiak Area".

When asked if the Highway Department was planning to install any of the standard blue and white signs which indicate that food, phones, gas etc. was available in that direction and how far, he said that this had not been planned, but could be done if the local people wished it.

THE NEW ROAD

The new Glenn Highway By-Pass opened to traffic last Friday, fences and all.

of engineering, and a joy to drive.

For many people the new road does create an inconvenience, since the old road has been fenced off, and they will have to develop a new driving pattern. On the whole however, we can't help but admit that it is an asset to the community, and feel that the Green Construction Company deserves congratulations for a job well done in such a short time.



Those planning to attend the high school play can drop in for an early supper and still have plenty of time to make the first act curtain.




Presently I am a sophomore at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, Michigan. I plan to go into education
