



NEW HIGHWAY COMPLETED



CHUGIAK: The new Chugiak Area By-Pass was opened to traffic on October 31, Halloween, with the old Glenn Highway being blocked off at both ends at the same moment.

This new section of highway which is approximately 8.25 miles long, was completed one year ahead of schedule.

Charles Matlock District Highway Engineer, says that he feels that this is in the way of being some kind of record. He credits the efficiency of the Green Construction Company, coupled with the unusually good weather this past summer for this accomplishment.

The new road will now assume the name of "Glenn Highway", with the old road to be referred to as the "Old Glenn Highway" for the time being.

Matlock said that in order to avoid having to change mile posts all the way up the Glenn Highway, those on the new section would be adjusted to fit in between mile 13 and mile 22. This might mean that there would not be a full mile between two of the posts. He also said that the mile posts on the "Old Glenn Highway" would not be removed, and local residents could still refer to them when giving their address.

Matlock went on to say that the Department of Highways was planning to install additional signs at both the north and south Birchwood Loop intersections of the new Glenn Highway indicating the direction to the "Chugiak Area".

When asked if the Highway Department was planning to install any of the standard blue and white signs which indicate that food, phones, gas etc. was available in that direction and how far, he said that this had not been planned, but could be done if the local people wished it.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, Taff had rounded a curve when he lost control of his 1965 Triumph, and slid

THE NEW ROAD

The new Glenn Highway Bypass opened to traffic last Friday, fences and all.

After all the unkind things we have been saying about the Highway Department and their fences, we feel that in all fairness we should say something complimentary.

The new road is a fine piece of engineering, and a joy to drive.

The shoulders are good and wide, and there is enough room to get well off the road in case of a break-down or a flat tire. This is a good thing, as the motorist would have to go a long way before he would find a service or even a telephone on this limited access road.

While by our speedometer, the road appears to be slightly longer than the Old Glenn

Highway, the elimination of the steep grades at Fire Lake and through Peters Creek canyon make driving much easier.

While the fences near settled areas may be high enough to keep moose from getting on the road, they are much lower out in the sparsely populated areas, and motorists had better not relax their vigil, as any moose who is determined to cross the road would have little difficulty in jumping the fence in some places.

For many people the new road does create an inconvenience, since the old road has been fenced off, and they will have to develop a new driving pattern. On the whole however, we can't help but admit that it is an asset to the commu-

ity, and feel that the Green Construction Company deserves congratulations for a job well done in such a short time.

The Chugiak Volunteer ambulance was summoned, and both girls transported to Providence Hospital where the driver was found to be suffering from a broken leg. Her passenger did not sustain any injuries.

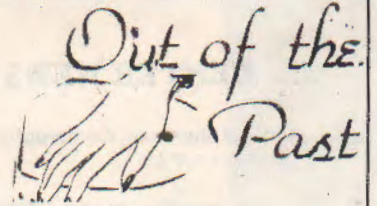
DONATIONS TO UNICEF ARE GENEROUS

The repairs on our Center building are moving right along. Eldon French and Ted Graham, who aren't old enough to belong to our group, have been working after hours to do this needed work.

It is a cold, backbreaking job to crawl around under a building while pulling large timbers, and cement blocks into place. We really appreciate the effort that these men are putting forth to help us.

Another gentleman, a newcomer to our program, has agreed to do the digging necessary for the temporary sanitary facilities. He has also offered to help with other work, and teach a craft class tool.

With people like this helping us, we hope it won't be too long before we will be able to move into the Center.

The old sign that used to be in front of the Center is being repainted, and lettered to let people know our exact location.

A word of explanation to those who do not know, and may wonder why we ask for assistance from the community. Due to the small grants, we must work on a very limited budget. The grant does not cover all types of expenditures, so we must ask for the help from our "Good Neighbors" in the community.

One lady suggested that we tell people that many times our needs are not met. She also commented that she had assumed that other people had helped us, so didn't call. When we do find an answer to our problem we try to report it in this column.

The following are some of the things we need now, or in the near future. We welcome donations of parts of a needed item, such as, pieces of Temlock insulating material used to board up around the footing of the building. If several persons only brought one piece of leftover material, we would have enough to do this one job.

We also need a full length mirror, artificial flowers for birthday party table decorations, Christmas tree stand, lights and decorations. Another outhouse is needed too. Any craft tools, or materials, playing cards, checkers, bookcases and coffee table are needed. These items may be dropped off at Pat Sherman's house, or call for pick-up 688-2210.

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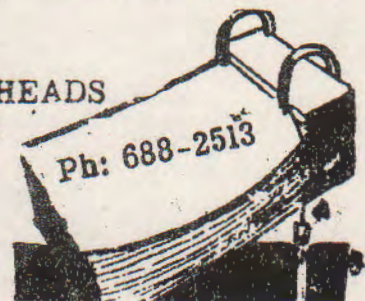

The Board voted to have the Matanuska Electric Association install a security yard light on the Carnival Grounds near the Hall.
