#### MEA TO ENLARGE CHUGIAK AREA FACILITIES

CHUGIAK: The Manager for the Matanuska Electric Asssociation, Willard Johnson, announced today that construction of a new sub-station and 3 miles of transmission and distribution line are scheduled for early spring in the Greater Chugiak Area. Cost of this project has been

estimated at \$200,000.

Other construction planned for this fast growing area includes new distribution line. service drops, the attii service drops, the addition of oil circuit re-closures, volt-

age regulators and larger transformers.

The new sub-station will be located across the road from the Eagle River Post Office.

#### LARGE CROWD AT CHARTER COMMIS. MEETING HERE

BIRCHWOOD: The Anchorage Area Charter Commission met with the largest crowd to at end any of their public meetings last night at Chngiak High School in the Birchwood area.

Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area, who had overwhelmingly rejected unificat-ion at last October's Borough election, appeared to still be opposed to it.

Seven members of the Char-ter Commission were present; Mrs. Rita Brown, Don Smith, Robert McFarland, Richard W. Fischer, Gerald F. McMahon, Max Hodel and

Chalrman, Clifford J. Groh. Groh, in his opening remarks stated that he was aware that the voters of this area had rejected unification, and cited the vote precinct by precinct.

He pointed out that the Charter commission had sought to eliminate controversy by selecting the name of "Anchorage" for the unified entity.
This was immediately ques-

tioned by several local people who felt that this was the first step in the loss of community identity. (CONT PAGE 2 COL )

#### LOCAL VOTERS MUST REGISTER

CHUGIAK: Voters in the five precincts of the Greater Chugiak Area are reminded that al! voters must be pre-regist-ered before they may vote in the 1970 primary election next August.

Pre-registration was conducted at the polls at the last general election, but since it had not been passed into law at that time, it was optional, and many voters did not preregister at that time.

Registration will no longer be done on election day at the polls, and any person who has not pre-registered will not be able to vote.

There are registrars in each of the five local precincts, and they will register local voters at any time from the present until the deadline next summer.

OLD CHUGIAK: A replacement building for the Chugiak Elementary School has been approved by the School Board and Borough Assembly, with the Architectural firm of Mc-Entire and Pendergrast to design the facility.
The firm is currently study-

ing the facilities at Chugiak for possible use of existing buildings and placement of the new addition on the site.

According to Dr. Kramer, Superintendent of schools, "The Master Building Plan for the School District did not call for an activation of plans for new facilities at Chugiak Elementary at this time. However, due to the need for npgrading and improving Chugiak's facilities, I have re-quested that planning and design be started immediately."

Projected plans call for the new facility to open not later than September, 1971, with a total cost of \$800,000. "In-

itially, the plans call for a fac-ility of twelve rooms, with provision for adding additional rooms as the area grows. said Bill Klingler, Assistant Snperintendent for School Facilities, "and we know that the Chugiak area is going to grow as available land becomes even more critical in the future."

Mr. Klingler further stated "we wish to form a citizen and teacher committees from the Chugiak Elementary attendance area to meet with the Architect in preliminary planning. Any interested person should call Mr. Blne, Prin-cipal of Chugiak Elementary.

"We are excited about our ew facilities and the possibilities they present for the improvement of our instructional program," said Principal Richard Blud. "The general direction and movement in education today is toward individualized instruction where the student's specific needs are met. Our new facilities will be similar to Chinook and Wonder Park instruction.

These schools are designed as open schools with movable walls for large and small group instruction".

John Everitt, Principal of Wonder Park School says,"It is obvious to the observer that the youngsters are learning any enjoying it, and that they are doing it in a relaxed manner. I believe our new approach to designing and building schools has contributed measurably toward the ex-itement our students show as hey learn."

(CONT PAGE 1 COL 2) Harvey Pullen, of Eagle Rivhimself a narrowly defeated member to the Charter Commission pointed out to the Commission that one of the "musts" for the Charter was to have sectional representation, When one of the Charter Commission members remarked that they were con-sidering the merits of a man-ager as opposed to a Chair-Pullen reminded him that this question had been on the ballot, and the voter had voted 3 to 1 for the Chairman.

Other fears which were voiced by some of the local residents were that the people of this area would be forced to use City of Anchorage Telephone and electric systems, and that the bonded indebtedness of the City of Anchorage such as their City Port, telephone system etc. would be forced upon the areas out-

side the city.
The Charter Commission members appeared to be in disagreement on this matter.

Fisher stated that the debts would remain in the areas which had incurred them, McMahon disagreed, while and said that there could not be seperate taxing districts. Groh also felt that the Commission had no alternative but to spread the debt over the entire unified area ..

Local residents objected to this on the basis that since they had no voice in incurring these debts, they should not be forced to pay for them.

Some appeared to think that the unified government should get rid of all utilities and confine themselves to governing.

Mc Mahon pointed out to those present that this might be the time to think of possible alternatives to the unified government. He asked each of those speaking if they would prefer to be in the Matanuska Susit-Borough, and would they consider seceding?

He was immediately questioned as to why he was taking this line, as no one there had

suggested that they were comsidering secession, and was he trying to make it appear that this was what Chugiak area residents were considering?

This apparently did not re-ceive an unfavorable reaction from most of those present, and a number felt that being a part of the Mat-Su borough would be a welcome alternat-
