BIRCHWOOD: The Anchorage Area Charter Commission will hold a public meeting in the Greater Chugiak Area on Tuesday, December 9th.

The meeting will be held at Chugiak High School, and starts at 8:00pm.

Mrs. Margaret Schmidt, Secretary for the Charter Commission asked that residents of this area be reminded that this is their opportunity to help the Commission in framing a charter that will meet the needs of all borough residents.

The Commission is trying to learn whether the people prefer an elected head of government or an appointed or "City Manager" type.

They also are seeking to find out whether the people wish to retain the service area concept, and what services should be considered.

The number of elected representatives and how the tax structure should be set up is also an item that they want discussed.

CHUGIAK: With the coming of the New Year, the Knik Arm Courier announced the annual New Year baby contest, in which local merchants offer a jackpot of gifts to the family of the first baby to be born after midnight, December 31st, to parents living anywhere in the Greater Chugiak Area.

MEA GETS \$50,000 FOR LOANS

PALMER: A Section 5 loan to the Matanuska Electric Association in the amount of \$50,000.00, has been approved, R. J. Miller Jr. President of the MEA Board of Directors was told in a wire this week from David Hamill, REA Administrator.

The money is to be used in a consumer loan program to assist MEA members in purchasing electric appliances and installing electric heat through authorized dealers.

Members will have the opportunity to borrow the money at 5% interest with a 1 to 2 year pay-back provision. A 20% down payment on the appliance or installation is required.

These funds cannot be used for making commercial loans.

LONG DISTANCE RATES DOWN

CHUGIAK: Residents of the Greater Chugiak Area, will enjoy a decrease in long distance phone rates along with everyone else in accordance with the new rates which went into effect on December 1st.

According to Max Clement, Manager of the Matanuska Telephone Association, all long distance rates have been cut by about one third.

To cite several examples, calls to the military bases from either the Chugiak or the Eagle River exchanges will be for station to station calls, 25¢ for the first three minutes, and person to person,

ANOTHER UFO REPORT

CHUGIAK: Another report of a sighting of an Unidentified Flying Object was called in to the Knik Arm Courier following the publication of a sighting two weeks ago.

Norman B. Czerski, of Eagle River reported seeing three lights in the sky when he and his brother Stephen were returning home from Chugiak High School.

Czerski gave the date of the sighting as Friday, November 14th, at 6:15pm.

He described the objects as "Three lights in the sky which appeared to be falling, or disappearing into the distance."

He went on to say that, "They could not have been flares, because they were yellowish, and of constant intensity."

Next Tuesday, December 9th, the Anchorage area Charter Commission will hold their first public meeting in the Greater Chugiak Area.

While the Unification proposition was voted in Borough-wide, it had been overwhelmingly turned down by the voters in all five local precincts.

This would indicate that the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area feared that a unified local government would not be to their best interests.

For this reason, it is all that more important that local citizens turn out for this public meeting to help frame a charter that may prevent some of their fears from being realized.

Other meetings held by the Charter Commission elsewhere in the borough have had

very poor turnout. This has been deplored as evidence of indifference and apathy by the members of the commission who need to know what the majority of the people want for their local government.

The people of this area seem to have a very good idea of what they don't want. It would be a good idea to show up at next Tuesday's meeting at Chugiak High School, and make our opinions known to the Charter Commission. We are being offered an opportunity to help frame the charter which will govern us all, lets not blow it by failing to speak up until it's too late.

In this issue, local merchants and organizations are offered the opportunity to publish "Christmas Card" type ads, whereby they can convey their greetings to their friends and patrons.

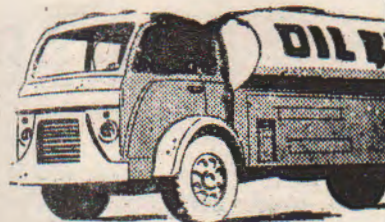

Calls to Fairbanks will be (station to station, days) 90¢ and person to person, \$1.80.

The rates are broken down to three time periods for station to station calls. These are 7:00am to 5:00pm, 5:00pm to 7:00pm, and 7:00pm to 7:00am. Person to Person calls are rated on two time periods. These are 7:00am to 7:00pm, and 7:00pm to 7:00am.

The rates for Saturday and Sunday are the same as the night rates.

VANDALS TEAR DOWN HIGHWAY SIGNS

CHUGIAK: A number of highway destination signs along the new Glenn Highway have been removed by vandals, it was reported by Jack Morrow, Anchorage Area foreman.

Last Friday, a sign was reported missing near Eagle River. The following day, Saturday, residents noticed that the three sign complex just South of the new Peters Creek bridge was missing. This sign marked the North Birchwood Loop, and indicated the direction to the Old Glenn Highway and to Chugiak. The three signs had been supported on two steel posts. These posts had apparently been cut off a few inches above the ground.

The missing sign at Eagle River has been replaced. Mr. Morrow was unaware that the signs near Peters Creek were missing until he was contacted by the Knk Arm Courier in an attempt to learn what had become of them.

Morrow said it would be a few days before the signs could be replaced as new ones would have to be painted.

Morrow estimated the cost of replacing the signs at Peters Creek at well over \$200.

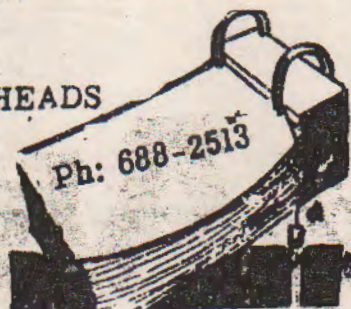

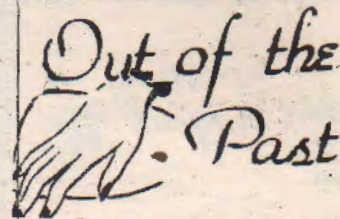

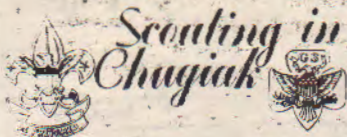
