

VETS MUST **RE-ENROLL**


Approximately 400 veterans in Alaska, who are now attending college under the Veteran's G.I. Bill, are reminded by M.W. Mc-Donaugh, manager U.S. Veterans Administration for Alaska, that many enrollments have been for one semester only.

Veterans enrolled for only one semester must be re-enrolled for the following semester before training allowance payments for that period can commence.

Also, those enrolled for only the first semester must furnish a Certificate of Attendance for

the first semester before payment can commence for the second semester. Certificates of Attendance have been automatically furnished to most voterans enrolled for only the first semester, McDonaugh stated.

Veterans are also reminded that if their enrollment in college was for an entire school year, they must notify the Veterans Administration immediately if they do not enroll for the second semester. Failure to notify the Veterans Administration of nonenrollment for the second semester may result in overpayments which must be recovered.

GUN LAW IS EASED

dealers to keep records of cer-buy rifle and shotgun ammunitain ammunition sales, the In- tion. Dealers must still require ternal Revenue Service said recently.

Newly enacted legislation eliminates the need for dealers to keep record on sales of shotgun ammunition, ammunition suitable only for use in rifles, and component parts of these types of ammunition. Purchases ammunition interchangeable between rifles and handguns, such as .22 caliber rimfire ammunition, continue to be subject to the record keeping requirements. Previously, the Gun Control Act of 1968 required records for all ammunition sales.

IRS stressed, however, that no IRS said. other aspect of the Act, which is administered by the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Division of the IRS, was changed by the legislation.

Persons engaged in selling ammunition still are required to be licensed under the act

Anyone under twenty - one years of age cannot purchase handgun ammunition. However. It no longer is necessary for individuals at least eighteen can purchasers to identify themselves if there is doubt about their age.

> Felons, persons under indictment for a felony, fugitives from justice, unlawful users of drugs. nental incompetents, and persons under eighteen continue to be prohibited from purchasing ammunition of any type.

The change in the law affects only shotgun and rifle ammunition, and their component parts. Dealers still are required to keep records on the sales of other ammunition, specifying the type and quantity of ammuni-tion and identifying the buyer.


