EYEBALL TO EYEBALL

HAINES, AK: How many women of your acquaintance have the courage and presence of mine to stand their ground and look a charging grizzly bear in the eye?

Before you say none, let us say that many of you do know such a woman. She is Maxine Henriches, former Chugiak area resident who is now living at Haines Alaska where her husband Ray, is employed in civil service.

The Henriches were in the local area over Christmas visiting their daughter and grandchildren, and it was at this time that Maxine told this unusual story to the Knik Arm Courier.

The incident took place last September. She had been visiting a neighbor and was walking back down the road to her home which was located in a wooded area. She said she heard this noise in the brush and looked up to see these three large bears. Two of the animals hung back, but the third came charging up to where she was standing.

Maxine knew the chances of her outrunning a charging grizzly were non-existent, so she stood perfectly still.

This behavior must have puzzled the bear, as he came to a full stop right beside her and looked her in the eye.

"I didn't know what else to do," she said "so I just looked back."

Then, she saw the bear raise his paw as though to strike her in the face. She ducked her head and half-turned her back to avoid the blow. She felt the bear's paw tap her lightly on the shoulder. No love pat, to be sure, but not hard enough to even tear the cloth of her coat or break the skin. When she looked back at the animal, she saw that he had backed off and had rejoined his two companions. The three were growling and snorting as though discussing this strange person, and trying to decide what to do about her.

Maxine said, "I finally got tired of waiting for them to make up their minds, so I just growled back at them." Here she demonstrated a deep chested growl; an excellent

invitation, it appears, for the bears all turned tail and disappeared into the bush.

When Ray returned that night he might have been tempted to doubt the story, except for the huge, dusty bear print on the back of Maxine's coat.

The Henriches lived in the Chugiak Area for many years prior to moving to Haines, and at one time operated the Eagle River Hardware Store in the Eagle River Shopping Center.

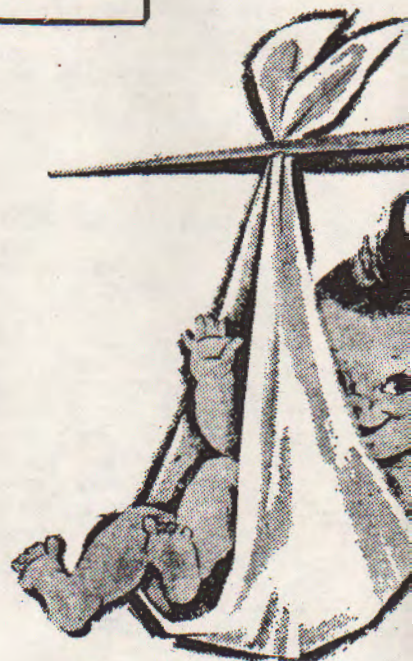
