



Before you say none, let us say that many of you do say that many know such a woman. She is Henriches, former Chuglak area resident who is now living at Halnes Alaska where her husdand Ray, is employed in civil service.

The Henriches were in the local area over Christmas visiting their daughter and and grandchildren, and it was at this time that Maxine told this unusual story to the Knik Arm Courier.

The incident took place last eptember. She had been September. She had been visiting a neighbor and was walking back down the road to her home which was located in a wooded area. She said she heard this noise in the brush and looked up to see these three large bears. Two of the animals hung back, the third came charging but up to where she was standing. Maxine knew the chances of

her outrunning a charging were non-existant, grizzly

so she stood perfectly still. This behavior must have puzzled the bear, as he came to a full stop right beside her

and looked her in the eye. "I didn't know what else to do," she said "so I just looked back."

Then, she saw the bear raise his paw as though to strike her in the face. She ducked her head and halfturned her back to avoid the blow. She felt the bear's paw tap her lightly on the shoulder. No love pat, to be sure, but not hard enough to even tear the cloth of !er coat or break the skin. When she looked back at the animal, she saw that he had backed off and had rejoined his two companions. 

ALIENS MUST REPORT

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ANCHORAGE: Mr. Denis E. Wolstenholme, District Director of the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that the period in which aliens must report their addresses is almost at hand.

The month of Jauary has been set for the address-reporting period. All aliens in the United States with few exceptions, must report their addresses to the Government during that period. Mr. Wol-stenholme said that forms with which to make the report will be available to all postoffices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of


