EAGLE RIVER: Residents of area presently being served by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company will be asked to form a tax supported Fire Service District at a special election to be held on Tuesday, January 28th.

The polling place for both the Eagle River precinct and the Eagle River Valley pre-

cinct will be at the Eagle River School. This is for River School. This is for expediency, and for this special election only. Two seperate sets of polls will be located at the school, and voters will cast their ballots at the precinct polls for the area in which they reside.

The polls will open at 7am and remain open until 8pm.
Any residents of Service Area 9 (as this area has been designated) are eligible to vote in this election, provid-ing they are 19 years of age on or before the date of the election, and have lived in the State of Alaska for at least one year, and 30 days in the greater Anchorage Area Borough.

Any voter who will not be in the area on the day of el-ection may obtain an absentee ballot from the office of the Borough Clerk at 104 Northern Lights Blvd. in Anchorage.

If passed, the ordinance will ask for 1/2 mill in taxes for Fire Protection.

Until this time, the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Comp-any which serves this area has depended on voluntary subscriptions of \$12 per year from residents of the alea. Only a small percentage of the residents paid this sub-scription, making some other means of public support nec-

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, which had suarced the same financial problems had petitioned for a tax sup-ported fire distrist last spring. This was voted into law ata special election last

summer.
As in the Chugiak Fire District, a 1/2 mill tax is being asked in Eagle River.

Friday night January 17, West played host to Chugial and lost to the Mustangs 70-63.


The following night, Chugiak met Dimond at home and lost 56-43.

Dear Editor:

A special election will be held on Tuesday, January 28, 1969 in the Eagle River Area for the purpose of voting on the following proposition.

Shall the power of fire protection exercised in the manner of a first class cities be delegated to and exercised by Service Area Number Nine of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough. The mill rate for the period 1969 through 1970 may not exceed 1/2 mill each year."

The polling place will be at the Eagle River School for both the Eagle River and Eagle River Valley precincts.

The polls will open from 7am

to 8pm.

This proposition, with the exception of an elected Advisory Board of Supervisors, is similar to the proposition that the Chugiak area recently passed by a wide margin.

An earlier request to have this proposition also are the control of th

this proposition placed on the last October Borough ballot was defeated by the Assembly because the majority of the Assemblymen did not want to estabilsh another Service Area Supervisory Board until enough time had elapsed for the Borough Administration and Assembly to de-termine if this type of Board would work successfully.

In deference to those Assemblymen, the idea for a Sup-ervisory Board was dropped from this newer proposition. We can go back later for the Board when the climate at the Assembly level is a little more favorable.

This is an opportunity for all of us as residents to support on a more equitable basis the very dedicated group of

men and women in our Volunteer Fire Department. Approximately 33 percent of our residents now support it fin-ancially. It is becoming more and more difficult to finance this vital service--operation, maintenance and repair of ment of equipment and capital improvements to buildings, etc.--through voluntary and private sources as more and more demands are made upon the department through rapid

community growth.

Further, there is now an opportunity to take advantage of certain business license rebate funds that would otherwise be lost to the community. The Assembly recently established a policy that these funds would go back to legally established service areas to insure greater equitableness with the City of Anchorage in their disbursement. Based on a tax base of approximately on a tax base of approximately \$9,000,000, for the service area, these rebates would amount to approximately \$2,5000 before July For the sext fiscal year this would total approximately \$2,5000 before July 1, 1969. For the next fiscal year this would total approximately \$2,5000 before July 1, 1969.

year this would total approximately \$6,000. The 1/2 mill rate would raise approximately \$4,500.

What would a 1/2 mill rate

mean in additional taxes to you as a taxpayer?

It would mean 50 cents for each \$1,000 tax assment. If your total tax assessment was based on \$10,000 valuation, you would pay \$5.00 per year. If \$20,000, you would pay \$10,00 additional per year for fire service. Presently the voluntary contribution is \$12.00 per year for those who pay it.

Assuming favorable passage of this proposition the first proposed annual budget with established priorities for expenditures would be sub-mitted to the community for apprisal and comments be-fore going to the Assembly penditures for final action.

No, I don't agree. you see that your friend is giving you the opportunity to


offer to help her out, and if you don't want to extend the favor at that time, she has spared you the embarassment of having to say "no"


