



EAGLE RIVER VOTES "YES" ON FIRE SERV.

EAGLE RIVER: Residents of the area served by the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company voted to become a tax supported fire service district by an overwhelming majority at a special election held Tuesday, January 28th.

With a total of 208 ballots cast, the vote was; 151 in favor of the proposition and 57 against.

The vote by precinct was: Eagle River (Precinct number 148,) 100 for and 27 against. Eagle River Valley (Precinct number 147) 51 for and 27 against.

This is the second Fire Service District to be formed in the Greater Chugiak Area, the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company having voted for Fire Protection last summer.

BOROUGH NAME TO REMAIN UNCHANGED

ANCHORAGE: The GAAE Assembly voted last Monday night to retain the name of Greater Anchorage Area Borough. The vote was 7 to 4 in favor of the retaining. A resolution had been introduced before the Assembly to change the name to "Anchorage Borough."

Also passed by the Assembly was the approval of extending the contract for management of the Dog Pound by the ASPCA for another year.

It was decided that the Borough Dog Control Ordinance was in line for re-vamping, and a committee to study this will be appointed. At the recommendation of Ed Willis, Assemblyman from the local area, a member of this committee will be a resident of the Greater Chugiak Area.

RECORD CROWD AT DRUG MEETING

BIRCHWOOD: A standing--- room only crowd packed the multi purpose room at Chugiak High School last Thursday to learn about the harmful effects of narcotics, and how the problem could be prevented from spreading to local schools.

A film depicting the effects of marijuana and LSD was shown, followed by talks by Dr. Winthrop Fish, Anchorage internist, Dr. Thomas Green, local physician and Miss Marie Hill school nurse, who gave various views on how narcotics affects the human body. This was followed by a talk by Corporal Gillmore of the Alaska State Troopers on the narcotics problem from the police point of view. Corporal Gillmore brought with him a display of various types of narcotics and pills which the police had confiscated in recent months.

MERGER TO BE SUBJECT OF MEETING

BIRCHWOOD: An open public meeting for the purpose of hearing the views of Chugiak Area residents on local government problems including unification (merger) has been scheduled for Thursday, January 30th, according to Mel Potter, member of the local Government Study Committee "Operation Breakthrough".

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A COMMUNICATION GAP

If the report of the public meeting on narcotics which appears on page 1 seems to be incomplete in view of the controversy it stirred up, it is because this reporter was just as emotionally involved as most parents who attended the meeting, and could not be depended upon to go into the details objectively; hence the retiring to the editorial page.

It is unfortunate that Dr. Winthrop Fish was not aware of the reason that he had been asked to address this meeting, or doubtless he would have approached the subject differently.

The parents who attended the meeting had come because they were deeply concerned with the problem of use of narcotics among the students of Anchorage schools, and were anxious to learn what they could do to keep this problem from coming up in

our own high school. They wanted to learn about the harmful effects that narcotics can have on the human system so they could warn their children against using them. In fact, it was to hear this that many parents had brought their children to this meeting. It came as almost a shock then to hear Dr. Fish belittling the facts that we had just seen in the film, and appearing to point out that marijuana and some of the pep pills which were the subject of drug abuse could be used without ill effects by some people. No one denied that Dr. Fish was medically correct in his statement, but that was not what this group was interested in. The way in which Dr. Fish approached the subject would have been very appropriate for a talk before a group of medical students or other members of the profession, but not

to a roomful of parents who had brought their children there to hear how these drugs could harm them, not to give them reason to believe that they might use them without any ill effects.

The obvious results of the Doctor's remarks was an outburst of indignation from a number of the parents, and what was supposed to have been a question and answer period turned into an angry debate. To illustrate the lack of communication between the Doctor and his audience, although we are sure that Dr. Fish did not at any time state that he favored the legalization of marijuana, there are people who attended the meeting that are prepared to swear that is exactly what he said. We don't know what prompted Dr. Fish to feel the need to play the part of the "Devil's Advocate" on the subject of narcotics, but it was out of place at a meeting of this type.

The harm that may have been done as a result of this misunderstanding may have in part been undone by Dr. Green and Nurse Hill who attempted to bring the discussion back on the original track. Also

Corporal Gillmore who was able to give the details of sordid case histories of some of the local narcotics users he has observed may have had a desired effect on the audience.

We thought the Corporal's comparison of the game of Russian Roulette to using of narcotics was a good point. "Sure", he said, "there are some people who may be able to use LSD or smoke "Pot" without serious effects, but there is no way of knowing ahead of time who they are. If I were to unload my revolver with the exception of one cartridge, and spin the chamber, would you be willing to put it to your temple and pull the trigger? This is the same chance a person takes when they try narcotics".

We hope that the next time Dr. Fish is asked to address a group of parents on the harm that narcotics can do he approaches the subject differently. If he feels that he cannot do this, than I hope he declines the invitation.

THOU SHALT NOT DEFACE PROPERTY!

Dear Editor:

Last Wednesday evening someone (singular or plural) undertook a project with the motive unknown, but with the results clearly visible. With the use of spray paint two area churches were defaced with anti-war slogans. Other public signs were also damaged, with a total loss of several hundred dollars.

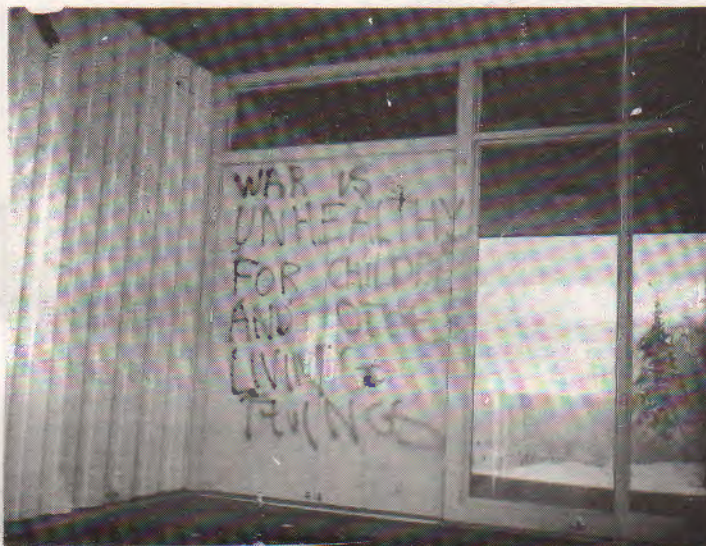
After studying the damage to their church building, some members of the United Methodist Church of Chugiak have these suggestions to the person or persons who were involved:

1. What you have done is a basic contradiction to the intent of the message of your signs. In expressing a concern over war, which is shared by most Christians, you have shown no regard for the rights of others in your own community. This lack of regard, if allowed to go unchecked, could undermine many of the institutions in our society which hold a high regard for justice and fair play. Since there are appropriate open channels for expressing dissent, we would suggest that defacing property is not the way to express yourself in a democratic society.

2. Without any motive for reprisal, we would be willing to allow you to remove the paint that you have sprayed on our building. All you would need to do is contact the church or the pastor and offer to make right what most people would regard as a thoughtless act. This assumes that perhaps you are basically and potentially decent persons.

3. In addition, if you really have a concern about war and human suffering and if you truly want to get a point across to us, we would be willing to offer you a forum in which you might express your views for discussion and mutual enlightenment. The church does want to listen to you and to others. We believe that there is a constructive and democratic way to express viewpoints and we would like to provide that constructive alternative.

**CHS FLOAT TO DEPICT
"MOOSE-GOOSER"**

The replica of the "Moose Gooser", the first locomotive to run between Anchorage and Seward, will be Chugiak High's float entry for the 1969 Fur Rendezvous.

The "Moose Gooser" is to be built of 2x4's, chicken wire, napkins and crepe paper. When assembled, it will fit over a pick-up or econoline van. The color of the Moose Gooser will be black with aqua stripes down it's side. It will be equipped with a train bell and operating smokestack.

A trailer will be pulled behind the locomotive. It will be disguised as a locomotive tender.

Mark Miller, a CHS mechanical drawing student, is doing the drawing plans for the frame. Work will begin on the float on Saturday.

Clark Buswell, the chairman of the float committee estimated that 150 linear feet of wood (mostly 2x4's) will be used.

The committee is allowed \$40.00 from the General Activity fund.

**CHUGIAK HIGH IS
ACCREDITED**

BIRCHWOOD: Chugiak High School has received a fully approved rating from the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools for the fourth year in a row, according to an announcement from the high school.

The announcement followed receipt of a letter from Harvey T. King, Chairman of the Alaska Committee of the accrediting association.

The letter closed with the statement, "Your staff and community is to be congratulated for providing the students of the Chugiak area with a high quality educational program. The very best of luck to you in the future."

Laurence Graham, Chugiak High School Principal, stated that this was probably the best approval letter the high school had ever received.

"Normally," he said, "we receive full approval, but with comments."

Comments refer to minor deficiencies in meeting the many standards set up by the accrediting association," he explained. "Comments in themselves are not serious, but receiving a number of them can lead to withdrawal of approval."

This year the only comment we received was in regard to the size of the plant, and this we will be correcting this summer."

"One of the main deficiencies in the past has been our library, and though we are still attempting to work on it, we have finally met standards for our size school," Graham stated.

The Accrediting approval is based on twelve standards. The first is the educational program, which includes philosophy and objectives, the program of studies, size of

staff, and evaluation of program.

Other standards cover Guidance Services, the school plant and equipment, the school library, school records of students, graduation requirements, school atmosphere, teacher preparation, school administration, teacher load in both number of students per teacher and number of classes per day, student load, and student activities.

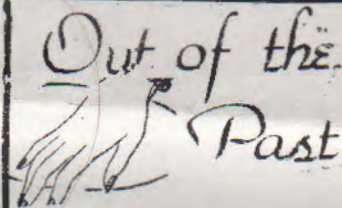
