

BABY LOTION MAY CONTAIN BACTERIA

JUNEAU: The Mennen Company of Morristown, New Jersey, announced today tests of its products have shown that certain plastic bottles of Baby Magic "lotion" manufactured prior to March 1968 and one lot manufactured after that date, may contain bacteria which could cause serious infection.

The only bottles involved either have a letter in addition to a number stamped on the bottom of the bottle, or are nine ounce bottles stamped 219 without a letter. All other bottles are cou-

sidered safe. Although there has been no record of any complaints or injuries resulting from use of these bottles, the Mennen Company wishes to issue this information to the general public.

Any customer having one of these bottles should discontinue its use immediately and return it to the Mennen Company, Hanover Avenue Morristown. N.J. 07060 for a full refund including postage.

BIRCHWOOD: A movie on Civil Devense, which was viewed by the Birchwood Elementary School PTA at their January 20th meeting, has sparked that organization into a drive to petition the GAAF to incorporate fallout shelters into the building plans of any new schools, additions or facilities.


The PTA passed a resolution favoring the construction of these shelters in all new buildings, and also to have existing facilities checked to determine where shuch protection can be provided at a reasonable cost. According to the office of Civil Defense, the necessary features of fallout protection can be in corporated into the design of new schools or additions at little or no additional cost, the resolution points out. Copies of this resolution have been sent to members of the School Board, School Superintendent Carlisle Kramer, state senators and others,

The PTA has also drawn up a petition, copies of which are being circulated throughout the community. The petition asks the School Board to include in the building of new schools and additions, facilities that can be sued for fallout shelters in the event of man-made or natural disasters for the protection of the children and people of the community. Copies of this petition have

Copies of this petition have been placed in business establishments throughout the community for the convenience of those who wish to sign them. Anyone needing additional information may call Mrs. Wilkings at 688-2429.

An alarming statistic which was learned from the Department of Civil Defense Education, University of Alaska, was that in the City of Anchorage, only two schools are licensed and stocked shelters. West High (113 spaces) AND Clark Jr. High (123 spaces). Moreover, only two public shelters, the Eklutna Power Plant (725 spaces) and the Eklutna Tunnel (50 spaces), exist between Clark Jr. High and the city of Fairbanks.

The following schedule is set up for your convenience. If possible, make morning appointments to avoid making the day in Anchorage too long and tiring for everyone who must use this means of transportation.

TUESDAYS will be set aside for doctors appointments in Anchorage. The doctors who were contacted will cooperate in making appointments for this day.

THURSDAYS will be for grocery shopping in Eagle River. These trips will also be scheduled for mornings in order to give your aide a driver for her afternoon house calls. FRIDAY from 10:00am to 1pm is ladies beauth shop day.

Until our regular barber returns, the mens haircutting day will be Saturday at 1pm.

This Friday, February l4th, we will be bussed into Anchorage for the OPAG meeting. You will be contacted for pickup time. These meetings are your means of gaining services for the elderly. Your vote is needed, and is very important to the program, so please attend. For appointments for transportation, call Pat Sherman, at 688-2210.





IMPROVEMENTS AT HATCHERY

FIRE LAKE: The Department of Fish and Game's Fire Lake Fish Hatchery is undergoing a complete modernization and is expected to be able to produce trout, salmon and grayling fry and fingerling at more than double the present capacity by 1970. A \$3222,800 contract for the hatchery building aspects of the modern facility was recently awarded to Western Construction Company of Anchorage. It calls for completion by August 1st, 1969.

The completely modernized facility incorporates a new water recirculating and treatment concept which was developed at the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife Abernathy Creek Experimental Station near Vancouver, Washington. Alaska will be one of the first states to put this technical breakthrough into use at a fish hatching and rearing station.

The system will allow for the control of water temperature to maintain the most desirable range for artificial salmonid rearing, generally about 55 deg. F.

The natural water temperature in Cook Inlst drainage range from freezing to about 75 deg. F., too low at one end and too high at the other. At the lower temperatures the fish and egg growth and development are very slow. At the high end (above about 65 deg. F) the fish "break", as fish culturists say. They soon stop feeding are are very susceptible to disease. Under

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natural conditions the fish attempt to find cooler water often moving deep in a lake, for example. A complex system of water

treatment and reuse allows for the temperature adjust-ment and control. Water is taken in from the water supply tine coming from Upper Fire Lake, mechanically filtered to remove physical im-purities, sterilized, and then recirculated within the hatchery, obtaining heat, where needed from the equivalent of an oversize hot water heating system. After a period, the recirculated water builds up a load of unacceptable waste products from the fish's metalobism. A series of bio-lobical filters using crushed shells, coupled with aspirators, remove the wastes from the water. Periodic-ally, the filters are backflished to rid the recirculating system of the accumulat-The sterilization feature ton. keeps down the incidence of disease and parasites. An automatic feeding system will insure that adequate food for fast growth is available.

The end result will be a nearly three fold increase in the production of fry and fingerling with the added advantage of adjusting production to make the fish available at the most favorable time.


