Local Borough Assembly-nan Ed Willis, when asked o comment on the subject

"If one were to speculate why Anchorage City to "fficials are threatening suc-ession", Willis said, " I yould guess that perhaps the ollowing factors might be onsidered in their decision,

The population rapidly hifting to the Borough sub-rbs and the impending loss t the weighted vote,

The slowing rate of an-exations to the City, thereby miting the acquisition of ore tax base,

The burgeoning bonded debtedness.

The thought of becoming a ervice area of the Borough erhaps has wounded their vic pride."

Willis went on to say that ly or all of the above may so alarmed the City 2."e so alarmed the City ouncil that this threatened acession is being used to tampede the legislature into ome sort of ""Mandatory an-exation" to the City, or Mandatory Unification". ave Willis did say, however that ford has reached him from uneau since Mr. Sharp Jan-uary 15th visit which would idicate that no such action s imminent, and that public earings would be held first n any case.

"I am planning along with several other members of the Assembly to go to Juneau the 27th and 28th of February", Will's said. "At that time Willis said. the problem can be discussed personally with State Legislators."

LEE EMMERT DIES

GREAT FALLS, MONT: Word was received today of the death of Walter Leroy (Lee) Emmert, former principal of the Chuglak Elementary Sch-001,

Emmert, who for nine years was the local principal, was suffering from terminal cancer this past year, but his death on February 6th, was attributed to a heart attack.

Emmert was born on May th, 1902 in Northern II. 15th. He received his education in Ill. and Kansas, and earned iversity of Montana. He married his wife Irene, also school teacher, in Kansas. Prior to coming to Chuglak he taught high school and was the Athletic coach at Sisseton, S.D. and taught for one year at Milesville S.D.

ANCHORAGE: Shirley Gavin, the Pride of Peters Creek, mushed her 8 dog team on last Sunday to recapture the Women's World Champio ship Crown for Sled Dog rac-

ing. The slim, pretty mother of three, had come in first on three, had come in first on the initial day of the two day event, with a time of 35.47 minutes, beating out Louise Lombards time of 36.18. On the second day, Shirley had a bad break just as she was entering the finish chute, when one of her dogs dropped in harness, and she lost , the precious seconds getting him into the basket. Even though this put her in fourth for time on the second day, she still was nineteen seconds to the good for total time.

This is the second time around for Shirley to wear the Champs's crown, having won it in 1966.

Shirley has been training and racing her own sled dogs for the past eight years, She came up through the ranks in the Women's Championship Sled Dog Race, first winning 7th place then sixth and so on up to the first time she won the Championship in 1966. In 1967 and 1968, she was in the process of culling her team, and only took second place those two years. Shirley needs only to win the Title one more time to retire the Prepetual Trophy.

This year she attributes her success to her new lead dog, a pure-bred registered Irish letter named "Blaze."

Mrs. Gavin differs from the other woman mushers in that while they are the wives of men who train and race sled dogs, and use teams trained by their husbands, Shirley is the only musher in her family, and while her in her taking, and while her hnsband, Myron gives her assistance in caring for the team and acting as handler during the races, he has only raced (using Shirley's team) in the local Cheechako races, an event for non-professionais.

They have lived in the Chuglak Area since 1960, making their home on Four-Wheel Drive in Peters Creek, Two of her three children are students at Churlak High Sch-ool (Mike age '7 and Gail age 14) 9 year old Michelle attends Chuglak Elementary School. 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
