

CHUGIAK CLUB UPS REWARD MONEY

MUSTANGS LOSE TOURNAMENT BY ONE POINT

KENAI: The Chugiak High School Mustangs came within only one point of winning the Class A Basketball tournament which was held in Kenai last Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The Mustangs did not play until Friday night, having had a bye on Thursday. The Friday game with the Kenai Cardinals was a narrow victory for Chugiak, with the winning basket being tipped in by Jim Kohring and Steve Willis in the last 18 seconds of play.

The game was a very close one all the way, with Chugiak coming from behind a ten point lead by Kenai at the beginning of the 4th quarter.

Kenai was attempting a semi-stall, when the Mustangs surged ahead to take the game 54-52.

High scorer for this game was Big Jim Kohring, who controlled the backboards during defense. Second high was sophomore Steve Jordan, with 16 points.

In the tournament finals, against the Palmer Moose, the game was very close all the way, up until the final quarter when Palmer had picked up a 10 point lead, with 1 minute and 29 seconds left to play.

Then the Mustangs started to press and came within one point of overtaking the Moose when the final buzzer sounded.

High man for the game was again, Jim Kohring, with Steve Willis and Steve Jordan scoring 14 points each for a tie at second highest.

Although they came out in second place in tournament play, the Mustangs did not go home empty handed. The Chugiak team was awarded the "Good Sportsmanship" trophy, while the Chugiak Cheerleaders were named the first place cheerleading team at the tournament. Also two of the Mustang players, Jim Kohring and Steve Willis were named to the ten man All Star basketball team, with Kohring being the number 1 man on that team.

Mustang coach, Don Sanders said that he hoped the fact the Chugiak did not win the tournament does not give the impression that they are not a championship caliber team. The single point by which the Moose won the final game is an indication that it was clearly a matter of how the referees felt that determined the winner. He reminded that last week, the Mustangs

Plans are underway for a training class for new volunteer firemen and women, and a new fire hall is also on the drawing board.

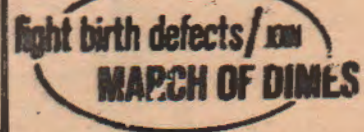

This week we thought that you might like to learn about some of the ways in which we have been able to assist the elderly during the last thirty days.

These accomplishments are made possible from public agencies, and our own "Good Neighbors."

Other than the regular work of setting up schedules, arranging transportation, taking a survey, attending meetings and writing articles for publication, we have been able to help bring about the following services.

Arrange for meter hook-up for a person who has been without electricity for a very long time. Set the wheels in motion to gain the loan of a hospital bed, and other items needed for a member

who is recuperating at home after a stay in the hospital.

Through our referral, an elderly person was hired to care for another newly released hospital patient.

We tried our best to locate someone to fill the job of laundress for a private family but were unsuccessful due to a transportation problem.

People who thought might be interested in applying for a Nutritional Aide jobs were contacted. We had hoped an application from at least one of the two persons contacted in Eklutna Village, but were unsuccessful. However one older person from this area was hired through our referrals.

A family in need of a baby-sitter was referred to an older person who is interested in this type of work.

Potatoes, which are donated are passed out to elderly persons when needed.

One of our members was assisted in clearing up a de-

layed pension check delivery.

Reading glasses were obtained for an OPAG member after months of waiting.

Legal aid was supplied for two families.

Assistance needed for two out of state cases were brought to our attention, and referred to the proper offices.

GOAL and OPAG combined forces to collect, sort, store and sell rummage in order to raise money for worthwhile projects.

Arrangements were made to obtain an apartment in the newly completed, low housing for the elderly.

Transportation is also arranged so that members can attend Anchorage OPAG meets and our local GOAL meetings.

There are more than five OPAG members who are board members on your local GOAL Community Council. We are very proud of these older people who are taking an active part in making decisions that benefit everyone from Eagle River Eklutna.

If you have a problem, and are fifty-five years or older, contact your community aides. We may be able to help you.

4H AWARD OFFERED

COLLEGE — An Alaska 4-H Merit Award has been established, it was announced by Harlem D. Sandberg, State 4-H Club and youth program leader at the University of Alaska. The purpose of the award is to recognize 4-H Club members who have provided unusual leadership for their club and district.

The award is open to any 4-H member who has completed at least five years of 4-H, three years of junior leadership, and is at least sixteen years old.

The objectives of the award program are to encourage growth, 4-H participation, and development of outstanding citizens. Members who join when in high school may have the five year 4-H club work requirement waived upon request to the District Extension Agent.

In order to receive the award, members must earn 125 points based on an evaluation sheet. Those members who do not have opportunity to participate in district-wide programs may qualify by earning a minimum of 105 points.

The award is a gold pin designed by Rinald Senungetuk, assistant professor, Extension

"NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Department of Highways, pursuant to authority vested by AS 19.05.020, proposes to adopt, amend, or repeal regulations in TITLE 14 of the Alaska Administrative Code to implement and interpret the provisions of Chapters 5, 10, 15, 17, 20, 22, 25, 27, and 30 of TITLE 19 of the Alaska Statutes as follows:

- (1) Repeal 14 AAC 1, 2 (300-410), 8 (900-914)
- (2) Adopt 17 AAC 1, 2, 3, 4, (100-455), as follows:

ADMINISTRATION, Designation of Alaska Highway System by Commissioner.

ENGINEERING: Authorization of encroachments, permits for driveways, utilities in highway right-of-way.

MAINTENANCE, Restriction of maintenance to Alaska Highway System, outdoor advertising of highway right-of-way, closure and restriction of highways, transfer of excess equipment.

EQUIPMENT OPERATION, Designation of width, height, length, and gross weight of vehicles and loads, authority of officers, permits for excess size and weight, climatic restrictions on highway use.

Copies of the proposed changes in the regulations of the Alaska Administrative Code may be inspected at the Department of Highways, Douglas, Alaska, and at district offices in Anchorage, Fairbanks, Juneau, Nome, and Valdez.

Notice is also given that any person interested may present statements or arguments orally or in writing relevant to the action proposed at a hearing to be held at Room 100, Island Center Building, Douglas, Alaska, at 1:00 o'clock P.M., PST, on the 26th day of March 1969. The Commissioner of Highways, upon his own motion or at the instance of any interested person, may at such hearing or thereafter adopt the above proposals substantially as above set forth without further notice."

HOCKEY LESSONS OFFERED YOUTH

BIRCHWOOD: Laurence N. Graham, Principal of Chugiak High School, is polling parents to determine how many with boys in grades one through six are interested in having their sons participate in a ten session training program aimed at teaching the finer points of ice hockey.

As Graham points out, ice is becoming a very popular winter activity in Alaska. This includes youngsters ages 6 to 12 from all over the Borough, with the exception of the Chugiak area. Graham feels that if Chugiak High is to continue to build its team, the players need to start at a much younger age.

Graham tells that Mr. Bob Boehm, a local hockey figure has volunteered to teach hockey to interested boys. Boehm has tentatively set up a plan whereby ten one-hour sessions at the Anchorage Sports Arena can be held with transportation to and from the Arena furnished. The plans call for the boys to go in twice a week, one early evening session, and one Saturday morning session during March and early April.

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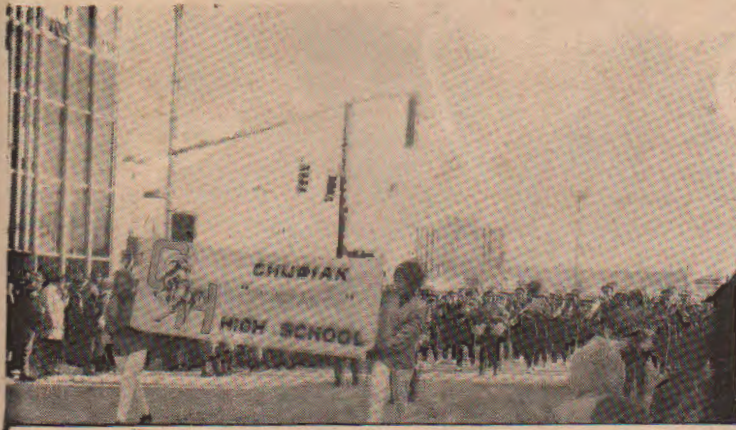

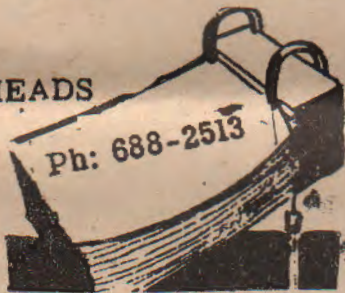
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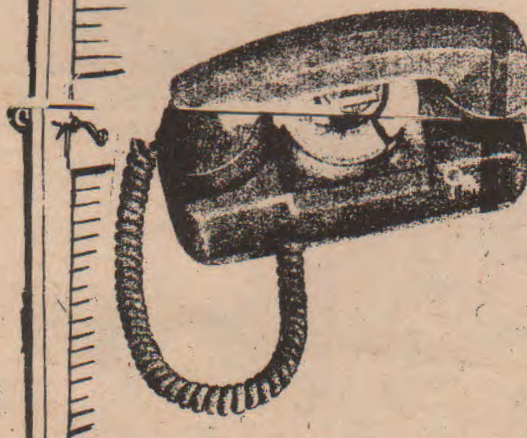

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ALASKAN OF YEAR TO BE NAMED

ANCHORAGE: Former Governor Walter J. Hickel will make his first Alaska visit since becoming U.S. Secretary of the Interior, with an appearance at the March 28th "Alaskan of the Year" banquet in Anchorage.

Hickel is slated to introduce the featured speaker at the event, former Supreme Court Justice and UN Ambassador, Arthur Goldberg. Exact date of Hickel's arrival is not presently determined, according to banquet chairman Henry Hedberg.

Highlight of the third annual banquet is to be the announcement of the "Alaskan of the Year" award winner, chosen by statewide balloting by Alaska news media. Previous winners were Anchorage Times publisher Robert BL Atwood in 1967 and the late Senator E.L. Bartlett last year.

Name of the winner is not officially announced until banquet night. The 1969 winner, according to Hedberg, is one of three men and two women on the final balloting.

Proceeds from the event are devoted to a college scholarship fund for Alaska born students in need of financial assistance. The scholarship winner is to be introduced at the banquet at the Anchorage Westward Hotel. Ticket sales will begin within a few days, according to Hedberg.

The concert will be presented in cooperation with the City Parks and Recreation department.

The orchestra performed for the Chamber of Commerce Christmas luncheon and received a standing ovation.

OBEDIENCE CLASS STARTS SUNDAY

EAGLE RIVER: The Obedience Training Club of Chugiak will start a new class in dog training on Sunday, March 2nd, at 1:00pm.

The classes will be held every Sunday at that time in the Sportsmen's Meeting hall at Mile 15.

The first class will be registration only, and entrants are requested not to bring their dogs to this session.

Two excellent color films (with sound) on beginning and advanced dog training will be shown.

There will be classes for beginners, as well as intermediate and advanced dogs.

The course consists of ten training sessions, and dogs of mixed breed, as well as pure bred dogs are eligible to enroll. There is a charge of \$15 for the course. At the close of the course there will be a graduation test, with ribbons and trophies offered to highest scoring dogs.
