



GEORGE ALLEN DIES OF HEART ATTACK

RURAL 30 HEAD RAPS "BREAKTHROUGH"

ANCHORAGE: At a meeting Sunday afternoon, February 2nd, Rural 30 District Chairmen reviewed recent actions taken by Operation Breakthrough, particularly as concerns local government structure. There is general awareness among the District Chairmen that the Operation Breakthrough Government Structure Committee and the Citizens' Council for Community Improvement may merely be front organizations for the Anchorage City Council and its plans for mass annexation of this area; according to a statement from Mel Porter, President of Rural 30.

Porter said that these organizations put forth much effort to create a public image of concern as regards the study of the question of "unification". However, he went on, their ploy is thinly veiled, and the real picture comes vividly through revealing the same old attempts of the past to bring about "mass annexation" of the borough under the guise of unification.

Porter said that Rural 30 takes note that the present governmental structure, that of a second-class borough, provides for logical step-by-step assumption of "unified powers" and does so in an orderly fashion with logical timing and depends upon the voice of the people at the ballot box.

"It looks as though the CCCL, the City Council and Operation Breakthrough are trying to 'short circuit' the normal process at the ballot box through a program of public enticement asking sudden and precipitated unification authority with one blow," Porter pointed out.

"Despite talk to the contrary, there is not one valid shred of evidence worth the price of the venture and experimentation proposed".

Porter explained that Rural 30 believes there is absolutely no need and no real justification for changing the present structure of the second-class borough government. "Inadequacies of government do exist," he admitted, "but most of these inadequacies are being artificially fostered in concerted attempts to destroy the plausible and practical working mechanisms of the present borough govern-

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GEORGE MASON ALLEN

PALMER: George Mason Allen, for years one of the best known civic leaders of the Chugiak Area died suddenly on Monday, February 3rd of an apparent heart attack.

Mr. Allen, and his wife had just left Palmer, driving enroute to Anchorage, shortly before noon on Monday, when he apparently became aware that he was becoming ill. He drove his car to the side of the road before losing consciousness. This was just outside of Palmer, and Mrs. Allen was able to hail a passing motorist, who drove her husband to the Valley Presbyterian Hospital, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

George Allen came to Alaska in 1947, and settled in the Peters Creek area in 1951. He built and for a number of years managed Allen's Grocery at mile 23, now known at the Peters Creek Shopping Center.

Although he never held or aspired to any political office, he was very active in the Democratic Party, and was chairman for his party in the local precinct for a number of years. He was a personal friend of former Governor William Egan and the late Senator Bob Bartlett, as well as many other Alaskan notables. Chugiak area residents will remember the many times that he personally hosted "Meet the Candidate" banquets in this area. His efforts on the part of "Operation Chugiak High School" were in a great part responsible for the success of this project, and in this he left a legacy to the youth of the community.

Allen had been in ill health for the past several years, and during the past twelve months had been hospitalized on several occasions. Following his retirement from active public life several years ago, he and Mrs. Allen had made their home on Nelson Lake outside of Palmer.

Allen, who was 71 years of age at the time of his death, was born on August 15th, 1897 in Perryville, Arkansas. He was an Army veteran of World War I, and a member of the BPOE, Palmer Lodge 1842. He is survived by his wife, Addie Mae, a son Ben Allen, of Little Rock Ark., who is a State Senator from Arkansas, two brothers, John Q. Allen of Los Angeles California, and Arthur Allen, of Baton Rouge, La. Also sur-

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LOCAL RESIDENTS STILL AGAINST "MERGER"

BIRCHWOOD: Representatives of the Local Government Committee of Operation Breakthrough, met with residents of the Greater Chugiak Area last Thursday at Chugiak High School, to determine the views of this area on unification or "merger" of metropolitan and borough government.

A comparatively small, but very vocal crowd left little doubt that the people of this area are violently opposed to any such unification.

Although it was asked on several occasions what immediate benefit the residents of a rural area such as Chugiak could derive from such unification, the committee was not able to name any.

The local residents seemed of an accord in stating that the present second class borough government was the most democratic in that it allowed the residents of both city and borough to take on as much government as they wished, and at the rate that they wished to develop. Any shortcomings that appeared to exist in the system, it was pointed out existed in the way it was administered, not in the form of government itself.

ment. Unification of area powers is fully possible and is intended under and by the present borough law and relies justifiably upon the will of the people at the ballot box.

"Those who propose the 'short circuiting' of the present system are apparently impatient with processes as they are", Porter insisted. "No real clarification has been produced to date to justify their impatience."

Porter went on to explain that Rural 30 supports logical growth of government locally and believes this is best achieved under the present second-class borough. He believes that it preserves the highest degree of democratic action through total community participation of the electorate directly at the ballot box.

"Without any doubt, the day may come after the people have built 'what they want', and 'how they want it', when the electorate will grant franchise to the borough government to perform 'home rule' authority of the the product of government they themselves

have built," Porter said. "We believe that the voters must directly decide their choice, block by block, in building unified local government. We also believe that once this has been done, the people will turn the reins of management over to a 'home rule' assembly", he concluded.

Damage to the Ford was estimated at \$500, to the Chevrolet, also \$500. Karis Ricketts was cited for driving left of the center line.

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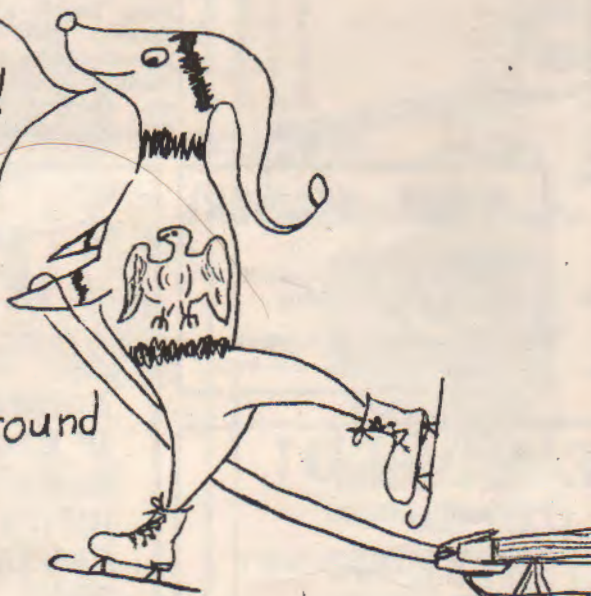
