MARCH 17 IS TAX DEADLINE

ANCHORAGE: Monday, March 17, is the deadline for several Federal tax obligations reporting on calendaryear basis.

Mr. Lesiw J. Conrad, District Director of Internal Revenue for Alaska, said that corporations must file a 1968 income tax return Form 1120, or an application for extension, Form 7004, by this date. They also must deposit at least 50% of the balance of the tax due when the return is filed or the extension requested.

Publication 542, "Corporations and Federal Income Tox," which furnishes detailed informaton on this subject may be obtained by

PETERS CREEK: A 25 year old skydiver plunged to his death last Sunday afternoon at Mirror Lake when his parachute failed to open,

The victim, Fredrick Wilton Maiella, of 2316 C Street Anchorage, had made two previous jumps within the past two weeks and was making the third of the five required static line jumps necessary to qualify before making free fall drops.

Although Maiello was wearing a reserve chest pack, he failed to activate it in time to break his fall.

Miaello's wife, also a sky diver, had just preceded him in a successful jump.

Mirror Lake has been the scene of sky diving every weekend this winter. A runway had been cleared for the planes to land, and targets for the jumpers had been placed on the ice.

for the jumpers had been placed on the ice. Surviving the victim in addition to his wife, are two daughters, his parents and a sister. He had come to Alaska last summer, and had been employed as a busdriver for the GAAB School District,

The Eagle River Fire Company Ambulance had been summoned, but was not used when it was determined that the victim was dead.

Projects to be discussed are the 3rd Annual Spring Art Show, the Tea for the Nat-ional Honor Society and the appointment of a Scholarship Committee.





Johnson, a lawver-engineer with the U.S. Public Health Service, will come to Juneau to testify.


Palmer said a hearing on Senate Bill 204, to set up special guide districts originally was slated Wednesday night, but will be postponed.

NAVY ENLISTS ALL-STATE COMPANY

ANCHORAGE: Plans for the mass enlistment of sixty young ALaskan men into the U.S. Navy on June lith as the Alaska Mt. McKinley Company were announced today by Rear Admiral Donald M. White, Commandant, 17th Navai District.

This is the third such company to be headed up by Master Chief Jerry C, Harrington, Recruiter in Charge for the State of Alaska, the first of which was the Alaska Centennial Company in 1967, followed by the Alaska Aurora Borealis Company formed in 1968.

The Mt. McKinley Company will officially be formed when its sixty members are sworn in by the Commandant of the 17th Naval District, on June lith in Anchorage. Following the swearing in, the Mt. Mc-Kinley Company will fly directly to San Diego California where the recruits will undergo Navy basic training as an All-State Commanv of the recruit training command remaining there until graduation.

The Navy Recruiting Offices in Anchorage and Juneau are now accepting applications for membership in the Alaska Mt. McKinley Company, but the deadline for such applications is 1 May 1969.

Chugiak Area youths enlisted in both the Centennial and the Aurora Borealis Companies.

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GUIDES MUST REGISTER BEAR CAMPS

He stated the camp registration regulation applies to hunters who nse aircraft as a method of transportation to and from their camps. Camps may be registered

camps may be registered with Game or Protection personnel at any permanent Fish and Game office or at Point Earrow, Point Hope or Kotzebue. Only two camps may be reg-

Only two camps may be registered by each guice and only one by each resident hunter. Non-residents may not register camps. Camp locations for the Spring Season cannot be changed after March 31, 1969.

Two new definitions will ap-pear, one to define an artificial lure, and one to clarify the bag lure, and one to clarify the bag limit. Sheefish will be added to the freshwater hook size and weight restrictions that previous-ly applied to trout, char, gray-ling and salmon. The method of taking razor clams has been expanded. SEN. GRAVEL TO ASK ALASKA HIGHWAY PAVING

U.S. Senator Mike Gravel said last week that he plans to introlast week that he plans to intro-duce legislation to authorize the paving of the Alaska Highway from the Alaska border to White horse and the unpaved Canad-ian portion of the Haines Cutoff. an portion of the Haines Cutoff. Senator Gravel said that he had discussed this proposal with other senators principally con-cerned with the Alaska High-way paving and that he expect-ed support for this new ap-proach

proach In the past, bills have been submitted to authorize the pav-ing of the entire 1,190 miles of unpaved highway, all of which unpaved highway, an or which is in Canada. Under the new bill the first portion of 388 miles would be paved, and the remain-ing portions would follow in other bills.

Earlier this month during a Earlier this month during a trip to Ottawa, Canada, Senator Gravel discussed with Federal Canadian officials the possibil-ity of paving only a portion of the highway.

the highway. Upon his return he reported the results of his discussion to Senator Mike Mansfield, Senate Majority Leader, and Senator Lee Metcalf, both of Montana. Both Senators had enthusiastic-ally supported past efforts to

"There is significant econom-ic activity on the northern end of the Highway," Senator Gravel said. "The Haines Cutoff has be-

come a main traffic artery be-cause of the Alaska M a r i n e Highway system. And further down the highway toward White-horse there is significant activ-

horse there is significant activ-ity related to recent mineral dis-coveries and development." "Further," Senator G r a v el continued, "the Haines Cutoff and the portion of the Highway between Haines Junction and the Alaska border parallels the route of an important Defense oil pipeline and is of strategic importance."

Senator Gravel said he favored the division of costs on a 50-50 hasis between Canada and the U.S.

In the past four months, the Department has responded to voer 70 complaints by Anchorage resid a.ts concerning moose in unusual and sometimes unwanted places. Often these moose are found in thickly populated reidential areas surrounded by noisy young children.

Moose appear to be complacent animals when observed in unspoiled habitat. In town moose can show a different side of their unpredictable personality. This is particularly true when their route of escape is blocked off by houses, fences, automobiles aud other strang sights and sounds. Add to this a group of children turowing rocks, beating sticks ou fence posts and trying to pet or feed the moose and you have apotentially dangerous situation.

Somerville continued by pointing out that to his knowledge it has been nine years since we have had a child severly injured by moose in Anchorage and in that case the child merely attempted to pet a calf moose.

Somerville emphasized that parents should impress upon their children they should not feed, pet, or throw snowballs at the moose. in short, they should leave the moose alone and let the moose work the problem out in its own way and time.

"It is the 43rd day (of the leg-islature) and I am still waiting for the report," Begich said. "It should have been here."


