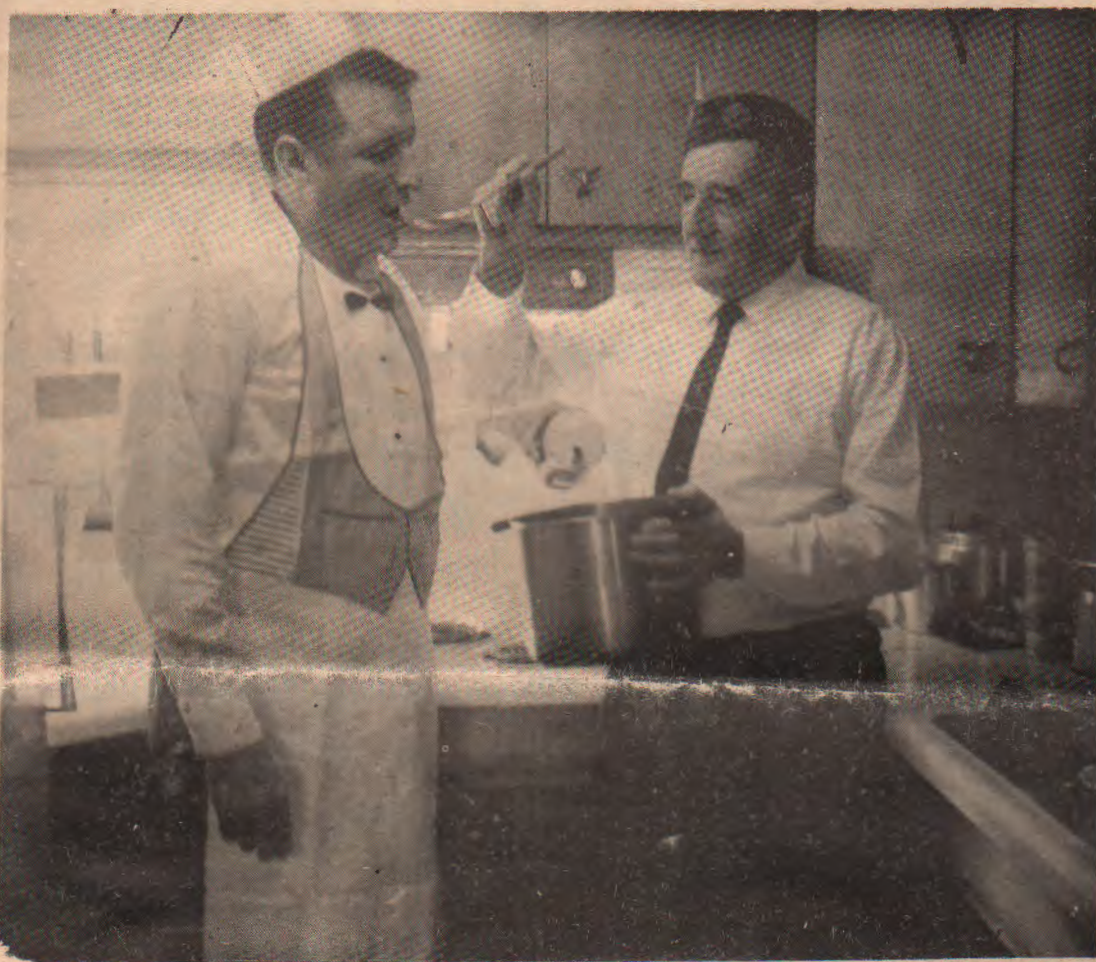


# PARACHUTIST KILLED AT MIRROR LAKE

**PETERS CREEK:** A 25 year old skydiver plunged to his death last Sunday afternoon at Mirror Lake when his parachute failed to open.

The victim, Fredrick Wilton Maiello, of 2316 C Street Anchorage, had made two previous jumps within the past two weeks and was making the third of the five required static line jumps necessary to qualify before making free fall drops.

Although Maiello was wearing a reserve chest pack, he failed to activate it in time to break his fall.

Maiello's wife, also a sky diver, had just preceded him in a successful jump.

Mirror Lake has been the scene of sky diving every weekend this winter. A runway had been cleared for the planes to land, and targets for the jumpers had been placed on the ice.

Surviving the victim in addition to his wife, are two daughters, his parents and a sister. He had come to Alaska last summer, and had been employed as a busdriver for the GAAB School District.

The Eagle River Fire Company Ambulance had been summoned, but was not used when it was determined that the victim was dead.

## MARCH 17 IS TAX DEADLINE

**ANCHORAGE:** Monday, March 17, is the deadline for several Federal tax obligations reporting on calendar-year basis.

Mr. Lesiw J. Conrad, District Director of Internal Revenue for Alaska, said that corporations must file a 1968 income tax return Form 1120, or an application for extension, Form 7004, by this date. They also must deposit at least 50% of the balance of the tax due when the return is filed or the extension requested.

Publication 542, "Corporations and Federal Income Tax," which furnishes detailed information on this subject may be obtained by dropping a post card to your District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 540, Fifth Avenue, Anchorage, Alaska.

Two ladies have donated Get Well and Birthday cards to use for this program.

Another lady has given us permission to use her home for a part of our programs. In the near future this same lady will give a craft demonstration for the elderly. Prior to the craft portion

of the program, our Health Nurse, Ardice Alton, will give a talk on general health care for the elderly. The date for this meeting has been set for March 24th at 1:45pm.

We really do appreciate all of the donations and assistance given to this program as this is the only way we are able to supply services and projects for the elderly. Thank you for your thoughtfulness.

We have an older person who needs regular or finish carpentry work. He will do indoor work at this time of year.

There is a job open for a responsible person to babysit four small children all day on Saturdays.

The Open House and dedication for low-rental units for the elderly was held last Saturday in Mt. View. Persons who are sixty two or older and in the low income level are eligible to rent these apartments. The complex includes two types of apart-

ments. One apartment is the efficiency type with combined living, and bedrooms. The other apartments have separate living and bedrooms. Refrigerators, stoves, and utilities are furnished in the rental price. This has been a much needed necessity for the elderly. We would like to see at least one unite constructed in this area.

If you would like to take part in your community affairs be sure to attend the second Tuesday of each month.

Another important date for those who are fifty-five older, is the second Friday of each month. The Anchorage OPAG meetings are held on these dates. # Tell it to Martha

Dear Martha,

I read that letter today from the woman who was criticized for not picking up the kid who was hitch-hiking.

I want you to know that I too have been criticized for not being available to supply free transportation for other people's kids 100% of the time.

It seems that everytime I go to the school to pick my kid up from some after-school activity there are two or three others waiting who just pile into my car for a free ride home. Now mind you, no one has ever asked me if I will be there to pick them up, or even if I mind giving them a ride. They just climb aboard as though it were the down-town bus.

I have never refused a kid a ride, but one time I had to go to the airport to pick up my husband after school was out, and when I picked up my own kid, I explained to the others that I wasn't going directly home, and they would have to find other transportation.

Wouldn't you know that one mother had the nerve to call me later and let me know what she thought of my leaving her kid stranded at the school. She said I should have let them know in advance that I wasn't going to be picking them up.

Martha, this kid has been riding with us almost every week, and not even once did the mother even acknowledge the fact that I was giving free transportation. Do you think I owed it to her to let her know that I wouldn't be available that day?

Technically speaking, if you had never formally agreed

to take this child home from school every week, than you weren't obliged to let the parents know when you would or would not be available.

However, have you considered that the child's mother may not have been aware that you didn't make this offer?

Frequently children will invited their friends to ride with them without informing their own parents first, and it's possible that your child may have told all his friends that his mother wouldn't mind that his mother wouldn't mind bringing him home. Also it is just as possible that the child in question had told his mother that he had a ride home with Mrs. So-and-So, without bothering to tell her that you had not invited him.

If this child has been riding home every week since the start of school, you must have had a pretty good idea that he would be expecting a ride on that particular day, and it wouldn't have hurt to tell your child that his friend would have to find other transportation that day instead of waiting until the last minute to let him find out.

I suggest that in the future in order to avoid such unpleasant misunderstandings, you make it a strict rule that you be asked in advance whether or not you can bring a child home, and then check with that child's mother to make sure she knows her youngster will be riding with you.

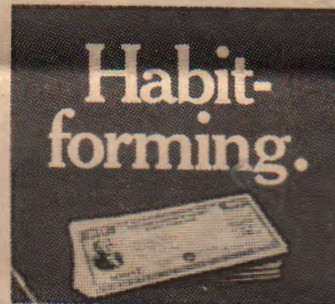

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## SENATE TO HOLD HEARING ON AIR POLLUTION

**ANCHORAGE:** Plans for the mass enlistment of sixty young Alaskan men into the U.S. Navy on June 11th as the Alaska Mt. McKinley Company were announced today by Rear Admiral Donald M. White, Commandant, 17th Naval District.

This is the third such company to be headed up by Master Chief Jerry C. Harrington, Recruiter in Charge for the State of Alaska, the first of which was the Alaska Centennial Company in 1967, followed by the Alaska Aurora Borealis Company formed in 1968.

The Mt. McKinley Company will officially be formed when its sixty members are sworn in by the Commandant of the 17th Naval District, on June 11th in Anchorage. Following the swearing in, the Mt. McKinley Company will fly directly to San Diego California where the recruits will undergo Navy basic training as an All-State Company of the recruit training command - remaining there until graduation.

The Navy Recruiting Offices in Anchorage and Juneau are now accepting applications for membership in the Alaska Mt. McKinley Company, but the deadline for such applications is 1 May 1969.

Chugiak Area youths enlisted in both the Centennial and the Aurora Borealis Companies.

**REGISTER**  
**BEAR CAMPS**

**ANCHORAGE:** Ronald J. Sommerville, Regional Supervisor for Southcentral Alaska, stated that guides and resident bear hunters on the Alaska Peninsula must register their camps prior to April 1, 1969.

He stated the camp registration regulation applies to hunters who use aircraft as a method of transportation to and from their camps.

Camps may be registered with Game or Protection personnel at any permanent Fish and Game office or at Point Barrow, Point Hope or Kotzebue.

Only two camps may be registered by each guide and only one by each resident hunter.

Non-residents may not register camps. Camp locations for the Spring Season cannot be changed after March 31, 1969.

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## SNOGOS AND CYCLES TABOO AT SCHOOL

ANCHORAGE: Snowmobile and motorcycle enthusiasts are reminded that motorized vehicles are not allowed on the Anchorage Borough School District playgrounds at any time, William W. Klinger, assistant superintendent for school facilities, announced today.

These vehicles are hazardous to children playing on the school grounds, and they may also cause damage to the grounds.

Repeated use of the vehicles on school property may result in legal action against the violator.

Klinger added, "In November we reminded snowmobilers that they were not allowed on the school grounds, and right after our announcement, we had excellent cooperation from them. During the past month, however, many principals have reported numerous difficulties with the machines on school property. We hope the owners of these vehicles will help us to keep the school ground a safe place for our children to play."

## NEW SPORT FISHING REGS. SOON HERE

The 1969 Alaska Sport Fishing Regulations will soon be available to the public, Alex H. McRae, sport fish director for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, has announced. They will include several changes recently adopted by the Board of Fish and Game at their Juneau meeting.

Two new definitions will appear, one to define an artificial lure, and one to clarify the bag limit. Sheefish will be added to the freshwater hook size and weight restrictions that previously applied to trout, char, grayling and salmon. The method of taking razor clams has been expanded. The special char limits have been deleted throughout the State.

In the Kenai Peninsula freshwater areas, any fish hooked elsewhere than in the mouth, head or gills must be immediately released. The Cooper Creek salmon fishing closure has been deleted. Anchor River, Crooked Creek, Deep Creek, Ninilchik River and Starriski Creek will be closed to all fishing from May 1 through June 30 except during the king salmon punch card fishery on Anchor and Ninilchik Rivers and Deep Creek. The king salmon punch card fishery will open on May 24 and close by field announcement no later than June 8 on Anchor River, Ninilchik River and Deep Creek. The king salmon quota for these combined three systems will be 200 fish over 20 inches. The Kenai River from its mouth to the mouth of Soldotna Creek will be open to king salmon fishing from July 14 through July 27 with no quota.

The punch card system and bag limit will apply here however.

In Upper Cook Inlet the Caswell and Little Willow Creek salmon closures have been deleted. Cottonwood Creek, Wasilla, will be closed to fishing from May 1 through June 14, as will Wolverine Lake outlet. The king salmon punch card fishery season will be from June 7 until closed by field announcement no later than June 22. The quota in open areas will be 500 kings over 20 inches.

## SEN. GRAVEL TO ASK ALASKA HIGHWAY PAVING

U.S. Senator Mike Gravel said last week that he plans to introduce legislation to authorize the paving of the Alaska Highway from the Alaska border to Whitehorse and the unpaved Canadian portion of the Haines Cutoff. Senator Gravel said that he had discussed this proposal with other senators principally concerned with the Alaska Highway paving and that he expected support for this new approach.

In the past, bills have been submitted to authorize the paving of the entire 1,190 miles of unpaved highway, all of which is in Canada. Under the new bill the first portion of 388 miles would be paved, and the remaining portions would follow in other bills.

Earlier this month during a trip to Ottawa, Canada, Senator Gravel discussed with Federal Canadian officials the possibility of paving only a portion of the highway.

Upon his return he reported the results of his discussion to Senator Mike Mansfield, Senate Majority Leader, and Senator Lee Metcalf, both of Montana. Both Senators had enthusiastically supported past efforts to

pave the Alaska Highway.

Senator Gravel said he believed that a partial paving effort might have more appeal to the Congress and the Canadian Parliament, rather than a total package.

"There is significant economic activity on the northern end of the Highway," Senator Gravel said.

"The Haines Cutoff has become a main traffic artery because of the Alaska Marine Highway system. And further down the highway toward Whitehorse there is significant activity related to recent mineral discoveries and development."

"Further," Senator Gravel continued, "the Haines Cutoff and the portion of the Highway between Haines Junction and the Alaska border parallels the route of an important Defense oil pipeline and is of strategic importance."

Senator Gravel said he favored the division of costs on a 50-50 basis between Canada and the U.S.

**DON'T MESS WITH MOOSE!**

ANCHORAGE: Ronald J. Sommerville, Regional Game Supervisor for Southcentral Alaska, cautioned local residents to control their children's curiosity when moose are in their yards.

In the past four months, the Department has responded to over 70 complaints by Anchorage residents concerning moose in unusual and sometimes unwanted places. Often these moose are found in thickly populated residential areas surrounded by noisy young children.

Moose appear to be complacent animals when observed in unspoiled habitat. In town moose can show a different side of their unpredictable personality. This is particularly true when their route of escape is blocked off by

houses, fences, automobiles and other strange sights and sounds. Add to this a group of children throwing rocks, beating sticks on fence posts and trying to pet or feed the moose and you have a potentially dangerous situation.

Somerville continued by pointing out that to his knowledge it has been nine years since we have had a child severely injured by moose in Anchorage and in that case the child merely attempted to pet a calf moose.

Somerville emphasized that parents should impress upon their children they should not feed, pet, or throw snowballs at the moose. In short, they should leave the moose alone and let the moose work the problem out in its own way and time.

Families living on Eklutna Lake Road are seeking signatures for a petition to the state department of highways asking year-around maintenance of the road.

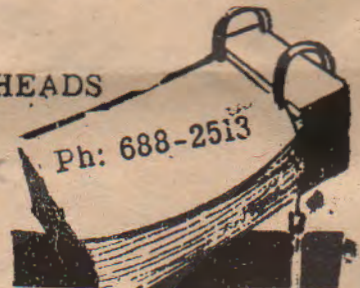
At present, the road is maintained by the state only during the summer months. Twelve school-aged children live on the road and it's up to the parents to get them to school.

The Greater Anchorage School District has promised school bus service as soon as the state begins to maintain it regularly. The children would attend Chugiak schools.

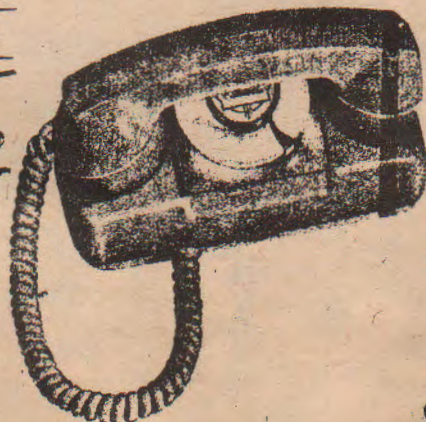

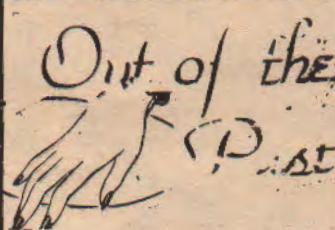
