

**LOCAL MAN WOUNDED IN KENAI SHOOTING**



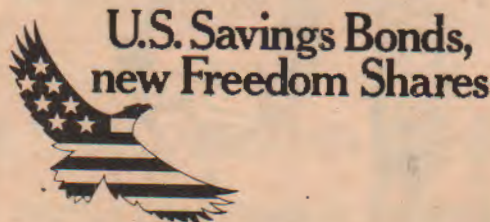
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ANCHORAGE: Billy L. Connell, of Eagle River is in Providence Hospital gravely wounded from a shotgun blast received last Saturday night in a Kenai shooting spree.

Connell, age 22, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Connell of the Pippel subdivision in Eagle River. He had been working in the oil field at Kenai, and at the time of the shooting had been preparing to ship out to the North Slope.

Connell received his wound when he was trying to disarm an angered gunman, Elgie E. Dudley at the Lamplighter Bar 18 miles north of Kenai.

Also shot and killed by Dudley was Morris R. Mooney, 28 of Palmer.

Connell was airlifted to Anchorage where he underwent extensive surgery at Providence Hospital.

A friend of the Connell family described the wound as a gaping hole just below the ribs on the left side. He had been so close to the gun when it was discharged, that pieces of the wadding were found inside his body. One kidney was reported to have been completely shattered, and a section of the intestine was so damaged that it had to be removed. Connell has regained consciousness, but was reported to be in extremely critical condition.

Dudley, who had attempted to flee the scene of the shooting had found it necessary to abandon his pick-up truck when it became stuck. He fled on foot, and was found early Monday morning less than a mile from the scene of the shooting, dead from an apparent self-inflicted blast of the shotgun. Troopers had been tracking Dudley with the aid of a police dog when they came upon his body.

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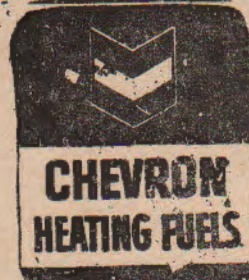
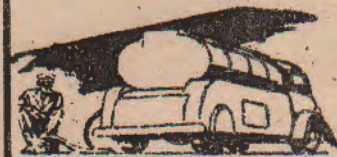
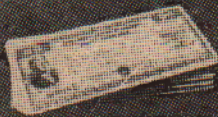
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## NEW ADDRESS FOR TAX RETURNS

ANCHORAGE: Alaskan employers filing wage and excise tax returns with the Internal Revenue Service should now send them to the IRS regional service center at 1160 West 1200 South Street, Ogden, Utah 84405, instead of the district office.

Envelopes addressed to the service center are included in the tax-forms package mailed to employers.

Mr. Lewis J. Conrad, District Director of Internal Revenue for Alaska, said that mailing tax returns directly to the service center will save the government several million dollars a year in shipping and handling costs. Congress enacted the direct mail requirement in 1966 and IRS is introducing it in stages.

Currently, the requirement applies to employers' wage and excise returns, Forms 941 and 720, in Alaska. Railroad retirement tax returns CT-1 and CT-2 also should be sent directly to the service center.

The new mailing requirement will not disturb the relationship existing between the taxpayer and local IRS offices, Mr. Conrad said. "All the services that have been provided taxpayers in the past from the district and local offices will continue to be

provided at the same locations," he said.

"By shifting the many clerical operations to the service centers, the local Internal Revenue Service office staffs are free to increase taxpayer services." Mr. Conrad has emphasized.

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## BUSSING TO START FOR EKLUTNA LAKE ROAD STUDENTS

ANCHORAGE: Plans to provide school bus transportation for the children of families living on Eklutna Lake Road are underway, according to Mr. Nodell of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School District.

This action follows an announcement last week that

the Alaska Department of Highways would maintain the Road, a requisit before the Borough would establish a bus route there.

It was determined that there are three school age children living on the Eklutna Lake Road. Of these 3 are in the 1st grade, one in the 2nd grade, one in 3rd, one in 4th, one in 5th, one in 7th and one in 8th. This will mean that seven of the nine are elementary school students, while one will

have to attend the 7th grade at Birchwood Elementary and one the 8th grade at Chugiak High School.

It is possible, it was said that the elementary school students will be enrolled at Birchwood, rather than at Chugiak Elementary to make it easier to bus them all at one time.

Arrangements for a bus are presently being made through the State office in Juneau which controls school bus transportation.

The Eklutna Lake youngsters will have their school bus as soon as possible, with the beginning of next week as the target date.

This achievement is a victory for the Eklutna Lake families who have petitioning for the State to maintain the road in order that they might be able to be provided a school bus. A petition with over 4,000 names was being prepared to send to Juneau when the word came through that the road would be maintained.

## TAX PAYMENT ENFORCEMENT

**ANCHORAGE:** The enforcing of tax collections by levying on income and property of delinquent taxpayers becomes mandatory if they don't pay up, Internal Revenue officials said today.

Lewis J. Conrad, Director of Internal Revenue for Alaska said some taxpayers mistakenly think they can arrange payment at their convenience, while others ignore their tax delinquency notices.

However, he emphasized, full payment is required by law, and without delay -- or otherwise lien and levy action is immediately taken against the delinquent taxpayers income or other property.

Mr. Conrad explained the following reasons for the government's tax collection enforcement policy:

1. The Internal Revenue Service is held responsible for honest, fair and impartial enforcement of the Federal tax laws.
2. It is not impartial treatment to allow some taxpayers extended time while the great majority pay their taxes when they should, often making sacrifices to do so -- therefore, no discrimination is allowed.

He said enforced collection actions also include closures of business operations when their employees income tax and social security are not protected by the depositing of taxes withheld from their wages.

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## LOCAL BABE RUTH MEETING CALLED

**BIRCHWOOD:** A meeting of all boys interested in playing Babe Ruth baseball during the coming season has been called for tomorrow evening, March 27th in Room 4 at Chugiak High School.

Parents are urged to attend the meeting, which will start at 7:30pm.

Ages for Babe Ruth League teams are 13 through 15. Any boy who will be 13 before August 1st, or who will not be 16 before August 1st is eligible to participate.

The local Babe Ruth team will again be sponsored by the Eagle River Branch, First National Bank of Anchorage, who has sponsored the team since it was established three years ago.

Coaches for the coming season will be Marv Stratton and Wiley Armstrong. Both have previous coaching experience and have been active with Little League in this area.

During the meeting, information on league rules, playing schedules and practice and tryout schedules will be announced. Also to be presented will be a demonstration by Chugiak area members of the 1968 Babe Ruth State Championship team who will show how bases are stolen and how to defend against stealing, which is the biggest change in playing to be faced by boys moving up from Little League.

The Anchorage Babe Ruth League, sponsored by Boys Clubs of Alaska, is planning to supplement the regular program with a subsidiary league made up of 13 and 14 year old players. If there

are enough boys from this area in this age group who are not selected for the Bankers team, it may be possible to make up a second team to play in this league.

A shortage of playing fields in the Anchorage area will result in greater utilization of the local park on Oberg Road in Peters Creek this year. A tentative playing schedule calls for 21 games for each of the league's 16 teams, with the first game to be played on May 15.

An innovation this year will be the use of a pitching machine purchased by the league. The machine will be utilized for indoor batting practice, using special balls which will not harm the building. Indoor practice will be necessary due to the early opening date.

## BIDS ASKED FOR FISHHOOK ROAD PROJECT

Commissioner of Highways C. E. Steen announced Monday that the Department of Highways will begin advertising for construction of Project S-0580 (9), Junction of FAP 42 Fishhook Junction, located approximately 1.5 miles north of Palmer.

Construction will consist of grading and drainage of 6.9 miles of roadway, which will provide an all-weather driving surface 34 feet wide.

Advertising will begin on March 21, with bids to be opened in the commissioner's office in Douglas on April 17.

Completion of this project is scheduled for July 31, 1970.

This project is being advertised in accordance with the requirements of the 1968 Federal-Aid Highway Act which promulgates the Equal Employment Opportunity Program," Steen said. "Pre-qualification of all prospective bidders, under this program, is a mandatory requirement."
