

FIRE COMPANY SAVES 2 HOMES

BIRTHDAY GIFT ONE YEAR LATE

EAGLE RIVER: One year late, but worth waiting for, is the way that Dr. Tom Green feels concerning a brand new 1969 Edition of "Clinical Toxicology of Commercial Products", which had been ordered for him as a birthday gift from the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area.

This book, which had been ordered for presentation at the St. Patrick's Day Reception which was held for Dr. Green in 1968, had been tied up at the publishers while the latest revised edition was being prepared for the press. The book is an outstanding asset for anyone dealing with accidental poisonings. It contains a breakdown of constituents with regard to their toxicity of practically any commercial product available on the market.

When interviewed, Dr. Green mentioned that he soon is to initiate a program whereby a vital first aid remedy, with directions for use can be placed in all the homes in the Greater Chugiak Area.

Since starting practice here on October 16, 1967, Dr. Green stated he has received from 40 to 50 calls regarding accidental poisoning. Of all these, perhaps 5 required active treatment past the usual first aid, Dr. Green concluded.

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company responded to two calls last week, and in each instance held the damage to a minimum.

On Sunday, March 2nd at 9:30pm, they answered a call to the Bruce Cooper residence on Oberg's Road, where an overheated oil furnace had just begun to scorch the floor joists of the building.

The firemen were able to cool down the timbers without appreciable damage.

The firemen praised Mrs. Cooper for having called the Fire Company immediately upon becoming aware of the problem. "Unfortunately" a spokesman for the Fire Company said, "most people are reluctant to call for help until there is a raging fire going. We would much rather get there before there is serious trouble."

Earlier in the week, on February 26th, an overheated space heater caused a fire at the Eychaner residence on Birchwood Loop Road.

A neighbor who noticed smoke issuing from the basement of the Eychaner residence notified the fire company.

The Fire Company responded immediately, and damage was limited to burned floor timbers and smoke damage.

The Eychaners are still able to occupy the house while repairs are being made. The loss was covered by insurance, according to the Fire company spokesman.

JUNEAU: Have you ever thought of owning a cannery in a picturesque Southeast Alaska fishing community? Here is your opportunity.

The Alaska Department of Economic Development announced that the cannery at Hydaburg is for sale. The complex, consisting of two large warehouses, boiler room, dock, a heavy machine shop, and housing units, can be utilized immediately as a seafood processing plant or could be converted to other uses of an industrial or recreational nature.

Commissioner Frank E. Murkowski stated that the sale of the cannery is a joint effort between the Hydaburg Cooperative Association, the Department of Economic Development, the Presbyterian Church, and the Bureau of

Indian Affairs. A special brochure is available with detailed information on the particulars of the sale. The brochures is available through any of the four agencies.

Hydaburg, a community of 230, is located 50 miles west of Ketchikan on Prince of Wales Island. It is the center of one of the most productive fishing grounds in the world.

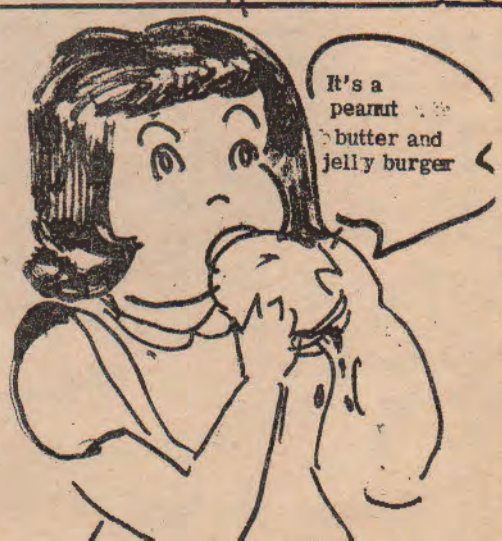

SENATOR TELLS OF GRANT

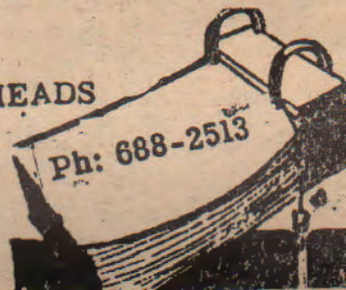
