

TWO LOCAL MEN FOR MEA BOARD

DISCIPLINE IN LOCAL SCHOOLS TO BE SUBJECT OF MEETING

BIRCHWOOD: A group which calls itsoif "The Steering Committee for better class room atmosphere" has sent letters to all 'amilies in the Greater Chugiak Area, in-viting them to attend a pub-lic meeting at the Birch-

wood Elementary School . on Thursday, April 17th at 7:00pm.

According to the letter the purpose of the meeting is to discuss behavior patterns of the students at the local sch-ools and on the school buses and to determine the responsibility of the parents and the teachers on matters of discipline.

Upon questioning school officials, it was learned that a meeting had been scheduled for that night, but for a dif-ferent reason than that outferent removed lined in the letter.

According to Mr. Jack McCarl, acting Principal at Birchwood Elementary Sch-ool there was an orientation ool there was an orientation meeting scheduled for par-ents of students who will be entering the seventh grade next year to acquaint them with the Chugiak Junior High program. He said that he had not been aware that the steering committee had sent the letters calling a public meeting until a copy was brought to his attention by

a parent who had received one in the mail. The existance of a commun-

ication gap becomes evident upon interviewing Mrs. J.

Duane Williams, a member of the "Steering Committee" who claimed that she had talked with school officials about the meeting prior to sending out the letters, and had received their approval of the meeting, .

Mrs. Williams said that she and the other members of the committee were concerned with the lack of interest some teachers appear in maintaining discipline in the schools; and while she admitted that the opening statement of the letter that teach-ers had been told to carry side-arms to protect them from the students referred to an item she had heard ab-out a school on the Chicago area and not local schools,

OLD CHUGLAK: Plans to lease the old Chugiak Community Club meeting hall were announced today by Mrs. Pat Sherman, spokesman for the local branch of OPAG Older Persons Action Group. According to Mrs. Sherman,

OPAG is negotiating a ten year lease with the Chugiak Benefit Association for the building which is located at Mile 201/2

Mrs. Sherman said that the building will serve as an of-fice for the OPAG Community Aides, and also as a meeting hall, lounge and recreation center for OPAG.

She mentioned plans to drill a well, and to clear a picnic area on the grounds.

The building, which was or-iginally built as a meeting house for the Chugiak Com-munity Club back in the 1940's has been used in recent years by other organizations such as the VFW, the Chugiak Volun-teer Fire Company and the Chugiak Obedience Training Club.

The purpose of the meeting is to elect all of the officers to serve the Federal Com-munity Credit Union,


Frank Eaton, our hard work-ing boss, headed up this very necessary union which has been sponsored all the way by the Older Persons Action
