EAGLE RIVER BOWL TO RE-OPEN

NEW HIGHWAY WELL AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

CHUGIAK: Work on the new highway between Eagle River and Peters Creek is progressing well ahead of schedule and may be completed almost one year ahead of the deadline, according to Mr. Fred Walter, Project Engineer for contractor.

Walters stated that the entire project is about 15% completed. He said that the relocation of ACS telephone poles has just been completed, and that the work on the new Peters Creek bridge is well under way. All four of of the columns of the two piers have been poured and the caps are scheduled to be poured this coming week.

He also stated that all of the clearing is completed and the eight areas of marsh which existed on the road right of way have been excavated and back-filled. Also, the north-end of the Birchwood Road has been relocated, which will serve as the access to the new highway from the present Glenn Highway and the Birch-wood Loop. Also, he said the approach to the new bridge from the south is completed and work is set to begin on the approach from the north.

Original completion date the road was July 31st, 0. Walters said that all of the work with the exceptof the work with the exception of the paving will be completed by the end of July or the beginning of August of 1969. Paving will be started as soon as the equipment can be released from a job which this company is engaged in at Fairbanks. If there is no delay in getting the equipment down, Walters said, the entire project should be completed by September 1st or pleted by September 1st or the middle of September. A delay in getting the equipment would mean October, or early spring before paving would be finished, he coneluded.

LOCAL BOYS EXCEL IN A.A.U. JUNIOR OLYMPICS

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Chugiak Area can well be proud of the fifteen representatives who participated in the annual Junior Olympic Wrestling Tournament which was held in Anchorage this past weekend.

With only fifteen boys to represent us against over 340 of the best in the State of Alaska, our boys came home with ten medals; three gold, three silver and four bronze.

Our representatives showed true sprotsmanship during the contests and perfect conduct off the mat during the entire tournament, and certainly were ambassadors to be proud of in front of the visitors who came from all over the State of Alaska for this contest.

We have been told that Fairbanks has a similar law which greatly reduces taxes for the elderly. As a rule, persons sixty five or older are on a very limited income. In many cases, older persons are forced to borrow money to pay their taxes in order to live in their own homes.

Someday this bill will effect your life. We hope that you will join us in supporting this bill by contacting your congressman.

Another bill under consideration is opposed by OPAG. It is H.B. # 282 which would provide elderly people with twenty five years residence in

Alaska with a supplementary income of \$250 per month.
OPAG opposes this bill for

the following reasons: Residency requirements regarded as unjust in social legislation. This would benefit a segment of the population, rather that provide these benefits according to needs. It would also provide supplementary income regardless of other income.
