PAUL MITCHELL - OLDEST 31 MILE WALKER

ANCHORAGE: A 70 year old pioneer Chugiak homesteader was the oldest person to complete the 31 mile "Walk for the Children of Biafra" held in Anchorage last Saturday.

Paul Mitchell, who has a homestead at mile 18 in Old Chugiak not walked the entire distance, but toward the end was offering help and encouragement to younger walkers who were experiencing difficulties.

Completing walking contests is not a new experience for Mitchell. In January of 1963, when he was only 64 years young, he was one of 72 persons out of a field of 482 who completed the famed fifty mile hike from Palmer to Anchorage.

Mitchell came to Alaska in 1945, and homesteaded in Chugiak twenty years ago in 1949. He has always done a great deal of walking, and thought nothing of hiking into Anchorage for supplies and then turning around and hiking back. The sight of him striding along the road with a pack on his back has been a familiar one.

Word is that Mitchell has apparently suffered no adverse effects from his recent walk.

Other participants in the walk from the Greater Chugiak Area include a number of Chugiak High School students. Andy Kirk, Social Studies teacher at Chugiak High and one of the sponsors of the "walk" said that he did not have a complete list of those who participated nor a figure of the total collected in pledges by the local participants. However, he said that he hoped that by next week he would have this information along with a list and pictures of those who completed the entire distance.

Word from the "Walk for the Children of Biafra" Headquarters, is that the local walkers have by far gone over the top of the goal which had been set.

Final figures of the money raised will not be available until all pledges have been redeemed, however, The Alaskan group showed a greater percentage of those who started finishing than in walks held in cities in the South 48. Out of the 2700 who started the walk, 1137 made it all the way.

BIRCHWOOD PTA TO DISCUSS FALLOUT SHELTERS

BIRCHWOOD: The Birchwood Elementary School PTA will meet on Monday, May 19th at 7:30pm.

A program on the feasibility of fallout protection in schools including the new addition to the Birchwood Elementary school is planned.

This should be a very interesting and informative program for the entire community and both the Eagle River and Chugiak Elementary School PTA's have been invited to attend. To date only the Eagle River PTA has indicated acceptance.

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WOMEN VOTERS EXPLAIN CONSENSUS

CHUGIAK: A n explanation of how the League of Women Voters arrives at a consensus is explained this week by Mrs. Robert Kallenberg of the Chugiak Area unit of the Anchorage League.

Mrs. Kallenberg stated that recently the League came to Consensus on unification and as a result there has been some misunderstanding about how the League arrives at consensus and what it means.

Consensus, according to Mrs. Kallenberg, does not mean either a unanimous decision or even a simple majority. It means that when a substantial number of member, representative of the group as a whole are in agreement, the Board can deter-

mine a stand for or against an issue in the name of the League.

Individual members do not have to support consensus. They are free to express their opinions, but they do so as individuals and not as a part of the League.

For those interested in how League operates, Mrs. Kallenberg offered the following brief outline.

League members meet in small groups or "Units" to discuss the issues chosen for study at the Annual Meeting. Before these discussions take place, however, one or two members from each Unit meet in study groups which find all the material they can on the subject, interview individuals in positions of authority and learn all they can. This material is studied and discussed and broken down so that the most important facts are outlined. The members in the study groups are then discussion leaders at unit meet-

ings so that all members may become informed on the issue, for and against. After the information has been presented, members ask questions, express opinions and and discuss the problem thoroughly - often long past the time they should be getting home.

The study group does not come to a decision as a group. Their job is to present the information they have learned. Reports of the discussions at the unit meetings are sent to the Chairman of the study group for Board consideration.

After the issue has been discussed at several meetings, a consensus meeting is held at which the members attempt to come to an agreement. The board considers the results of the meetings and if a substantial number of members are in agreement, the League can then take an active part in fighting for or against the issue. The consensus is not taken as units, there is no policy expressed by the study group, there is no action taken by the League until the Board expresses the results of the

consensus and its statement of position.

Members who do not support the consensus are still valuable in circulating information so that the public can be fully informed. The opinions of dissenters can also point up problems in the issue that need special study.

Mrs. Kallenberg concluded that any woman interested in good government will find League interesting and worthwhile.

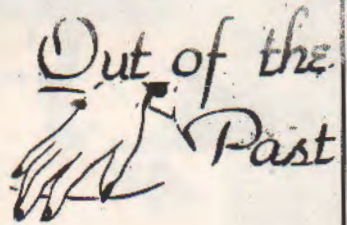

Two persons were referred to other jobs and requests taken for jobs or assistance. Many hours were spent trying to locate someone to assist in an emergency, or to find someone who can fill a job.

We have had several requests for mature baby sitters to live in for a short time while parents are away. These workers would be in complete charge during this time.

There has been openings for women to do day work, live in during a family emergency or care for those just home from the hospital.

Right now we have in our files job applications from two ladies who want to do baby sitting in their homes, a carpenter who wants work and another who wants to ironing.

If you need work, or need someone to do a job, call us so that we may put your request into our files.

We take requests from young and old. In this way we are able to gain work for the elderly or find a helper for them when they need one.

We will be making a conducted tour of Elmendorf Air Force Base on May 21. On May 28 we are having a wig style show.

You are eligible to join in on the fun and trips if you are fifty five or older.

We are sending out a S.O.S. for volunteer drivers. If you have a car and would like to help with this program, call us. Each driver is paid 15 cents a mile.
