AN ANSWER TO "WHAT IS CBA"

CHUGIAK With the announcement of the General Membership meeting of the Chugiak Benefit Association on June 19th, the question has been posed by many of the new residents of this area, "What is CBA?"

Since it is important that everyone understand just what is CBA, and why it is important to every resident of the Greater Chugiak Area,

Dale Briggs, Chairman of the • CBA Board of Directors has drafted the following article giving the purpose and background of this organization.

'The Chugiak Benefit Association is made up of every resident over the age of thirteen (13) that has resided in the Greater Chugiak Area (Eagle River, Fire Lake, Old Chugiak, Birchwood and Peters Creek) for over thirty

LOCAL VOTERS REJECT MANAGER AND BONDS

CHUGIAK: The light vote predicted in the special Borough Election was evident in the Greater Chuglak Area with only 178 votes being cast in the combined precincts at the Eagle River School; and 176 votes at the combined Chuglak, Birchwood and Peters Creek Precincts at the Chugiak Elementary School.

At the Eagle River precincts the voters turned thumbs down on the Borough Manager plan, voting 137 No on proposition D, as opposed to 40 who voted "Yes".

On proposition A. (School improvement) it was a close 78 "yes" to 77 "no". Proposition B (Sanitary Sewers) was turned down with a vote

LOCAL YOUTH INJURED IN FREAK ACCIDENT

OLD CHUGIAK: A nintee. year old Chugiak area youth was rushed to Providence Hospital early Tuesday morning when two fingers of his left hand were partially severed.

Mike smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Smith of Old Chugiak said that the injury took place when the shifting lever of his mini-bike broke off. Mike reached under the bike and was attempting to hand shift it, when the bike jumped into gear, and his fingers became caught between the chain and the sprocket. Mike said that it place at 2:30am near the entrance to his road on the Gleun Highway. He managed to extract his mangled hand

EAGLE RIVER: One of the more prominent landmarks in the Greater Chuglak Area ceased to exist on Monday night, when fire completely destroyed the Red Barn at mile 15, Glenn Highway. The Eagle River Volunteer

The Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company received the call at around 11:00pm. The fire was reported by a tenant of one of the apartments in the Big Country Shopping Center, which is located next to the Barn.

Tom Take, Eagle River Fire Chief, stated that the fire apparently had started somewhere in the second floor dining room, as the top of the building was afire when the equipment arrived.

Eagle River was assisted by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company and the Ft. Richardson Fire Department. The biggest problem faced by the fire fighters was in getting enough water, as they emptied tanker after tanker on the burning building.

The Barn was the largest structure in the area, and was of wood construction with the interior one large open room, making it impossible to contain the fire. Owners of the building Mr.

Owners of the building Mr. and Mrs. George O'Barts, of Eagle River, built the Barn in the summer of 1966. Almost overnight it became one of the most popular night spots in the State - a Mecca for Country - Western music fans, featuring big name stars from all over the country. The Barn was presently under lease to Mr. and Mrs. Ed Nelson of Anchorage. Mrs. Pat Baskett was leasing the kitchen.

Mrs. O'Barts stated that the loss was approximately 2/3 covered by insurance. She said that they hoped to rebuild as soon as possible at the same location. She said that the lessee had contracts with many musical stars and would have to cancell some of them until a place could be built where he could honor these contracts.

The Barn was closed on Monday night, and there was no one on the premises at the time the fire broke out.



SOME HISTORIC BACKGROUND

The Suk Arm Courier has always been aware of the importance of the Chugtak Benefit Association, and the role it has played in coordinating the efforts of the civic and service groups of the community. For this reason we would

For this reason we would like to add a little historic background to Mr. Brigg's excellent article on page 1 to provide answers to some questions which may have not been satisfied.

The Chnglak Benefit Association came into existance in 1954, when the many clubs and non-profit organizations of the Greater Chuglak Area decided that a joint effort at raising funds for their various projects might be better than the many bake and rummage sales which they had depended on in the past. The voted to pool their efforts and hold a Spring Carnival, with all groups involved to share in the profits.

The first Carnival was held at mile 14, on the property now occupied by the Eagle River Elementry School. In 1955 a second Carnival was held at that location. The following year, CBA was able to file on a plot of over 30 acres located at mile 21 Glenn Highway. This was to be a permanent site for the Car-Carnival.

This land was eventually patented to the Chugiak Benefit Association to be used for recreational purposes for the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area. Permanent buildings were erected here, the most prominent of which is the quonset shaped Carnival Hall. The annual Carnival was held here every Memorial Day weekend through 1959. I say ideally, because the board of directors is the coordinating center for the organizations of the community.

anizations of the community, The Board itself cannot initiate activities which include the community as a whole. The board can only coordinate the efforts of any group of organizations within the community that wish to sponsor some activity, such as the carnival. The carnival was a joint effort of the organizations of the community, not of the board.

The only really important function of the board is to protect for the community the holdings of the community, such as the property which is known as the Carnival Grounds - protect them from loss by legal means such as failing to pay taxes on assessments. The holdings of the Association are secure. All debts against the association are met. All taxes and assessments are paid.

In the upcoming annual meeting I hope the community will respond to its responsibility and elect members to the board according to the By-Laws in order that the Chugiak Benefit Association may function as it is intended.

PARTIES

The Alaska State Office of the Bureau of Land Management has announced that survey parties are presently stationed Juneau, Gakona, Copper Center Cantwell, Willow, Galena, China nik Lake and Fairbanks.

Surveys consist of surveying state selection applications, homesites, homesteads, community grants, townsites, trade and manufacturing sites. and headquarter sites.

Survey parties are usually composed of four to six menwith the field party surveying state selected applications having 12 men assigned to the crew and helicopter support.

Survey parties assigned to the Copper Center and Willow areas will remain in the area through September. Other assignments will generally last from four to six weeks.

Property owners are remind ed that although permane n i type monuments will be set during course of survey, the survey is not official until the field returns are prepared, reviewed and approved by the Alaska state and Washington offices of the Bureau of Land Management.




