

HEARING DATE SET FOR BOWLING ALLEY LICENSE

ANCHORAGE: Claude Millsap Jr., Director of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, has taken issue with a statement published in a recent issue of the Knik Arm Courier. This statement, which was made by Ed James who is planning to re-open the bowling alley in Eagle River, was to the effect that he had been advised by a member of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, that "the issuance of the license might possibly be expedited if Chugiak Area residents would either call or write the Board and indicate their support of the bowling alley, and tell of the need for this recreation facility to reopen."

Mr. Millsap stated "Please be advised that I, as Director or the Board member did not tell Mr. James any such thing. The Board does not take an official position on either seeking support, for, or against, any application filed with this agency for a liquor license."

"We do have the responsibility, when requested to advise the applicant or protesters what the law calls for in either support or non support of a liquor license application."

The Board makes its rulings on provisions of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board Laws and Regulations and does not take a public stand in the matters coming before the Board."

When advised of Mr. Millsap's statement, Mr. James said that he regretted having asked people to call the Alcoholic Beverage Control Office, and did not realize at the time that they were not equipped to handle any large number of incoming calls.

However, James would still like to have those who favor the re-opening of the bowling alley to write to Mr. Millsap.

James said that he had talked to a great many local residents who indicated that they were very anxious to see the facility re-opened; however, it appeared that the only ones who were making the effort to bring their views to the attention of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board were a few dissenters. James explained that all pertinent material is considered when the

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BRIDGE BUILDERS SEEK TO END RACIAL PROBLEMS

CHUGIAK: A group of Chugiak Area residents, of different racial backgrounds, have joined with a similar group from the Anchorage area and have formed an organization which they have called "Bridge Builders."

The purpose of the Bridge Builders is to seek better understanding and communication between races through education, dialogue, and friendship.

This group has been meeting in each other homes, and in this way have gotten to know each other on an informal basis. As membership increases, this group will split in to smaller groups in order to maintain the close informal atmosphere which is achieved by being able to meet in private homes.

The next meeting of the

Bridge Builders will take place on Saturday, June 21st, a 2:00pm at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Swanson in Old Chugiak.

The meeting will include a discussion led by Mrs. Beeman on notes from the book "Crisis in Black and White". Those who do not know the way to the Swanson home may meet at the Chugiak Post Office (Mile 19 Glenn Highway, across from the Chugiak Elementary School), at 1:45pm for directions. Babysitting will be provided.

It has been learned through some of these discussions that many whites do not realize the extent to which discrimination is practiced in the Anchorage area, nor do they have any idea of what it feels like to be a Negro or native in Alaska. Also many Negroes and natives need to know how white people think, and to know that white people care about them. It has also been determined that neither negroes nor whites realize the enormous

problem the Alaskan native has in trying to exist in two very different cultures.

The Bridge Builders have as yet not determined what, if any racial problem exists in the Greater Chugiak Area. For this reason they have requested any member of a minority group who may have encountered discrimination in any form in this area to please bring it to their attention.

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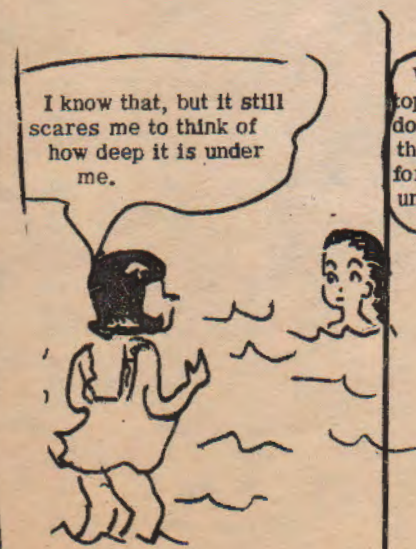

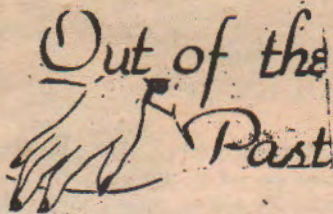

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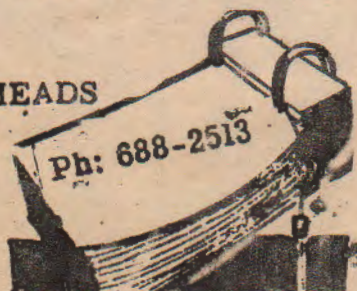

They lack the experience of the other teams in the league, but that is coming with every game.

These boys brought home a State Championship in Little League, and their manager believes they will also bring home a Championship Babe Ruth team in the next couple of years.

MINOR INJURIES IN FIRE LAKE ACCIDENT

FIRE LAKE: There were only minor injuries resulting from a collision of a private car and a State of Alaska Department of Highways road equipment on Tuesday, June 12, at 2:45pm.

The accident took place on the Glenn Highway, just south of Fish Hatchery Road.

A 1958 Minneapolis-Moline tractor with a heavy road sweeper attached was proceeding south at slow speed and creating a cloud of dust.

Mrs. Bonnie L. Holland, of Birchwood driving a 1963 Ford Station Wagon was unable to see the tractor because of the dust, and struck it in the rear.

Mrs. Holland sustained lacerations of the chin, and her daughter, Laurenda Holland suffered bruises and abrasions. Neither required hospitalization.

Alaska State Troopers estimated the damage to the Ford at \$500, and to the tractor \$800. The driver of the tractor, James Cook of Anchorage was not injured.

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GOAL CHAIRMAN REPORTS

EAGLE RIVER: Since the GOAL Center moved to the Barber Shop Building in the Eagle River Shopping area the number of people being served and visiting the Center has continued to increase.

Since opening in April, the Center has provided services to over 300 persons and an even greater number have visited the Center.

Mrs. Cathy Walker, the aide who operates the Center for the GOAL Council has spent many hours in conference with the Greater Anchorage Area Community Action Agencies (GAACAA), Employment specialist and the Alaska State Employment Services specialist in locating positions for summer employment for Chugiak Area youth. A total of sixteen positions funded by the Neighborhood Youth Corp (NYC) have been filled thus far.

The members of the GOAL Council expressed their sincere thanks to Reverend Shaffer and the members of the Chugiak Methodist Church for the help that the GOAL Council has received from them. Rev. Shaffer, who has been serving as President of the Board of Directors of the GAACAA (he represented the Anchorage Council of Churches on the Board), has been a great help to the GOAL Council and all of the programs that the GAACAA sponsor in this area. A letter was sent to the Board of Managers of the Chugiak Methodist Church, with a request that a copy be sent to Rev. Shaffer's superiors.

A large turnout at this meeting is needed.

The GOAL Council will be represented at the CBA Board meeting on June 19th, and will actively seek a seat on the Board. It is hoped that all the other service organizations will also be represented.
