PETERS CREEK: Funeral services were held on Tuesday, June 3rd at 11:00am at Evergreen Memorial Chapel for Mrs. Robert (Ruth) Nelson, who died last week in the fire which gutted her frame house at mile 22 Glenn Highway.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company responded to the call at 12:20am last Thursday, and found the house completely involved. Mrs. Nelson's body was discovered in the living room.

According to a spokesman for the Fire Company, she had apparently been trying to get out of the house when she collapsed.

The State Fire Marshall's office stated that the prob-able cause of the fire was from a lighted cigarette. The fire appeared to have started at the living room coach where they guessed that Mrs. Nelson had fallen asleep. Her bed was still made up and had not been slept in. There was no one else in the house at the time. Her husband, who is in construction had been working near Kenai at the time of the fire.

Two small dogs that had been locked in the garage were released unharmed by the firemen.

The firemen were able to bring the fire under control, and the house is still standing, although the living room and garage are badly gutted. The house was covered by in-

Mrs. Nelson was born on June 29th, 1918. She is survived by her husband and a daughter, Mrs. Donna Fuller of Kansas City Kansas.

EXPLOITATION PROTESTED

JUNEAU Rep. Rich ard I. Eliason, R-Sitka, has wired Gov. Keith H. Miller strongly protesting the exploita-tion of the Sitka spring spawn-

ing area.
The continuing harvest for the purpose of exportation will elim-

purpose of exportation will eliminate completely this vitally needed resource, he said.

There has been, for many years, a critical shortage of this basic food of the sea life and decimating the spawning herring will have a very real detriment-al effect on the sport and com-mercial fishing in the Sitka area, he said.

In his telegram, Eliason speeifically protested the exporting of 500 tons of herring to Japan,

wnere the eggs are to be processed. He said the Sitka area has not had a spawn fishery for the last two years and the Craig area was closed this spring due

to the lack of herring spawn.

PETERS CREEK: Vandals hit the Mirror Lake Picnic Wayside on Monday night, May 26th, causing an estimated \$500 damage and putting water well out of commission.


JOHN ASPLUND NAMED TO COMMITTEE

BURNING BAN EXTENDED

The public order prohibiting burning which went into effect on May 23 has been supplemented to expand the affected area.

Record breaking high temperatures last weekend and one of the hottest, driest spring seasons in Alaska's history has resulted in severe fire danger throughout most of the state. Extreme critical conditions continue to build up in the Interior, Western and Southcentral Alaska regions.

A spokesman for the Bureau of Land Management has inferenced the State Forester that this is a record early fire season, the worst since 1957 and possible the worst in over twenty years. This could be one of the worst fire season in the history of the state.

Since the first order went into effect last Friday, there have been 15 new fires on state and private land and 16,000 additional acres burned, said acting state forester L.A. Dutton. BLM forces are taxed to the limit statewide. Firefighters are being ordered up from villages all over Alaska, Dutton added.

The new supplemental order will blanket the original order and increase the affected area by adding all lands within Game Management Units, 7, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 20. Dutton said. The new order became effective this morning at 12:91 a.m.

The order prohibits until further notice all open and uncontrolled fires such as berm, slash, debris, rubbish, grass and cropland fires. Campfires are allowed within public campgrounds within fireplaces.

Closed are most of the Kenai Peninsula, the Susitna River, the Matanuska River and the Copper River valleys and the area from the Alaska Range North to the Yukon River and from the headwaters of the Kuskokwim East of the Alaska-Yukon border.

Although this order closes the most heavily populated areas to burning, conditions are extremely critical almost statewide.

In announcing the new order Division of Lands director F. J. Keenan said his office was coordinating the closure proceedings with federal agencies. The Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife is closing the Kenai National Moose Range. The Forest Service is closing portions of the Chugach National Forest

John Raynor, fire staff officer for the Chugach National Forest, told the Division of Lands that the Forest Service Order will contain the same restrictions as the state's order and will cover National Forest I and s within Game Management Units 7 and 14.

The new order increasing the area on which open fires are prohibited was signed by F. J. Keenan, state lands director, as agent for Thomas E. Kelly. commissioner of natural resources

INMATES TELL IT LIKE IT IS

Inmates of the Adult Conser vation Camp near Palmer are "telling it like it is."

"telling it like it is."

They are speaking to youth and adult groups in the community in a new program coordinated by the Alaska Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, which operates a vocational program with public offenders under an agreement with the Dir ision of Corrections.

Paul Stern, counselor-coordinator for the public offender project, said the program was prompted by several immates who asked for the opportunity to speak about prison life and some of the things which have

Inmates are speaking on their specialities — narcotics, crime and alcoholism, Stern said. All of the speakers have long histories of arrests and incarcerations, both in state jails and federal prisons. So far, they have spoken to service clubs, Parent - Teacher Association units and student groups. Neither Stern's office nor the

Adult Camp staff claim the speakers are completely re-formed. But they do believe that the men are not happy with themselves and have "a sincere desire to do what they can to see that others do not follow in their footsteps."
