CHUGIAK: The Knik Little League wound up the season with the Eagle River Lions team in first place, winning 15 games out of 18 and losing only three.

In second place is the El Patio team with 9 wins and 9 loses, Eagle River Shopping Center is third, with 8 wins and 10 loses, and Peters Creek Fuel occupies the celler, with only 6 wins and 12 loses.

EAGLE RIVER: Two retired Air Force men were drowned in Thompson Lake near Eagle River last Thursday night, according to Lt. Talbert of the Ft. Richardson Public Information Office.

The victims were Ret. T/Sgt. Joseph V. Rouse and Ret. S/Sgt. Ralph Williford, both of Anchorage.

Witnesses at the scene reported that the men had been fishing from a kayak when the craft capsized. Neither man was wearing a life jacket. Military regulations require that anyone taking a boat on water on a military reservation must wear alife jacket. Thompson Lake is located on the Ft. Richardson military reservation, approximately one and a half miles from the Eagle River Im. Lt. Talbert also reported that the kayak was not equipped with outriggers, also contrary to military regulations.

A spectator at the scene reported seeing the men standing up in the boat and casting.

When the boat capsized, throwing the men into the water, Sgt. Earnest A. Finley, of Ft. Richardson, who had been fishing on the shore of the lake with his two small children, jumped into the water and attempted to rescue the men.

A witness of the incident stated that Sgt. Finley didn't even stop to remove his clothing. He said that the man who Finley was trying to save had paniced and was struggling with him. When Finley was able to bring the man in, it was discovered that the man was dead of drowning. Finley himself was overcome by exhaustion and in serious condition.

An unideutified woman drove to the Eagle Mv. Inn to try to get help. Ray rreeman, of Eagle River, who was at the Inn at the time, and happened to have a mobile radio unit in his car, contacted another citizen band operator in the area and asked him to call for help, and then returned with the woman to the lake, Chugiak REACT, the local

citizen band radio operators monitoring group, and the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company rescue unit responded. The Eagle River Ambulance transported Finley to the 5040th Air Force Hospital, while REACT assisted

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

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CHANGES IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME.

Notice is hereby given that the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, under authority vested by AS 16.05.690, proposes to adopt regulations in Title 5 of the Alaska Administrative Code as follows:

(1) 5AAC 39,130, is amended to read:

5AAC 39,130, REPORTS RE-QUIRED OF PROCESSORS, BUYERS AND FISHERMEN. (a) Each person, company, firm or other organization who purchases unprocessed fish, or processes fish or byproducts of fish must:

1. Furhish to the Department each calendar year before operating a written statement of intent to operate with a description of the nature, extent, and location of the operation on forms available from the Department.

2. Submit, no later than Jan-uary 31, an accurate and complete summary of the previous year's operation on statistical forms available from the Department.

Reports not submitted for 1967 and 1968 or either one of these years must be submitted by September 30, 1969. 3. Furnish, verbally or in writing, purcasing or processing records as requested by the Department or its representative.

(b) Each buyer of fish or shell fish shall keep a record of each purchase on fish tickets or other forms supplied by the Department of Fish and Game, Fish tickets shall be submitted to the local department representative at least once a week or as otherwise specified by the Department for each particular area and fishery. The record shall include the following:

The name of the company or individual buying the fish. The name of the fisherman from whom the fish were purchased.

3. The name or Coast Guard number of the vessel employ-

ed in taking the fish.
4. The date of landing of the

fish.

The Department registber, whichever is applicable.
6. The type of gear by which the fish were taken.

The nearest headland or bay or statistical catch area in which the fish were taken. Information applicable to the following species:

A. The number of salmon by

species.

1) The pounds of salmon by species when fish are purchased by pound.

B. The number and pounds of king, dungeness and tanner

crab.
C. The pounds of other fish or shellfish by species.

Such information as the Department may require.

(c) Each fisherman shall furnish to the buyer factual catch date necessary for complet-ion of reports required by the

Department.
(d) Each shellfish fisherman shall furnish in writing to the Department, directly or through the buyer, data nec-essary for reports required by the Department.

(e) The following information regarding the transporting of unprocessed fish shall be transmitted to an authorized representative of the Department either verbally, in writ-ing or by telephone:

The number and species of salmon taken in any regulatory area shall be reported before being transported to any other area or out of the state.

TIPS FOR MILADY

It is a good idea to pre-shrink your fabric before cutting out a pattern. It is also a good idea to preshrink any seam tape, zipper, or any cloth trim that will be sewn onto the garment before attaching. This will prevent puckering of the material when laundered.

2. The numbers or pounds by specias of all other fish shall be reported before being transported out of the state. (f) Seven days before moving location of operation, floating fish processing vessels must report verbally, in writing, or by telegram to the nearest Department office. The report shall: include present processing location and the exact latitude and lon-

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gitude of the location of the in-tended operation. END OF PROPOSED REGUL-ATIONS.

Notice is also given that any person interested may present written statements or arguments relevent to the action proposed in the auditorium of the Subport Building, Juneau, Alaska, before 9 o'clock a.m. on August 13, 1969, at which time a public meeting will be held. Oral comments will not be received at this meet-ing. The Alaska Department of Fish and Game, upon its own motion or at the instance of an interested person, may thereafter adopt the above proposal substantially as set out above without further notice.
