CHUGIAK TO BE SITE OF RODEO



OLD CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Carnival Grounds will become the location of the "Chugiak Stampede", as a result of an arrangement between the Chugiak Benefit Association and the Alaska State Rodeo Cowboys Association.

CBA and ASRCA are entering into a contract whereby the ASRAC will lease a portion of the Carnival Grounds for the construction of a Rodeo arena, chutes, bleachers and other facilities associated with Rodeo activities.

According to Johnnie Pugh, Vice President of CBA, the lease will have ASRCA paying \$150 for the first year, \$300 for each of the two remaining years with option for renewal.

Rick Ellis, who is vice president for ASRCA, stated that there will be only time for one Rodeo this year, but that this will be the Alaska State Finals, with the ten top riders competing.

Ellis, who is himself a resident of Birchwood, said that ASRCA hopes to have activities every other weekend next summer. There will be some rodeos, horse shows, play days etc.

The rodeo grounds will be located at the corner of the new highway, and the new north Birchwood Loop Road.

Ellis said that the first event will be held on the Weekend of September 20th and 21st.

NEW HIGHWAY AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

CHUGIAK: Work on the new highway is still proceeding well ahead of schedule and should be completed by this fall, according to Mr. Walters, project engineer for the Green Construction Co., contractors for the road.

Walters said that the new bridge across Peters Creek is now completed.

"NO TRUE BILL" VERDICT IN SHOOTING CASE

ANCHORAGE: A Grand Jury returned a verdict of "No True Bill", in the May shooting of Scott L. Wieler, by Chugiak man Jesse Straight.

Wieler was shot by Straight when he and three companions were trespassing on the straight property and threatening Straight and his family.

The verdict means that no charges will be filed against Straight, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire has purchased a second ambulance, according to a spokesman for that organization.

The vehicle is a surplus Air Force Buick ambulance. A certain amount of work will be necessary before the ambulance can be placed in service.

When the ambulance is ready to be put into service it will be housed at the new Birchwood Fire Station. This will make two fire trucks and one ambulance at each of the two stations, it was stated.

One boy has done most of the clearing, but we could use more boys. The workers are hired by the Neighborhood Youth Corps, so must come from large and/or families who have low incomes. We appreciate the calls from boys who have applied for the

job, but could not qualify. Any interested boy who is over fourteen years old can check at the N.Y.C. office, 277-7011 to see if he is eligible.

Last week we were able to place a boy as a general helper for one of our OPAG members.

Another member would like to hire a man to do house-painting.

It is very gratifying to have people offer assistance, or needed items for the Center.

Last week we received another bedpan to add to our lending service. Now we have enough crutches and pans to loan out in case there are two persons who need them at the same time. We still need urinals, a wheelchair and a lap tray for those members who are recuperating from an illness.

We are sorry to report that last week one of our members hurt himself through a fall, and is now in the hospital. Another member who lost her husband recently will be mov-

ed (by this program) to the Salvation Army Senior Home in Palmer. Clean rooms, wholesome meals and a home-like atmosphere are provided for the elderly at this rest home.

Our new hairdresser will open the ladies beauty sessions at 8:30am Wednesday mornings.

Men's haircut day is Wednesday at 10:00am. Call Peg for appointments and transportation.

Remember, Peg is selling Best Line household products to help our petty cash fund. Call her for information and to place orders. This money is used to bring a note of cheer into the lives of all OPAG members on their birthdays, when they are ill, or for get together refreshments.

To date we have not received any offers of plywood or plaster board which is needed to repair our Center. Don't hesitate to offer a part of a sheet, we can use it. All donations and assistance will be appreciated by the present Sr. Citizens, and those who will profit by the center in

years to come.

TROOPERS CITE BOTH DRIVERS

FT. RICHARDSON: Both drivers received citations for negligent driving in a two car accident which took place at Mile 10 at 12:30am on July 20th.

According to the Alaska State Troopers, a 1969 Ford sedan, driven by Herbert L. Shiplett, of Anchorage was proceeding South on the Glenn Highway, when he lost control of his car and skidded across the center line and then traveled 285 feet off the Highway, coming to rest on the top on the East side of the road.

The other vehicle, also a 1969 Ford sedan, driven by Carl Stidams, of Anchorage was following, this car left 48 feet of skid marks on the highway before leaving the road and then traveled 456 feet and came to rest on the West side of the highway.

Alaska State Troopers estimated the damage to Shiplett's car at \$2,500. Stidam's Ford was damaged an estimated \$500.

Shiplett suffered a minor injury to his hand and was taken by ambulance to the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

The drivers were apparently acquainted and appeared to have been traveling together, according to the Alaska State Troopers.

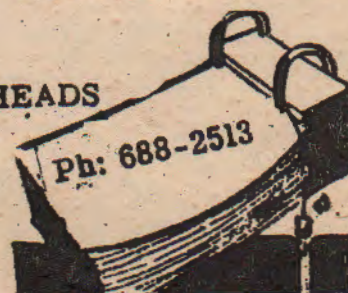
