




to 3:00pm,

Here is a way to light your charcoal briquets for a bar-becue and avoid the mess, expense and danger of lighter

Cut the bottom out of a clean one gallon paint bucket (with a bail handle). Using a punch type can-opener (such as is used in opening beverage cans) punch a row of holes around the bottom of the can.

Place the can in the center of your charcoal grill and place a sheet of crumpled newspaper in the bottom.
Then fill the can half full of small twigs or wood shavings. Fill the rest of the can with charcoal briquetes.

Light the paper through one of the holes at the bottom. As the paper and wood burn away and the charcoal settles, continue to add briquetes un-

til the can is once again full.
In about a half hour, remove
can (using a stick or other
tool through the ball handle)

The coals will spread out all glowing and ready to cook that steak.
