

# LIFEGUARD HIRED FOR MIRROR LAKE

## AGREEMENT MAY RESULT IN LOCAL STATE TROOPER

CHUGIAK: An agreement between the Department of Public Safety and the Department of Natural Resources may result in a full time State Trooper for the Greater Chugiak Area and a full time resident caretaker at the Mirror Lake Picnic Wayside.

According to Captain Edward Dankworth, Commander of the Southcentral Region of the Alaska State Troopers, the Department of Natural Resources has offered to construct facilities for a house trailer at the Mirror Lake park for a State Trooper to make his residence.

Captain Dankworth said that he couldn't say just when this arrangement could be made effective as it was dependent on available manpower. He hoped, however, that it would be not too far in the distant future.

The Department of Natural Resources has made this offer for picnic waysides at Nancy Lake and at Harding Lake near Fairbanks.

CHUGIAK: A full time Animal Control Officer has been assigned to the Greater Chugiak Area, according to Jerry Bland of the Borough Animal Control Department.

Acting in this capacity is Mr. Sherman Burgess, who makes home in Eagle River.

Mr. Burgess will be authorized to investigate all dog bite reports, pick up all stray dogs and investigate all reports of cruelty to animals.

He assumed his duties on Monday, July 28th. Anyone with any dog complaints can call the Borough Animal Shelter at 277-5823. The animal shelter is in radio contact with the local Animal Control Officer, and he will be able to act on all complaints immediately.

CHUGIAK: A lifeguard, who will be on duty at the swimming area at the Mirror Lake Picnic Wayside has been secured through the efforts of the Chugiak Ladies Club and the financial assistance of other local service organizations.

The Ladies Club, working with the approval of the State Department of Parks and Recreation, was able to raise pledges for sufficient funds to hire a lifeguard to be on duty weekends and holidays.

A shortage of qualified persons to fill this position delayed the procurement of a lifeguard until this time, although the funds were made available earlier in the summer.

Serving as lifeguard, is Charles Dickey, of Anchorage.

Mr. Dickey holds a Senior Red Cross Life Saving Certificate, as well as a Senior YMCA Life Saving Certificate. He has had experience working as a Lifeguard at the Anchorage Spa. It was through the Spa that the Ladies Club was able to hire Mr. Dickey.

The lifeguard will be on duty from 10am to 6pm Saturday and Sunday. In the event of inclement weather, he has the option to work one or two other days of the week when the weather is suitable for swimming.

The department of Parks and Recreation will provide him with an elevated chair, first aid kit, ring bouye and other equipment. The State will also grant him the authority to supervise activity at the swimming area and to stop anyone who may be acting in a manner to endanger other swimmers.

Clubs who have contributed to the life guard fund are, in addition the Chugiak Ladies Club, The Birchwood Loopers Homemakers Club, The Chugiak Lioness Club, The Sportsmans Game Preservation Association, St. Andrew's Altar Society, the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Co., the Eagle River Lions Club and the VFW Auxiliary. Other Clubs have indicated their intention to contribute, but have not yet officially done so.

Mr. Dick Ahman, of the Department of Parks and Recreation stated that his office was very pleased that the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area had cooperated in making it possible to secure the much needed services of a lifeguard. He stated that he

## READING PROGRAM AT CHUGIAK ELEM.

**OLD CHUGIAK** Since June 18, '69, there has been a Federal Title I Summer Reading School in session at the Chugiak Elementary School.

This involves an enrichment method to review for the child and/or expose him to experiences and objects which he may not have had contact previously.

Films, film strips, records, story book and record combinations, various art media, dramatizations of stories, puppets, sports activities, field trips, oral discussions, reading games, spelling games, Reader's Digest articles written on the child's level and high interest level books were all used.

The children who attended Chugiak Elementsry School during the regular school year had classes from 9am to 11:30am each day. Children from Birchwood School attended classes from 12:30pm to 3:00pm.

The children felt the study trip to Palmer with the other four Anchorage Borough Title I Reading Schools was the best. It included a train ride from Anchorage to Wasilla, lunch at Wasilla Elementary School, a tour of the Alaska Agricultural Experiment Farm, and home again by a school bus. The other trips were to the Fort Richardson Wildlife Museum, the Anchorage Fine Arts Museum, Earthquake Park and Mirror Lake.

Five adults worked with the children. They are, Mrs. Barbara Miller, reading teacher, Mrs. Ann Riordan, resource librarian, Mrs. Emmy Buck and Miss Katie Moore, teaching aides and Miss Joyce Leonard, Job Corps worker. The program ends August 1, 1969.

## TIPS FOR MILADY

Here is a way to light your charcoal briquets for a barbecue and avoid the mess, expense and danger of lighter fluids.

Cut the bottom out of a clean one gallon paint bucket (with a ball handle). Using a punch type can-opener (such as is used in opening beverage cans) punch a row of holes around the bottom of the can.

Place the can in the center of your charcoal grill and place a sheet of crumpled newspaper in the bottom. Then fill the can half full of small twigs or wood shavings. Fill the rest of the can with charcoal briquettes.

Light the paper through one of the holes at the bottom. As the paper and wood burn away and the charcoal settles, continue to add briquettes until the can is once again full.

In about a half hour, remove can (using a stick or other tool through the ball handle)

The coals will spread out all glowing and ready to cook that steak.
