

# HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE

## LOCAL JUVENILES ARRESTED FOR BURGLARY

**PETERS CREEK:** Two local juveniles have been arrested by the Alaska State Troopers and charged with the burglary of two Peters Creek homes last week.

Both juveniles are boys aged 15. The Police are still looking for a third boy who was supposedly involved in the burglaries. The two boys arrested claim to have known the third youth only by his first name.

The two homes burglarized were those of Kenneth Huling and Arville Dinwiddie, both located off the Glenn Highway in the Peters Creek Area.

A large percentage of the stolen items have been recovered. Some of which have been returned to the owners and some is being held for evidence.

Mr. Jay Werner of the Juvenile Court said that it was the cooperation of the parents of one of the boys involved which led to the arrest. The parents had read an account of the burglary in the Knik Arm Courier, and the description of the items taken led them to suspect their own son. It was they who notified the State Troopers.

Mrs. Huling, one of the victims of the burglary said that she wished to commend the parents of this boy for their responsible actions in what she realizes must have been a very difficult decision.

**PETERS CREEK:** Fire of an undetermined origin completely destroyed one of the oldest houses in the Peters Creek Area early Tuesday morning.

The log building was originally the homestead residence of the John Stockhausen family, and was presently owned by Jack Rye of Anchorage.

The fire was reported by a Mrs. Mary Lovejoy of Wasilla who sighted the flames when she was returning to her home from Anchorage.

This was at approximately 1:30am. Mrs. Lovejoy told the State Fire Marshall that when she first saw the fire only the house appeared to be burning, but when the Chuglak Volunteer Fire Company arrived the garage was also involved.

It was believed that the house was unoccupied at the time. A Kenneth Young family had been renting the building for a short time this summer, but according to reports of neighbors they had left apparently moving out permanently about a week ago. A search of the ruins of the building revealed no evidence that anyone had been in the house at the time of the fire.

The fire burned most of the night, and the last fire truck left about 8:45am.

The value of the house was estimated at around \$19,600. The building was insured for \$16,000 according to the State Fire Marshall.

## CHUGIAK AMER. LEGION TEAM CITY CHAMPS

ANCHORAGE: The Chugiak Merchants won the American Legion City Championship tournament this past weekend at Mulcahy Park in an upset victory over the regular season leading Homebuilders.

Opening the three-day single elimination series on Friday, the determined Chugiak players romped to a 12-0 rout over Alaska Merchants in 5 1/2 innings. Ron Tyson struck out the first four batters to face him and was tagged only once when Dimond Shortstop Ken Taggart ripped a line drive through the left side for a single in the sixth inning. Stu Scott, who had buffaloes the Chugiak nine in two regular season encounters, was the losing pitcher.

The West High Associated Divers made things easy when they were unable to field a team for the Saturday afternoon game and were required to forfeit. This left Chugiak's second pitcher eligible for the final game.

Facing the first-place Homebuilders from East - who had defeated the strong Elks team from East 4-1, on Saturday evening - Chugiak's determination overcame a shaky start when the Homebuilders loaded the bases against Steve Jordan with one out. Jordan struck out the next batter and the following hitter was thrown out at first by Tyson, playing third base.

In the bottom half of the first frame, leading off batter Jon Shipman struck out by gained first safely when the third strike pitch got by the East catcher. He advanced on a series of errors and scored on a passed ball. Catcher Richard Martin doubled, Tyson singled and both scored on a double by Jordan.

The three-run opener seemed to shake the Homebuilders as they committed numerous errors in addition to the 14 were held powerless at the plate by Jordan's 10 strikeouts and sparkling fielding performance which included shoestring catches by left-fielder Frank Dias and center fielder Randy Phillips, which ordinarily would have fallen in for base hits. Homebuilders only score was set up by a two-base error after Mike Portlock singled in

the fifth inning. Jordan's third pitch attempt went wide, allowing Portlock to advance to third before first baseman Randy Clifton could retrieve the ball. Batter Kent Hartzberg lifted a sacrifice fly to deep centerfield, allowing Portlock to tag up and beat the throw to the plate. Only two other errors were committed by the Chugiak team and caused no serious damage.

Jordan, Tyson, Martin, shortstop Ed Loescher, Phillips and rightfielder John Bender shared in the safe hit department, with the first three gaining doubles plus a triple by Jordan. Dias and second baseman Chris Jenkins both sacrificed to advance runners.

Pinchhitters Al Hoogerwerf and Rick Marquez, were unsuccessful in their lone tries at the plate.

Of the twelve participating in the final game, all but Bender, Jenkins, Clifton and Marquez are from the Chugiak Area. The latter is from Ft. Richardson and the others from Elmendorf.

Manager of the team is Lee Jordan, John Hett is coach. Team sponsors are; Big Country Discount, Peters Creek Shopping Center, Peters Creek Fuel, Danny's Union 76 Service, Eagle River Branch First National Bank and Lee Jordan, Printer. An additional ten sponsors were needed for this first year in

the league and this deficit was absorbed by the American Legion.

**BIRCHWOOD:** Three Chugiak High School Cross Country lettermen (Bob Shepard, Phil Best and Byron Matlock) take off from the new Steeplechase Water Jump! The only problem is that there isn't any water for them to land in!

The steeplechase is an Old British and European track event that has become very popular lately, and is one of the feature attractions of the modern Olympic Games.

The race is run on a track for 2 miles (8 laps) with 4 regular hurdles and 1 water jump per lap. (therefore a total of 32 hurdles and 8 water jumps.) For the water jump, the runners have to veer off the track at one end of the track.

And what about this water jump! As can be seen in the picture, the barrier has been installed in front of the "pond". The pond will be dug and constructed on Thursday, August 14th. The pond is 12
