Both juveniles are boys aged 15. The Police are still look-ing for a third boy who was supposedly involved in the burglaries. The two boys arrested claim to have known the third youth only by his first name.

The two homes burglarized were those of Kenneth Huling and Arville Dinwiddle, both located off the Glein Highway in the Peters Creek Area.

stolen items have been recovered. Some of which have been Peturned to the owners and some is being held for evidence.

Mr. Jay Werner of the Juv-enile Court said that it was the cooperation of the parents one of the boys involved which led to the arrest. The parents had read an account of the burglary in the Knik Arm to suspect their own son. It Troopers,





BIRCHWOOD: Three Chuglak High School Cross Country lettermen (Bob Shepard, Phil Best and Byron Matlock) take off from the new Steeplechase Water Jump! The only problem is that there isn't any water for them to land in!

The steeplechase is an Old British and European track event that has become very popular lately, and is one of the feature attractions of the modern Olympic Games.

The race is run on a track for 2 miles (8 laps) with 4 reg-ular hurdles and 1 water jump per lap. (therefore a fotal of 32 hurdles and 8 water jumps.) For the water jump, the runners have to veer off track at one end of the track.
And what about this water

jump! As can be seen in the picture, the barrier has been installed in front of the "pond". The pond will be dug and constructed on Thursday, August 14th. The pond is 12


