BACK TO SCHOOL ISSUE

ALL NEW ELEM. STUDENTS MUST REGISTER BEFORE SCHOOL STARTS

CHUGIAK: Registration of all elementary students new to Chugiak Area schools began this week at the Eagle River Birchwood and Chugiak Elementary schools, and will continue from 7:30pm until 4:00pm Monday through Friday through September 3rd.

This applies to all students new to the area and includes those who attended schools elsewhere in the Greater Anchorage Area Borough District as well as those from schools elsewhere in the state or from other states.

Kindergarten students and first graders who did not attend kindergarten last year are required to show a birth certificate upon registration and will be required to have a physical.

EARL RAY ELECTED TO CO-OP BOARD: Earl Ray of Mile 21 1/2 was elected to a three year term to the board of directors of the Matanuska Valley Farmers Co-operative Association at the August 8th meeting.

SCHOOL OPENING MAY BE DELAYED: Although work is progressing rapidly on the addition to the Chugiak School it is doubted if it will be completed by September 8th, the

CHUGIAK SECOND LARGEST STATE OPERATED SCHOOL IN ALASKA: According to a release from the Department of Education, Chugiak has the 2nd largest enrollment of pupils of any state operated school in Alaska.

This is exclusive of schools located on military bases. Chugiak with it's estimated enrollment of 500 students and 21 teachers is second only to Kenai, whose estimated enrollment is 695 and who will this year employ 32 teachers.

NOMINATIONS CALLED FOR LOCAL BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

CHUGIAK: There will be a call for nominations to the Board of Supervisors to Service Area 8, (the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company), according to Borough Clerk, Mary Nettleton.

Incumbent Robert Kallenberg has already picked up his nomination form and has announced his intention to run for that office again.

The two other incumbents, Walter Purcell and Art Wallace were not available for comment.

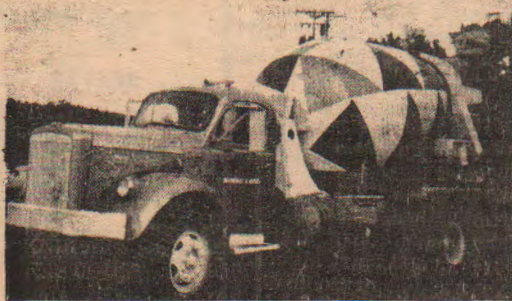

make the state his home, and upon his discharge he enrolled in Alaska Methodist University and left the state only to complete his graduate work at Stanford University at Palo Alto, California.

He has been with the Anchorage Borough Schools for five and one half years, and last year was assistant Principal at Turnagain Elementary for the first half of the school year, and as assistant principal at Airport Heights Elementary School for the 2nd half.

Mr. Blue and his wife Donna live on Abbott Road in Anchorage. They have one child, a son aged 4 years. Mrs. Blue is a teacher at the Chitnook elementary school, which is in the Mears-Diamond complex.

Mr. Sortore, who Blue replaces, will be Assistant Principal at the North Star Elementary School in Anchorage. He will also act in the capacity of liaison officer between the Girdwood School and the Borough School administration.

Assisting Mr. Blue in the capacity of school secretary is Mrs. Roe (Julia) Huling who is also new to Chugiak Elementary, but not to the Chugiak School System. She worked last year as one of the secretaries at Chugiak High School.

CHUGIAK HIGH TO USE RELOCATABLES

BIRCHWOOD: Chugiak High School will once again be resorting to relocatable classrooms to house the overflow of students expected this year according to CHS Principal, Eldon King.

Two of the relocatables have been moved in behind the high school, and two others are located at the Birchwood Elementary School. The latter two are to be used to house seventh grade students until the completion of the new wing at Birchwood. This is scheduled for completion by October 10th.

There will be a total of 40 teachers at the faculty of CHS this year, 17 of whom are new to the school.

A new class which will be introduced at Chugiak this year is Distributive Education, which includes 1 hour per day of on the job training at approved out of school employment. Mr. Clay Berry is the instructor of this course.

MEETINGS CALLED FOR KINDERGARTEN PARENTS

CHUGIAK: There will be meetings of all parents of children who will be attending kindergarten this fall at each of the local elementary schools.

The meetings at the respective schools will be held on Wednesday, September 3rd starting at 7:30pm.

The purpose of these meetings is to acquaint the parents with the kindergarten program and to inform them as to whether their child will attend the morning or afternoon session.

MUSTANG FOOTBALL STARTS AUGUST 30th

ANCHORAGE: Chugiak High School Varsity Football will get underway on Saturday, August 30th, at 8:00pm at Mulcahy Stadium against the West Anchorage Eagles.

This is not only the first athletic event of the year, but will be the first game that the Chugiak Mustangs will play Varsity football.

Admission price is \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

Other varsity football games on the Mustangs fall schedule are on September 6th against Dimond and on September 13th against East. Both of the latter games are also at Mulcahy at 8:00pm.

On September 26th, the Mustangs will travel to Kenai to play the Kenai Cardinals.

On October 4th the Mustangs will meet the Elmendorf team at Mulcahy, and on October 11th, they play the Ft. Rich team at Fort Richardson. The last two games will be played at 2:00pm.

Chugiak coach Huffer hopes all the Mustang fans will be in the stands at kickoff to give the boys a good start in their first year at Varsity football.

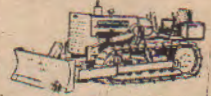

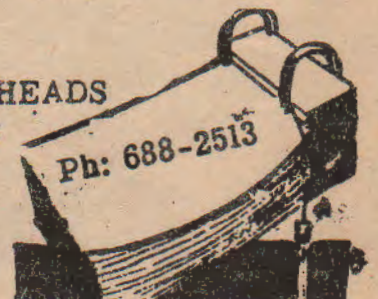

Dear Editor,

I recently attended one of the Wednesday night meetings of the committee set up to review the controversial sex films that are being shown to our children in school. From the newspaper reports, I was under the impression that this is an impartial committee of 25 people who would view each film, discuss it and then vote on whether or not to continue showing them. Most of the members are the original group who approved (or kept quiet about) the sex program now in our schools. One parent expressed his opinion that it was a "stacked" committee because no local minister or local physician is on the committee, the rabbi and physician on the committee are both military.

About 30 or 40 parents were interested enough to sit in on the meeting. It began by each committee member silently reading his individual copy of the minutes of the previous meeting. I thought they were reviewing sex education films but it turns out they have a whole "guidance" program to review. Sex education is just one part of it.

Serious discussion followed the laughter concerning the filmstrip titled "What Fathers Do." I understand this film concerning jobs Fathers have was deleted because

"not all children have Fathers." The "Black Sheep" was deleted after discussion of the title. No sex film had an equal amount of consideration.

The meeting was educational! It was news to me that our children do such ridiculous things as making up personality charts that show how many friends he has or how popular he is.

Part way through the meeting the members paused to let the listening parents give their 3 minute opinion on sex education. Several protested the treatment given Shirley Cox, the representative of Concerned Parents. For one thing whenever votes were counted, the Chairman would say, "Mrs. Cox votes No," or "Mrs. Cox abstains." Any comment on her part was met with open sneers or even groans from several members. Mr. Bucholdt took it upon himself to reply that she isn't welcome on this supposedly impartial committee. He continued "She is opposed to sex education; the rest of us are for it." I know that isn't a fact. So why the farce? By newspaper accounts, this is to be a committee representing all areas of the community yet it sounded like an ad hoc group that their members were already made up. How else explain that of the 23 members present, most voted "yes" to show all of the controversial sex films, although through a show of hands, only 3 out of the 23 people saw the film?

At about this point in the meeting, one of the committee members who had been slumped on the table, straightened up long enough to address the group of parents and tell us that we were all

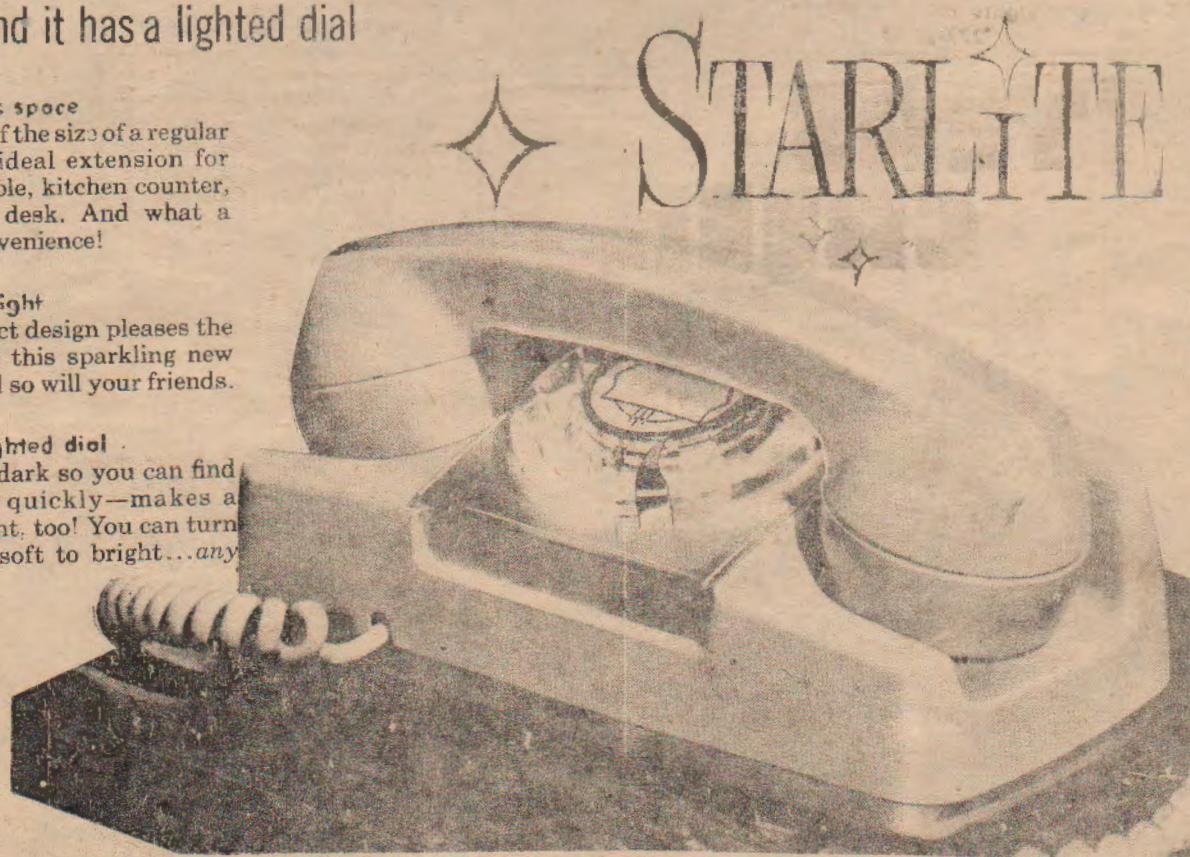

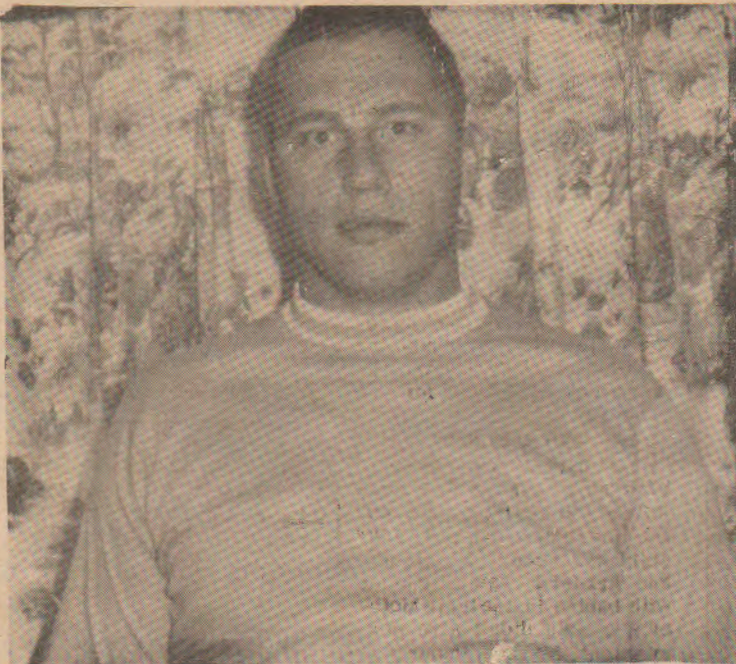

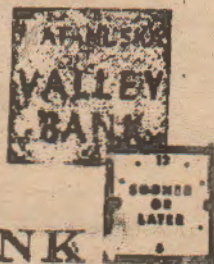

"sick" and that the purpose of sex education in our schools is to make sure our children don't grow up with our "hang-up" or "sickness. As for him, he wanted his 5th grade son to know "everything" about sex.

So many times we see in print how welcome parents are to see these films. Yet requests sent by registered mail requesting the showing of certain films are refused on the grounds "they are being reviewed. Films such as "Kathy" are lost. Do you suppose they'll be found for this school year?

We also see in print that 95% of parents approve these programs and give permission to see them. Did you? Do you know which ones your child has seen? My 1st and 2nd graders saw "movies with babies inside their Mother's". We didn't give permission! No permission was given for our 12th grade son to "Emergency Childbirth" in his Bachelor Arts Class either.

At the Committee meetings no program in sex education is being discussed for the kindergarten level. Yet the founder of the objectionable Seicus program insists it must begin at that age. For this reason, our 5 year old child will not go to kindergarten. It's important to us to preserve his innocence for another year at least.

Since our Supreme Court threw God out of our schools, the morals necessarily went too. Because of this, I feel the school is not a fit place to teach sex regardless of how well qualified a teacher may be.

Personally I'd be happy to have the school doors opened wide so all the "psychology junk" could be thrown out, have the schools concentrate on teaching our children such old-fashioned subjects as reading, writing and arithmetic and leave the sex education to the parents and their respective churches.
