ANCHORAGE: The Alcohol Beverage Control Board at their August 15th meeting denied the granting of a liquor license to Mr. Ed James who has been seeking to reopen the bowling alley in Eagle River.

Claude Millsap, Director of the ABC Board stated that the license was denied on the basis of population quotas ... as set forth in AS 04.10210 (1).

Mr. James, who had stated that he could not afford to operate the bowling alley without the additional income that would result from the cocktail lounge still has the option of bringing the matter before the Borough Assembly.

By State law, which was adopted by the last legislature, organized boroughs may now have the same powers as home rule cities under Section 04.10.270, which would give them the power to issue liquor licenses.

Mr. Millsap stated that the borough would still be required to observe the population quotas, but could by law increase the number of liquor establishments allowed as related to the population if they should see fit.

Mr. Millsap said that the recommendations of the Borough Assembly would be binding on the ABC Board unless the Board feels that the Assembly acted in an arbitrary or capricious manner.

The class is open to all dogs over six months of age. Dogs need not be pure bred to participate.

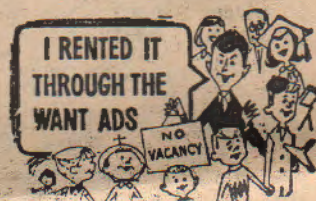
Trainers for the course will be Mr. and Mrs. Francis Larkin of the Chugiak Obedience Training Club.

A candidate for the Charter Commission must have been a qualified voter of the area from which he seeks election for at least one year prior to filing the petition.

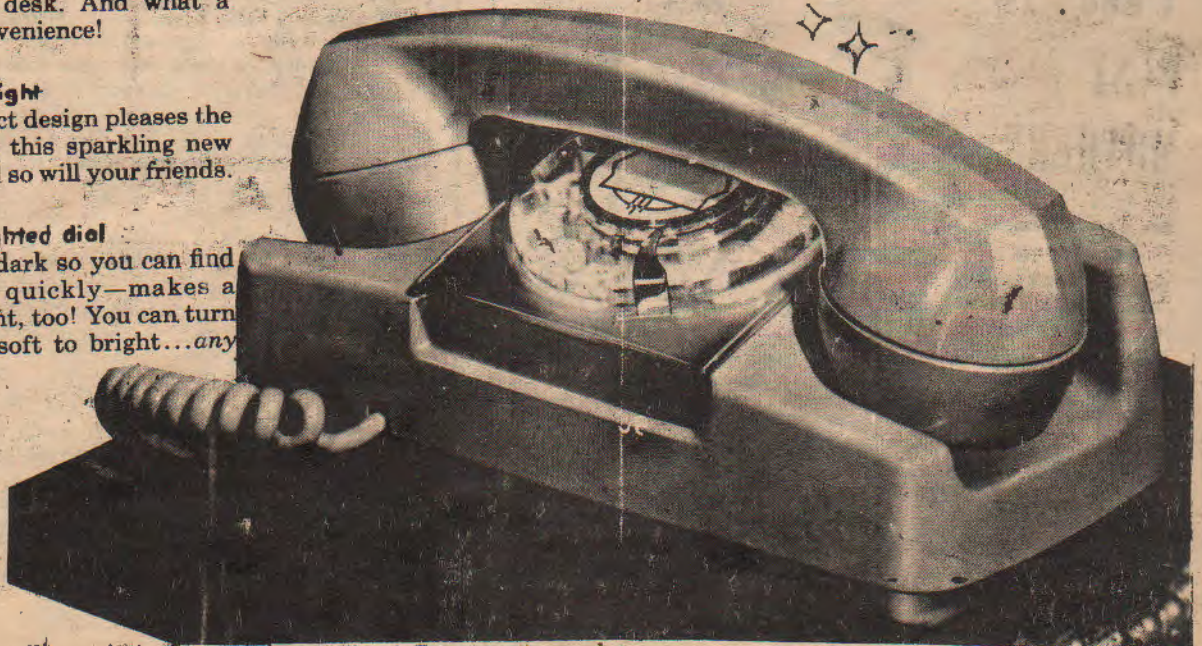

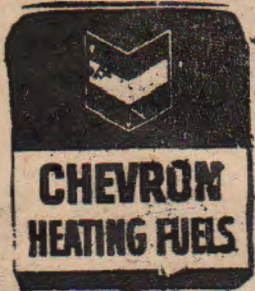

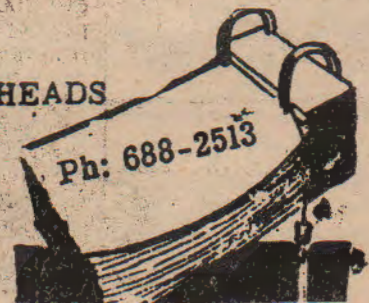
