ARMY WARNS OF HOAX LETTERS

The U. S. Army has become concerned in recent weeks with a rash of hoax calls throughout the United States to relative of personnel serving in Vietnam The malicious calls relate pri

marily to reports of death, mis sing, absence without leave, de sertion and so on, and have cau sed considerable anguish to next of kin who are unaware of Department of the Army notification procedures, an Army spokes man said.

The Army does not use the telephone to make notification of such instances, it was empha-sized. Notification is made by a personally delivered message by Army representatives, where identity can be immediately verified; or, by a Western Union telegram which can be verified with the Western Union office from which received; or, by correspondence directly from the Department of the Army. The purpose for notifying the next of kin determines the means used.

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
