He is Vic's owner and trained the dog himself at the K-9
Training School on Seward

Archie said that the decision to train his pet as a security dog was his own. The Anchorage Police Department had experimented with a trained police dog several years ago, and had not been happy with the results. The dog's hand-ler resigned from the Police Department several months after the dog had completed his training and since the an-imal would not work with anyone else, the cost of the training was considered wasteu.

After Vic had completed his

training Hutchison asked permission to use him in police work. While his sur riors were making up their minds to allow him to do this, Archie decided to give Vic additional training in decting mari

training in detecting mari-

jauna.
He had read of dogs in the Los Angelos Police Department who have been trained to do this

Vic got his chance to show what he could co one night when Archie was invited to go along on a narcetics raid. The police had been tipped

off that there was a large cache of marijauna at an Anchorage residence.

When their most thorough searching failed to turn up the drug, the officer in charge

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decided to let Hutchison try Vic. The dog was able to locate the mari launa within ten seconds of being commanded to find it. It was cleverly concealed in a box which anpeared to contain old magazines. A police officer had already searched the room, but had failed to locate it.

After that demonstration, Vic was "in". He is a full fledged member of the Anchorage Police Department with his own badge and uniform, a special harness which he

vears while on duty. Vic's method of finding the marijauna is to sniff it out. Hutchison has trained him to locate the drug on command.

The word-which he uses to let Vic know that he is to beginsniffing is "Chi", which is Turkish for tea, (a slang expression for marijauna).

Hutchison was stationed in Turkey while in the Navy and chose that word because it is short, simple, and one that the dog is unlikely to year at any other time.

In a demonstration of how Vic works, Hutchison will first hide a packet of marijauna and then call the dog into the room. He will say quietly, "Chi, Vic," The dog will then begin casting about the room, sniffing loudly. He will sniff in corners, under andaround furniture, among books even about the persons of anyone who may be in the room.
As soon as he finds the marijauna he will bring if to Tutchison. His only reward for this is a pat on the head and a

word of praise. Hurchison said that his superiors were airaid that the training in detection of martiauna might ruin the dog for regular police work, but this fear was unfounded. Vic has in the course of his duty helped capture car thieves, burglars and other criminals,

Although Vic is an official member of the Anchorage Police Department, he re-ceives no pay for his services. Neither does Hutchison receive any compensation

for the dog's work. All of the dog's training was done at Hutchison's own expense.

Despite his training, Vic is a friendly, affectionate dog, and will attack only when commanded to do so.

Hutchison said that there is now one other dog on the Anchorage Police Department.

This dog also is owned by a patrolman who trained the dog

at his expense.

Hutchisou believes that the trained police dog has a very important role in crime pre-vention, and hopes that the public will recognize thes fact and that in the future there will be more trained dogs to make the job of crime fighting that much easier.

HUNTERS...DO NOTREMOVE SEX EVIDENC

ANCHORAGE: External sex organs must be left naturally attached to deer and moose according to a spokesman for the Protection Division of the Alaska Department of Fish

Since the opeing of the big game seasons, this Division had the unpleasant duty to cite and prosecute several different individuals for fail-ure to comply with this regulation.

In each case the hunters had:

taken the moose during the open season, in an open area, had the proper license and tags, took it in a legal manner and brought out all the edible meat, but failed to leave part of the organs attached, and therefore, was cited.

To most, naturally, this seems a little unfair. However, to gain complience to the regulations, the Protect-ion Division, has to enforce ALL of the regulations, not just some of them, it was explaiued.

Therefore hunters are asked for their own sakes, to leave enough of the external sexorgans naturally attached to their moose or deer so that if they are contacted by an Of-ficer he can conclusively id-entify the sex of the animal in possession,



ADFG CLOSES UNITSIX

Alaska Department of Fish and Game has issued an Emergency Order closing the moose season in Game Management Unit 6, West of the Copper River. effective at Midnight, Tuesday August 26, 1969. However, Terless moose permits shall have until Midnigh,t Sept. 30 to fill their permits.

This emergency order does not affect the moose season East of the Copper River.

Successful moose hunters are requested to complete their hunter report cards so that an accurate tally of th emoose har-ested can be obtained.




