VIC, ANCHORAGE CITY POLICE DOG, GIVES THE PACKET OF MARIJUANA HE JUST SNIFFED OUT TO HIS OWNER, PATROLMAN ARCHIE HUTCHISON.

ANCHORAGE: The Assembly of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough will be asked to vote on the granting of a liquor license at the bowling alley in Eagle River at their regular meeting on Monday, September 15th.

Applicant for the license, Ed James of Anchorage, is bringing the request before the Assembly after having been turned down by the State ABC Board last month.

James has the option of asking the Borough Assembly to recommend the granting of the license under a new law which went into effect the first of August.

This will be the first case to be brought before the Assembly under the new law, and a public hearing has been called to determine the feelings of the residents of the area involved.

The Public Hearing will take place at 8:00pm on Monday, September 15th, at 670 Fire-

According to Mary Nettleton, Borough Clerk, the Assembly will very likely be influenced in their decision by the opinions expressed at the hearing, and urges anyone with any interest in the matter to attend.

James, the applicant for the license, has announced his intention to re-open the bowling alley, but has stated that he will not do so unless he is able to operate the cocktail lounge in conjunction with it. He said that past experience has shown that the bowling alley cannot operate in the black without the added income from the bar.

VIC... A SPECIAL KIND OF COP

Vic is a member of the Anchorage Police Department with a highly specialized job.

Whenever the police are investigating a case where they suspect there is marijuana hidden, it is Vic's job to sniff it out. Vic is two years old, and weighs about 100 pounds. He is a German Shepard dog, who belongs to Anchorage Patrolman Archie Hutchison.

Archie, who lives on Farm Road in Eagle River with his wife Marga, has been on the Anchorage Police Department for five years.

He is Vic's owner and trained the dog himself at the K-9 Training School on Seward Highway. Archie said that the decision to train his pet as a security dog was his own. The Anchorage Police Department had experimented with a trained police dog several years ago, and had not been happy with the results. The dog's handler resigned from the Police Department several months after the dog had completed his training and since the animal would not work with anyone else, the cost of the training was considered wasted. After Vic had completed his training Hutchison asked permission to use him in police work. While his superiors were making up their minds to allow him to do this, Archie decided to give Vic additional training in detecting mari-

training in detecting marijuana. He had read of dogs in the Los Angeles Police Department who have been trained to do this. Vic got his chance to show what he could do one night when Archie was invited to go along on a narcotics raid. The police had been tipped off that there was a large cache of marijuana at an Anchorage residence. When their most thorough searching failed to turn up the drug, the officer in charge

decided to let Hutchison try Vic. The dog was able to locate the marijuana within ten seconds of being commanded to find it. It was cleverly concealed in a box which appeared to contain old magazines. A police officer had already searched the room, but had failed to locate it. After that demonstration, Vic was "in". He is a full fledged member of the Anchorage Police Department with his own badge and uniform, a special harness which he wears while on duty. Vic's method of finding the marijuana is to sniff it out. Hutchison has trained him to locate the drug on command.

The word which he uses to let Vic know that he is to begin sniffing is "Chi", which is Turkish for tea, (a slang expression for marijuana).

Hutchison was stationed in Turkey while in the Navy and chose that word because it is short, simple, and one that the dog is unlikely to hear at any other time.

In a demonstration of how Vic works, Hutchison will first hide a packet of marijuana and then call the dog into the room. He will say quietly, "Chi, Vic." The dog will then begin casting about the room, sniffing loudly. He will sniff in corners, under and around furniture, among books even about the persons of anyone who may be in the room. As soon as he finds the marijuana he will bring it to Hutchison. His only reward for this is a pat on the head and a word of praise.

Hutchison said that his superiors were afraid that the training in detection of marijuana might ruin the dog for regular police work, but this fear was unfounded. Vic has in the course of his duty helped capture car thieves, burglars and other criminals.

Although Vic is an official member of the Anchorage Police Department, he receives no pay for his services. Neither does Hutchison receive any compensation

for the dog's work. All of the dog's training was done at Hutchison's own expense.

Despite his training, Vic is a friendly, affectionate dog, and will attack only when commanded to do so.

Hutchison said that there is now one other dog on the Anchorage Police Department.

This dog also is owned by a patrolman who trained the dog at his own expense.

Hutchison believes that the trained police dog has a very important role in crime prevention, and hopes that the public will recognize this fact and that in the future there will be more trained dogs to make the job of crime fighting that much easier.

At Birchwood Elementary the enrollment this year is 283, (exclusive of the 7th grade) as against 261 last September.

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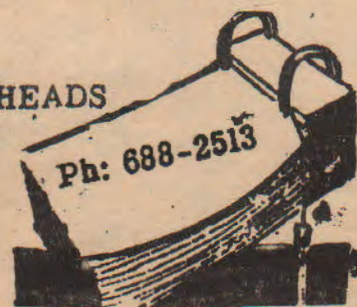
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Tell it to Martha

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HUNTERS...DO NOT REMOVE SEX EVIDENCE

ANCHORAGE: External sex organs must be left naturally attached to deer and moose according to a spokesman for the Protection Division of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

Since the opening of the big game seasons, this Division has had the unpleasant duty to cite and prosecute several different individuals for failure to comply with this regulation.

In each case the hunters had taken the moose during the open season, in an open area, had the proper license and tags, took it in a legal manner and brought out all the edible meat, but failed to leave part of the sex organs attached, and therefore, was cited.

To most, naturally, this seems a little unfair. However, to gain compliance to the regulations, the Protection Division, has to enforce ALL of the regulations, not just some of them, it was explained.

Therefore hunters are asked for their own sakes, to leave enough of the external sex organs naturally attached to their moose or deer so that if they are contacted by an Officer he can conclusively identify the sex of the animal in possession.

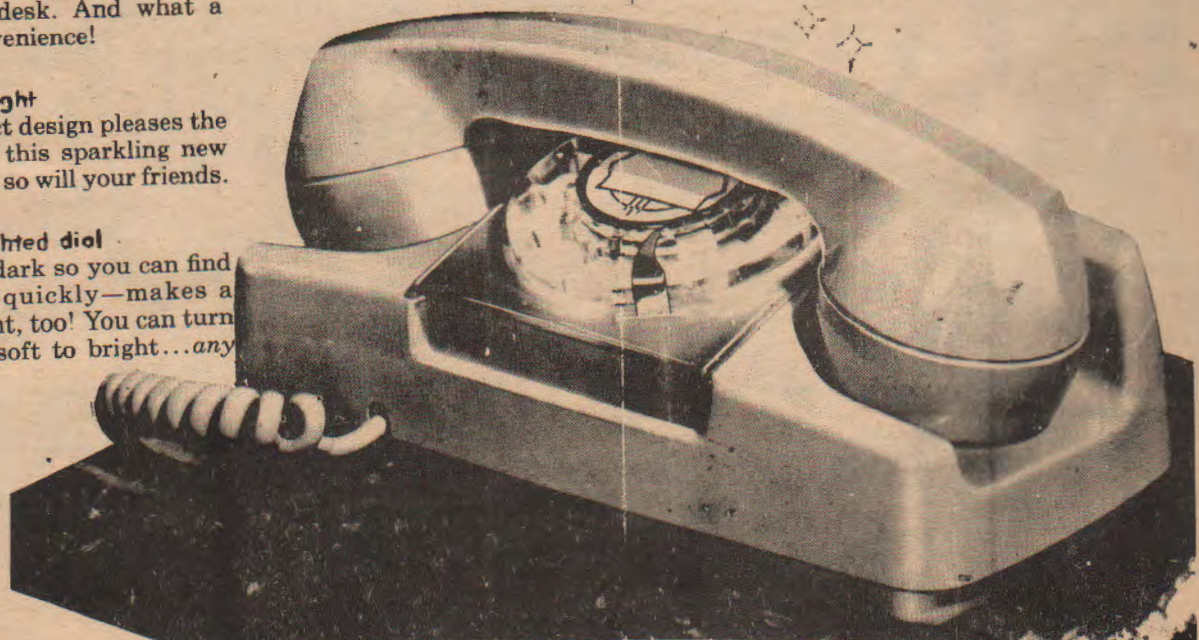

BIRCHWOOD: The Birchwood Elementary School PTA will hold their first meeting of the year on Monday, September 15th at 7:30pm.

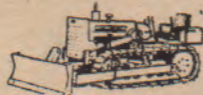
