BIG RODEO HERE THIS WEEKEND

BORO ASSEMBLY RECOMMENDS GRANTING OF BAR LICENSE

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly, last Monday night recommended the issuance of a liquor license for the bowling alley at Eagle River by a vote of 7 to 4.

The matter was brought to a vote following a lively public meeting at which approximately 30 residents of the Greater Chugiak Area spoke out both for and against the subject.

Most of those present appeared to be in favor of the issuance, with opposition coming from a small handful who objected either on a religious basis, or because they were bar owners in that area.

The assemblymen who voted against the issuance were, Willis, Yesenski, Hudson, and Siddle. The main question in the mind of the assembly was whether or not they could ignore the population quota.

The recommendation of the Assembly by no means indicates that the matter is clear sailing from now on. Claud Millsap, Director of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board stated that there is still the matter of insufficient population to allow the issuance of the licence. He said the Borough Assembly could have gotten around that by passing an ordinance increasing the number of bars allowed in that area. At present the law reads one bar for each 1,500 residents. He said at this time there is no indication that the Assembly passed or intends to pass such an ordinance.

The application for the licence will have to be re-filed Millsap said. It will then be considered at the next meeting of the ABC Board. The board meets once a month. The September meeting is today, Wednesday, Sept 17th.

The next possible date at which the Board could consider the application is October 15th.

CHUGIAK: A new Public Health nurse has been assigned to serve the Greater Chugiak Area, according to the Borough Public Health Department.

She is Miss Edith Moerschell, who will be replacing Miss Ardice Alton.

Miss Moerschell calls her home state, Maryland. She took her nurses training at the University of Maryland before coming to Alaska.

She was a Public Health Nurse for the State of Alaska Department of Health and Welfare for almost a year before coming to the GAAB in July. While with the State she worked in the Lake Elm-

OLD CHUGIAK: Rodeo fans will have an opportunity to see the top ten cowboys and cowgirls in action this weekend, as the Chugiak Stampede makes its debut at the rodeo arena which has been constructed at the Chugiak Carnival grounds.

Sponsored by the Alaska State Rodeo Cowboys Association, (ASRCA) the Stampede will be billed as the 1st Annual State Finals.

The gates will open at noon on Saturday, September 20th, with the first event scheduled to come out of the chutes at 1:00pm. The performance on Sunday, also starts at 1pm, with the gates opening at noon.

The events which will take place during the two day performance are, Saddle Bronc Riding, Bare-back riding, Senior Bull Riding, Junior Bull Riding, Team Roping, Calf Roping, Women's Barrel Racing.

Admission for each day is \$2.00 for adults, with children under 12 being admitted free.

The Chugach Range Riders will present the colors, and will be in charge of the refreshment stand.

The new rodeo arena has just been completed and is located just south of the Carnival Hall on the Carnival Grounds, at Mile 21 in Old Chugiak.

INVESTIGATION OF THEFT CONTINUES

CHUGIAK: The Alaska State Troopers are continuing their investigation of the theft of two boats and motors from the Boy Scout Camp Gorsuch last July.

The investigation was reopened following the recovery of one of the boats last week.

The 12 foot rowboat was discovered hidden in the woods by two local youngsters.

A spokesman for the Alaska State Troopers stated that they are currently questioning a juvenile who is a suspect. He stated that their primary aim is in recovering the remaining 14 foot aluminum canoe and two motors. He said that they have reason to believe that one or more of the motors have been sold by the suspect.

As with most everyone who is away from home, they miss the word of their friends and the activities of their home town.

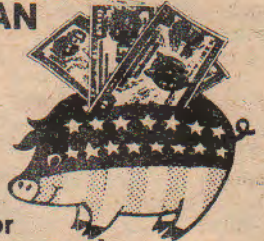
This need can best be filled by reading the home town newspaper.

Four cases of artifacts collected on the island will be displayed at the meeting sponsored by the Cook Inlet Historical Society. It will be open to the public for \$1 admission and to members without charge.

Desautels is president of Archaeological Research, Inc. He and his crew of four in May began an archaeological study of six sites on Amchitka near the site where the Atomic Energy Commission plans to explode a one megaton yield nuclear device next month.

The AEC, commissioned the archaeological study and the results will be reported to it early next year. But Desautels said he feels the artifacts should be placed in a museum in Alaska, preferably in Anchorage.

The materials collected are being processed and interpreted at the Archaeological Research Inc. laboratory in Goleta, Calif.

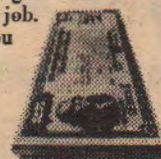

FOOD STAMPS WOULD BE GOOD FOR AMMO

WASHINGTON — Sen. Ted Stevens Wednesday introduced legislation to allow families living in remote parts of Alaska to use food stamps to purchase rifle and shotgun ammunition.

In introducing his legislation, Stevens said that it would help families who depend upon subsistence hunting for much of their food.

"It is imperative that we do everything possible to assist these people to obtain an adequate diet," said Stevens.

Stevens noted that the Internal Revenue Service recently ruled that Alaskans in remote areas may purchase ammunition through the mail.

"It would seem that we should carry this one step further and allow them to purchase the needed ammunition for subsistence hunting with food stamp coupons," he said.

The Stevens legislation would amend the Food Stamp Act of 1964.

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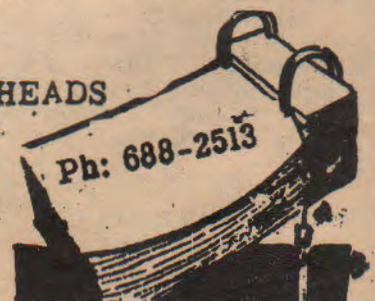
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CHUGIAK MAN INJURED IN WRECK
