


HIGHWAY FENCES TO ISOLATE CHUGIAK

FIRE BONDS TO BE SUBJECT OF PUBLIC MEETING

BIRCHWOOD: There will be a public meeting on Wednesday, October 1st, at the Birchwood Elementary School for all the residents of the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

ABC BOARD TAKES NO ACTION ON BAR LICENSE

ANCHORAGE: The Alcholic Beverage Control Board has not taken any action on the application for a liquor licence for the bowling alley in Eagle River following the recommendation by the Borough Assembly that it be granted.

Claude Millsap, head of the ABC Board said that a report which had appeared in one of the Anchorage daily newspapers to the effect that the board had turned down the license at their September meeting was untrue.

He stated that the Board had not even received an official notification of the Borough Assembly's recommendation and could not possibly have taken any action.

CHUGIAK: Plans to erect chain link fence barriers across the existing Glenn Highway just north of the Eagle River bridge and north of the old Peters Creek bridge upon completion of the new highway were learned this week.

According to Charles Matlock, District Highway Engineer, these fences, or similar barriers would be erected to keep through traffic on the new by-pass, and to avoid what he called a hazardous situation that might result if the highspeed through traffic would happen to merge with the local traffic on the existing road. He expa

He explained that access to the new by-pass from the present Glenn Highway would be possible only at the Birchwood Road at mile 2 and at the

Artillery Road at mile 14.

He stated that in effect the present Glenn Highway from Eagle River to Peters Creek would become a frontage road for residents of that area.

The new by-pass is scheduled to be completed this fall if the weather holds, or early in the spring if the contractor is unable to complete the paving before the first snowfall. The fences will be erected at the time that the new road is opened.

\$20,000 BONDS ASKED FOR SERVICE DIST. 8

CHUGIAK: The voters in Service District 8 (the ares served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company) will find a \$20,000 bond proposal on the ballot at the coming Borough

election. Robert Kallenberg, Chairman of the Supervisory Board stated that there are always questions as to the need for the money, and how the debt is to be paid. He hoped that the following will help the voters in arriving at their desision.

Kallenberg explained that the money will be used to com-plete the Eirchwood Station and to build needed facilities at mile 18 1/2. The Chug-iak Volunteer Fire Company is a volunteer organization in the fullest sense of the word. No member of that or-ganization receives any monetary compensation for their time and service. Taxes fur-nish the company with equipment and shelter for the Acquiring adequipment. equate shelter has been plac-. ed ahead of acquiring improv ed equipment.

The estimated excess of revenue over expenses for the 1968-69 year is \$7,800. The estimated excess for 1969-70 is \$6,558, a total of a little over \$14,000 for the two years.

Of this excess, \$8,500 is being spent for the Birchwood Station this year, The estim-

ated excess for June 30, 1969 is \$5,868.

At the present .5 mills tax, the district should be able to pay the loan at a rate of \$7,000 a year. The \$20,000 would be paid by June 30, 1972 without an increase in taxes.

For the two fiscal years of 68-69 and 69-70, the taxpayers of District 8 will contribute about \$7,000 of the expected revenue of \$26,000. They reveive these shared revenues because they are taxing themselves. The residents of the area must continue the district as it is now formed in order to receive the shared revenue. The .5 mill tax rate will remain whether the bond proposition is car-ried or defested. The only difference being that the neded facilities will be delayed until the necessary building funds have been accumulated.
